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How to Plan Your Adventure

Step 1: Attend Orientation

Orientation is a 30-minute session held every Thursday at 3 p.m. and every Friday at 11 a.m. in 242 Biggin Hall. You'll find out how to choose the right program for you; how to participate in Auburn faculty-led programs; how to participate in other university programs for Auburn credit; how to apply for federal scholarships to study in Asia, Africa, or Central and South America; and how to apply for scholarships, financial aid, and PACT.

Auburn Affiliate Programs

Auburn University affiliates can include either program providers or other universities. Program providers are third party entities that enroll students at abroad institutions while also providing them with room/board during the duration of the program. Other university programs are very similar to Auburn University faculty-led programs and both options allow Auburn students to receive Auburn credit which can be applied to their Auburn transcript. When participating in an affiliate or other university's program, a student will not be required to pay Auburn tuition. The student will only pay their required registration fee. Registration for Auburn Abroad allows students who receive scholarships, financial aid, PACT funding, grants or loans the ability to use these same resources to help pay for at least part of their abroad experience. By considering affiliate programs, students are able to find many more study abroad possibilities, thus, increasing the odds of finding the best program to fit their academic and personal needs.

Regardless of the type of program a student selects, with proper enrollment in Auburn Abroad, a student can take courses to fulfill major, minor or elective credit and have those credits and hours meet their Auburn degree requirements so they always stay on track to graduate!

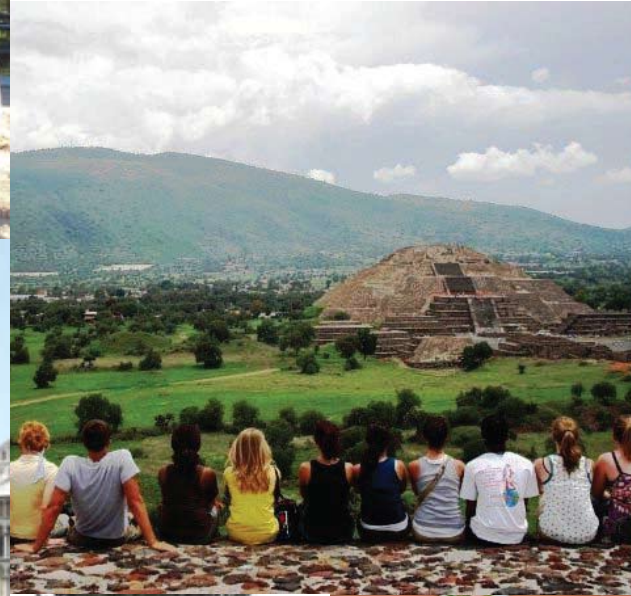
