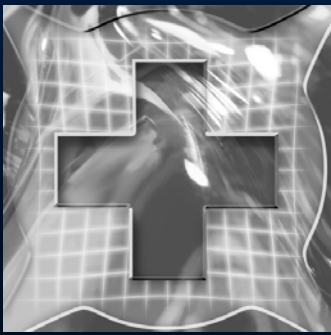

## **OVERVIEW**

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APHCA is a non-profit health care organization incorporated in 1985 to promote access and delivery of comprehensive primary health care services to the medically under-served populations in Alabama. The Association is a membership organization comprised of the following: federally qualified health centers (FQHC), health care for the homeless, sickle cell organizations, area health and educational centers, and rural Alabama health alliance. APHCA is a major voice for primary health care in Alabama and serves as a vehicle for addressing significant issues impacting accessibility and availability of primary health care services to all Alabamians.

## **PROGRAMS AND SERVICES**

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APHCA serves as a liaison between the federal funding agencies, state agencies, and its membership. Through the 115 urban and rural community health center sites in 54 counties, the APHCA network employs board certified or board eligible physicians to provide primary care services. These physicians are supported by over 115 well-trained, dedicated administrative and clinical staff. In 2005, the Association's membership served over 285,000 Alabamians who would have gone without comprehensive medical care without their services.

### PURPOSE

The Office of Primary Care and Rural Health facilitates and participates in activities to improve access to health care services for all rural Alabamians with special concern for children, the elderly, minorities and other medically underserved vulnerable populations.

### PROGRAMS AND SERVICES

The State Office of Rural Health (SORH) is administered through the Alabama Department of Public Health. This office administers the SORH program, the State Primary Care office, and State office of Minority Health and serves as state-level contacts for federal health initiatives in their respective areas of responsibility. The Office of Primary Care and Rural Health serve as contact for rural and minority health information and supports rural communities in health professions recruitment, identification of underserved communities, grant identification, telemedicine resources, and data collection/analysis.

### **PURPOSE**

ASRAP is a group of dedicated healthcare professionals working to improve the quality of life for Alabama's poorest and most medically underserved residents by improving access to primary care and improving the rural health infrastructure in Alabama's underserved communities through The Robert Wood Johnson Foundation's Southern Rural Access Program. The Alabama effort is led by a partnership of the Alabama Primary Health Care Association and the Alabama Family Practice Rural Health Board. The Southern Rural Access Program is a long-term investment to improve access to basic healthcare for some of the nation's most medically underserved residents in eight Southern states - Alabama, Arkansas, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, South Carolina, East Texas and West Virginia.

### **PROGRAMS AND SERVICES**

ASRAP has been awarded a grant of \$286,917 from the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation through the Southern Rural Access Program. This 18-month grant began in early 1999 and marks the beginning of the initial three-year phase of a long-term effort by RWJF that has focused on improving access to health care in underserved rural areas including Alabama and seven other southeastern states.

The first phase will be used as a planning period to develop strategies and specific plans to address issues crucial to the development of an efficient and effective rural community healthcare infrastructure. Alabama's proposal calls for the establishment of separate committees to oversee the planning of each of the program's five components.

- Development of a health professional education program that will focus on the recruitment of rural students into health professions, and the creation of a rural health leaders “pipeline” of academically prepared professionals
- Development of a centralized health professional clearinghouse and a standardized recruitment and retention plan for Alabama’s underserved communities
- Creation of health care networks that will focus on cost efficiency and enhanced patient care services and referral systems
- Development of a revolving loan fund to provide working capital for the establishment of new primary care facilities and/or the renovation of existing facilities and other health care infrastructure improvement projects
- Exploration of community development approaches that will mobilize rural communities and their resources to improve health care and the overall quality of life of their residents.

## **PURPOSE**

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AHEC recruits and retains healthcare professionals to rural areas. Members engage in collaborative programming and activities relative to medical resident and student rotations, health professions, student rotations, interdisciplinary team education, continuing education for providers, learning resource workshops and information dissemination activities to K-12 students. These centers maintain collaborative relationships and affiliation agreements with preceptors, community-based training sites, educational institutions, academic disciplines, organizations, rural community hospitals, rural health clinics, and other appropriate entities.

## **PROGRAMS AND SERVICES**

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- AHEC has jointly developed learning resource centers in three community hospitals as educational sites for students of all disciplines. These sites have internet connection and presentation capabilities. Phase 2 of this project will provide training seminars in the use of such equipment.
- AHEC is compiling a *Health Occupations Career Manual* to provide resource material on health occupations available. The target audience will be junior high and high school students, counselors of these students, and parents.
- AHEC will build collaborative relationships to work toward mutual goals. Rural Alabama AHEC will work with communities and other organizations such as the Alabama Family Practice Rural Health Board, RWJF Southern Rural Access Program, and Tuskegee AHEC and develop affiliation agreements with academic departments as appropriate.
- AHEC is participating in the Clinical Digital Libraries Project, a joint project of The University of Alabama and The University of North Texas. This resource provides health and medical information on the Internet.
- AHEC will promote family practice team building by developing a standardized curriculum and offering training experiences for primary care health teams in rural communities and sites. It will continue to develop affiliation agreements with community-based teaching sites for student and resident rotations.

- To improve minority student outreach, the Rural Alabama AHEC will strengthen relationships with institutions and organizations which traditionally serve minority populations--such as the Tuskegee AHEC, Tuskegee University, Stillman College, and Morehouse University.

### **MISSION**

The mission of CCHS and goals for which it was created in 1972 are to supply well-trained doctors for rural Alabama and focus on ways to improve health services in rural communities. To further this mission, the Department of Community and Rural Medicine developed a group of rural health projects that bring together resources and research available through the state's academic institutions to assist communities in improving the health of rural Alabamians.

### **OVERVIEW**

The Rural Medical Pipeline is a concept which illustrates the importance of finding and nurturing capable rural students who are interested in becoming physicians and practicing in their hometowns or similar rural areas. These students are more likely than non-rural students to establish their medical practices in underserved areas after completing their training in urban medical centers.

The Rural Medical Scholars Program encourages high school students to consider careers in medicine and health professions and experience college first-hand Rural Medical Scholars Program-offers premed and medical students a year of special study prior to entry into medical school and specifically rural-oriented medical school experiences

### **MISSION**

TAHEC's mission is to enhance the quality and accessibility of medical, health and community education and promote the delivery of health care services in rural and medically underserved areas of Alabama.

## **PROGRAMS AND SERVICES**

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TAHEC has been a major resource in recruiting health professionals for many years and offers several initiatives to encourage students to pursue careers in the health professions. A special focus is placed on addressing the importance of achieving cultural diversity in the health care workforce by attracting students from minority, disadvantaged and under-represented populations. TAHEC offers enrichment opportunities, which are targeted, to students from elementary through college years including those in health profession training programs.

Activities are provided through partnerships including the Central Alabama Veterans Health Care System in Tuskegee and many other community agencies. Examples of activities for participants include informational seminars by health care providers, health career fairs, field trips to health care facilities, course offerings in math and science, computer skills development, and preceptor ship placements, among others.
