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## Facilities Employee Highlight: Landscaping's Jeff Dyal



There are few people who travel Samford Lawn that Jeff Dyal doesn't recognize or know on a first-name basis.

Retired Maj. Jeff Dyal joined Facilities Management after spending 25 years with the U.S. Marine Corps as an active soldier during Operation Iraqi Freedom in Iraq as well as an ROTC instructor at Auburn University.

After retiring from the Marines in 2014, he became the program director for Auburn Youth Programs before becoming the assistant director of Auburn's Office of Professional and Continuing Education.

Now, he spends his time caring for Samford Lawn, knowing the names of what seems like every person who walks by and going above and beyond by collecting thrown toilet paper rolls for local shelters. It was quite the journey that brought him to Facilities, and he's never been more satisfied.

## What encouraged you to join landscaping?

I talked to my wife for a long time about that. When we saw this piece on landscapes, I loved it.

It's not stressful, and there's plenty of people to talk to, which my passion is servicing people. I love the service aspect. You get to provide for everybody at the absolutely busiest place on campus.

#### Why do you collect the toilet paper rolls from Toomer's celebrations?

As they roll the toilet paper, it doesn't come out. If they get a great throw, it'll go all the way over, but most of the time it's gonna stick up in the tree.

So then you've got all these rolls of toilet paper wasted, and I'm just thinking, golly, you know, we can we can actually take this and do something positive.

I get another trash bag and then I put all those rolls into it. I take it home. I laughed because my daughters are just like, 'Dad, what are you doing? Why do you have 160 rolls of toilet paper?' And that was from one roll, that was one rolling was 175 usable rolls.

So I reached out to (Landscape Services Director Justin Sutton) saying, 'We have all this toilet paper that I think could go to good use.' I was thinking homeless initially, right? And he said, 'Well, here's three that we already partner with who could use it potentially.' So I called all three and they said absolutely. When I first heard about it I was like it makes so much sense. So we're turning bad into good.

# What is your favorite thing about working with the Facilities team?

My favorite thing about Facilities is the people. The people are hardworking, and these guys have so much life experience, it's invaluable what you can get from them. I learn something every day.

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## Ken Martin receives master's in engineering

When Ken Martin, director of utilities and energy at Auburn University, decided to return to the classroom to complete a master's degree, the Master of Engineering Management through the Department of Industrial and Systems Engineering was the perfect fit.

Martin graduated with a degree in mechanical engineering from Auburn University in 1998. He originally worked in manufacturing before accepting a position with Auburn in 2004.

"We always had that nice employee discount sitting out there to take classes, but I never could figure out what the program was that fit me best," Martin said. "Eventually this program came up with engineering management and I just thought it was a good fit for me and what I do with tying the business side into the engineering piece. It was the right fit at the right time."

Martin graduated with the Master of Engineering Management in



December and chose the "systems" program option.

"I work at Facilities Management on campus and it's a big organization, but we also deal with the total picture within the campus and must think about stakeholders," Martin said. "Those classes fit well in just thinking globally on projects, especially on some of our bigger construction projects that could impact a lot of people."

Although it wasn't easy at times,

Martin finished his degree in three years. The Master of Engineering Management has opened opportunities at Auburn University that would not be available to him otherwise.

"I have encouraged some junior folks in our department to look at this degree," Martin said. "If you want to steer out of the pure engineering work and take on more of a leadership role, this program will help with that."

### More than 350 tennis balls recycled



Waste Reduction and Recycling has recycled more than 350 tennis balls (45 pounds) from the university's tennis courts. During the recycling process, the ball is ground up and the felt is separated from the rubber. The rubber crumb can be used in the construction of tennis courts, as plant and garden mulch and cover, equestrian footing and playgrounds. About 125 million used tennis balls wind up in America's landfills every year.

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
