The subject was arrested on campus but all criminal acts occurred off campus. • Three Domestic Violence statistics were added to the On-campus Student Housing category. These represent Domestic Violence incidents that occurred within two Stalking courses of conduct that were already included in the published statistics. One Domestic Violence statistic was removed as mentioned above. • Two Liquor Law Arrest statistics were moved to the Liquor Law Violations Referred for Disciplinary Action category. One Liquor Law Arrest statistic was removed as the arrest was not for a countable Liquor Law Violation. • The geography classification was adjusted for several Burglary, Domestic Violence and Stalking cases and several Liquor, Drug and Weapon Law Arrests and Liquor Law and Drug Law Violations Referred for Disciplinary Action, but did not affect the total counts. • Two Manslaughter by Negligence on Public Property statistics were added to the 2019 Main Campus crime statistics based on recent guidance provided by the Department of Education.

Introduction

This report has been prepared by the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security and the Auburn University Department of Risk Management & Safety in compliance with the Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act (the Clery Act). It includes important information regarding policies on campus safety and related issues, such as crime reporting; emergency procedures and notification; alcohol and drug use; weapons; sexual violence and relationship violence; fire safety in on-campus student housing facilities; and other safety and security topics. The report also includes crime statistics for the previous three calendar years covering crimes reported to have occurred within the university's Clery geography (on campus; in certain off-campus buildings and property owned or controlled by the university and used by students; and on public property within or immediately adjacent to and accessible from the campus) and fire statistics for the previous three calendar years covering fires occurring in on-campus student housing facilities.

The report includes information for the Auburn University Main Campus and twelve separate campuses. Policies applicable to all campuses are included in the front portion of the report. A separate section for each separate campus outlines policies and statistics specific to that campus.

Campus crime, arrest and referral statistics contained in this report include those reported to the City of Auburn Police Division (for properties within the City of Auburn), other law enforcement agencies, the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security, and designated "campus security authorities" as defined under the Clery Act and are compiled by the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security. For statistical purposes, crime statistics reported to any of these sources are recorded in the calendar year the crime was reported. Statistics are provided for crimes specified under the Clery Act as referenced in the Crime Statistics sections of this report.

As required by federal law, this report is generally published by October 1 each year and is available by selecting the link at http://www.auburn.edu/administration/campus-safety/campus_safety.html. Hard copies may be obtained at the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security located at 543 West Magnolia Avenue, Auburn, AL 36849. Crime and fire logs are available online at www.auburn.edu/safety under the Clery Act Compliance link. Five separate campuses have security and are required to maintain a daily crime log. The policies, procedures and programs described in the University-Wide Policy Statements section are applicable to all campuses included in this report.

Prompt Reporting of a Crime or Emergency

Members of the Auburn University community (students, faculty, staff, contractors, and visitors) are encouraged to promptly and accurately report all crimes and public safety-related incidents to their respective local law enforcement agency.

To maximize safety on campus, the university strongly encourages anyone with knowledge about any crime (whether as a witness or as a victim) to make a report to the appropriate law enforcement agency listed below in person or by telephone, when the victim elects to make such a report or is unable to make a report on their own. Reporting does not mean you must take legal action; however, it may help law enforcement stop further incidents, as well as help keep the community informed about criminal activity.

To make a report in person, go to the nearest local law enforcement agency; if near the Auburn University Main Campus, go to the Auburn Police Division's University Precinct located at 543 West Magnolia Avenue, Auburn, AL 36849. At the Auburn Police Division's University Precinct on Main Campus, if an officer is not immediately available, there is a phone in the lobby that will dial directly to Auburn Communications. A communications officer will dispatch the assistance you need.

To make a report by telephone anywhere in the U.S., dial 911 for emergencies or crimes in progress. At the Harrison School of Pharmacy site on the University of South Alabama campus dial 251-460-6312. In Italy, dial 112 for emergencies or crimes in progress. When filing a report, be prepared with as much of the following information as possible:

- Name
- Exact location of the incident
- Description of the scene
- Description of any suspects
- Description and license numbers of any involved vehicles.

After dialing the appropriate emergency number, for any significant emergency or dangerous situation that may pose an immediate or on-going threat to the health and safety of the campus community, also notify the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security at 334-750-9795 (00-1-334-750-9795 from Italy) as soon as possible. Incidents reported to the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security will be assessed for emergency and timely warning notification and potential inclusion in the annual statistical disclosure.

In addition to crimes, all suspicious activity should also be reported to the police. For emergencies, dial 911 in the U.S. (112 in Italy). For non-emergencies, call the number listed in the above list (in Auburn dial 334-501-3100 or call or text the Auburn Police Division tip line at 334-246-1391). Examples of suspicious activity include a person engaging in any of the following activities: possessing a weapon; making dangerous actions or comments; acting unusual, out of place, or loitering; or accessing unauthorized areas.

