

Auburn's four-wheeled clients needing a check-up often line up outside of Building 3 at night, awaiting their turn for care by Automotive Services' skilled technicians.

"It is not unusual for several vehicles to be dropped off overnight to receive maintenance or repairs," said Mark Carroll, supervisor of Facilities Automotive Services Department. "Several of our technicians start their day at 6 a.m. to ensure each vehicle receives service in a timely manner."

The department takes care of

about 250 Facilities fleet vehicles and 100 additional state vehicles located across campus.

"We can do just about every service that needs to be done for a vehicle," Carroll said, noting that the department offers basic tire and brake work, as well as engine, driving and electrical repairs.

Vehicle pickup and delivery also is a special service offered to campus clients.

"For our pickup and delivery services, we drive out to get the vehicles, service them and then return them to their original location," Carroll said.

The department performs more than 30 oil changes and about 50 tire changes a month.

As one campus client put it:



West Thach recycling helpful for campus

The Waste Reduction and Recycling Department's recycling drop-off site is located on West Thach Avenue in the back of West Campus Parking.

"This location was chosen to help support the continued cleanliness of Auburn's campus and the community around it," said Joan Hicken, manager of Waste Reduction and Recycling. "The drop-off site makes recycling easier for the Auburn Family."

Acceptable materials for the drop-off site consist of mixed paper, plastics, aluminum cans, steel cans and cardboard. Additionally, the site has separate bins for recycling mixed paper and containers, along with a dumpster for recycling cardboard. Along the fence, there are signs that list these acceptable materials, directing users where to put their recycling.

The site does not accept garbage, glass, plastic bags or materials in plastic bags, as this will lead to contamination. Contamination occurs when the bins are not used as labeled or trash is mixed in with the recyclables. Using the bins incorrectly can lead to the entire contents of the recycling bin being disposed of as garbage.

"The act of recycling creates good habits and inspires us to develop new and better ways of managing and eliminating waste," Hicken said. "Simple changes can make a difference in reducing the amount of waste we produce and promoting a cleaner, greener campus."

These changes include carrying a refillable water bottle, using reusable shopping bags and saying no to plastic bags and straws.


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ACLC features reclaimed wood walls

To further show the relationship of new campus buildings to their environments, the Academic Classroom and Laboratory Complex (ACLC) includes some of the 22,000 board feet of recycled lumber from trees previously located behind Allison Laboratory.

The pine trees were removed in 2019 before being turned into boards at a lumber mill in Buena Vista, GA. The recycled board is just one of several different structural designs in the ACLC and Central Dining Hall that maximize the two sites' sustainability.

Twice each year, the Waste Reduction and Recycling Department collects toner and ink cartridges from across campus for recycling.

The department recently collected, packed and shipped more than two tons – 4,800 pounds to be exact.

"We usually ship two times a year, said Facilities Waste Reduction and Recycling Manager, Joan Hicken. "This was a bigger shipment than previous. We usually send 10 boxes full, but this shipment included 16 boxes and collection is still ongoing."