Individuals identified as Mandatory Reporters as defined in the university's *Title IX Sexual Harassment Policy* and *Policy Against Discrimination and Harassment* have additional reporting obligations as outlined in that policy. All employees have reporting obligations for child abuse, as outlined in the *Reporting of Child Abuse and Neglect Policy*. Campus security authorities have additional crime reporting obligations as outlined below.

Campus Security Authorities

Campus security authorities are defined by the Clery Act as City of Auburn Police Division officers assigned to or responding to university Clery geography; Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security personnel; other individuals who have responsibility for campus security, but who do not work for the Department of Campus Safety & Security (including contracted security providers); or officials who have significant responsibility for student and campus activities outside of the classroom. The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security maintains a list of all campus security authorities and the training they receive.

The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security collects crime reports from the identified campus security authorities, which typically include (but are not limited to) advisors to student organizations and certain staff from the following units: Auburn University Campus Safety & Security (all staff), Auburn Police Division (officers assigned to or responding to university Clery geography), Parking Services, Athletics (directors/ coaches/ assistant coaches), Student Affairs (University Housing, Health Promotion and Wellness Services, Student Conduct, Greek Life, Student Involvement, Student Center, ROTC, First Year Experience, Campus Recreation), Title IX (coordinators and investigators), Inclusion and Diversity, International Programs (including Auburn Abroad), Auburn Youth Programs (and similar programs), and separate campus administrators.

After following the crime and emergency reporting requirements outlined above, campus security authorities are required to promptly notify the Department of Campus Safety & Security of all crimes reported to them to have occurred on Clery geography by calling the department's on-call supervisor at 334-750-9795. The on-call supervisor will gather information to conduct an immediate timely warning assessment and will direct the campus security authority on how to complete and submit the crime reporting form available at www.auburn.edu/safety. Each of these reports is reviewed by Department of Campus Safety & Security personnel to assess whether it meets reporting requirements under the Clery Act (including timely warning notification and annual statistical disclosure) and to avoid duplicate reporting where possible.

Campus Counselors and Confidential Reporting

Campus pastoral counselors and professional counselors, as defined by the Clery Act and when acting as such, are not considered to be campus security authorities and are not required to report crimes for inclusion in the annual disclosure of crime statistics. Counselors are defined by the Clery Act as:

Pastoral Counselor: An employee of an institution, who is associated with a religious order or denomination, recognized by that religious order or denomination as someone who provides confidential counseling and who is functioning within the scope of that recognition as a pastoral counselor. Auburn University does not

have any pastoral counselors.

Professional Counselor: A professional counselor is an employee of an institution whose official responsibilities include providing psychological counseling to members of the institution's community and who is functioning within the scope of his or her license or certification.

Auburn University employs professional counselors on the Main Campus. Students at all separate campuses in Alabama can access services through Student Counseling & Psychological Services by coming to the main campus in person or through telehealth appointments. Auburn University encourages these professional counselors to inform the persons they are counseling of the importance of collecting data on crime and that the incident they are discussing can be reported on a voluntary, confidential basis for possible inclusion in the annual disclosure of crime statistics by the counselor through the counselor's director or another CSA. This is accomplished through periodic meetings with counselors to inform them of this reporting option.

Students at the Ariccia campus can access counseling services through CISI Travel Insurance. Employees can access counseling services through the Employee Assistance Program. Services provided through either of these avenues are provided through third parties who are not employed by Auburn University. The university does not have a procedure to encourage these professional counselors to inform the persons they are counseling of any procedures to report crimes on a voluntary, confidential basis for possible inclusion in the annual disclosure of crime statistics.

Timely Warning of Crimes

Auburn University will issue timely warning notices (generally called Campus Safety Notices) to members of the university community whenever a crime is reported directly to Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security, campus security authorities, or local law enforcement that meets the criteria outlined in this section and is determined to represent a serious or ongoing threat to students or employees. Such warnings will be provided to students and employees in a manner that is timely and that withholds the names of victims as confidential. Timely warnings will include pertinent information about the crime that triggered the warning and information that promotes safety and aids in the prevention of similar crimes. Resources and reporting options may also be included in timely warnings.

Timely warnings are usually distributed for the following crime classifications when they are determined to pose a serious or ongoing threat to the campus community within each campus' Clery geography (on campus; in certain off-campus buildings and property owned or controlled by the university and used by students; and on public property within or immediately adjacent to and accessible from the campus):

- Murder/non-negligent manslaughter;
- Sexual assault (considered on a case-by-case basis depending on the facts of the case, when the incident occurred, when it was reported, and the amount of information known);
- Robbery, involving force or violence (cases involving pick pocketing and purse snatching are classified as larceny in the Uniform Crime Reporting system and will typically not result in the issuance of a timely warning, but will be assessed on a case-by-case basis);
- Aggravated assault (cases involving assaults, such as two students fighting, which result in aggravated injury, will be evaluated on a case-by-case basis to determine if there is an ongoing threat to the campus community);
- Major incidents of arson;
- Other crimes as determined necessary by the executive director of Campus Safety & Security or, in the executive director's absence, a director or associate director within the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security.

Timely warnings will be distributed to each separate campus community as outlined in the Timely Warning of Crimes section of this report for that campus.

Auburn University is not required to issue a Timely Warning with respect to crimes reported to a pastoral or professional counselor.

Emergency Preparedness

Emergencies can occur at any time, often without warning. Auburn University's emergency plans and guidelines can help you deal with many emergency situations appropriately. Your judgment often determines whether an incident is an emergency. If in doubt, err on the side of safety. Emergency Guidelines

Emergency guidelines provide a framework for campus community members during emergency events. Since all emergencies are unique in nature, these guidelines are designed to be flexible in order to accommodate contingencies of various types and magnitudes. Their flexibility also makes them largely applicable to all campuses. More specific guidelines for specific campus facilities are available in building- and facility-specific emergency plans created and managed by Campus Safety & Security.

Emergency guidelines are available from the Department of Campus Safety & Security in a variety of formats, including emergency information cards for students (which are provided to incoming students at student orientation and to others at outreach events), emergency guidelines flipcharts (which are provided to new employees at new hire orientation and to others at outreach and training events), building-specific emergency response plans, and hazard-specific guidance on the Emergency Management Web page (<http://www.auburn.edu/administration/campus-safety/emergency/>) and the Auburn Safety app (both for iOS and Android devices). Emergency Response and Evacuation Procedures

University Emergency Response Procedures

The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security has primary responsibility for emergency management on Auburn University properties. Auburn University has an Emergency Operations Plan in place that defines the organizational structure for response to emergencies of a magnitude that would cause significant disruption to university operations. The plan identifies members of the Crisis Management Team, which is responsible for managing the operational aspects of the university's response to an emergency event.

In the event of any crisis situation (including, but not limited to: a fire, weather emergency, infectious disease outbreak, significant utility disruption, hazardous materials release, or campus violence incident) the appropriate members of the Crisis Management Team may, if needed, assemble to mitigate the consequences, promote the safety of the community, and provide for "continuity of business" for the university's educational, research and outreach missions.

In addition to the Emergency Operations Plan and emergency guidelines, the Department of Campus Safety & Security has developed and maintains a variety of other plans. Building-specific emergency response plans provide more detailed information for building occupants on hazards, safety systems, and guidelines applicable to the building. Hazard-specific plans provide more detailed information about specific hazards, such as severe weather and infectious disease. Other plans address different phases of the emergency management cycle, such as the Hazard Mitigation Plan (developed to identify top hazards and mitigation opportunities to reduce the threat of such hazards).

Evacuation Procedures

Emergency response and building evacuation procedures are included in building-specific emergency response plans.

When deciding whether to conduct an evacuation of a significant portion of or an entire campus, consideration

will be made for the type of hazard or threat, credibility of the threat, area of campus in danger, and ability to contain the threat to a specified area of campus. The campus community may be notified to evacuate on foot or by vehicle, depending on the nature and timing of the threat, as well as other hazards that may impact the safety of persons evacuating.

Information about how the decision will be made and communicated for each separate campus can be found in the section specific to that campus. The method and direction of the evacuation route during a campus evacuation will depend on the nature and location of the emergency or disaster warranting the evacuation.

Once public safety officials decide it is safe to return, announcements will be made to return to normal operations.

Tests of Emergency Procedures

The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security reviews and updates plans and coordinates tests of emergency response and evacuation procedures at least annually for each campus, via announced and/or unannounced tests, to evaluate the university's response. Tests include drills, exercises and follow-through activities to review each test. Emergency response and evacuation procedures (e.g. emergency guidelines) are publicized during these tests (in conjunction with at least one test per calendar year) and documentation of the tests are maintained by the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security. Documentation for each test will include: a description of the exercise, date, time, and whether it was announced or unannounced.

Tests of the components of the emergency notification systems are conducted and documented, via announced tests. Testing frequency varies depending on the mode of communication. All tests of components of the emergency notification system are clearly identified as test messages. Performance results are documented and maintained by the Department of Campus Safety & Security.

Emergency Notifications

Emergency notification systems are in place for each separate campus. Details of each system can be found in the separate campus sections.

Emergency Updates

Pertinent follow-up information will be disseminated as soon as it is available. Updates and follow-up messages may be sent via any of the communication methods listed in each separate campus section. Members of the campus community and larger community may also monitor updates via local/national news media.

Missing Student Policy

If a member of the university community has reason to believe that a student residing in on-campus housing at any campus is missing, they should immediately notify local law enforcement at the number listed at the beginning of this report. Local law enforcement has primary responsibility for investigating reports of missing students residing in on-campus housing and will make an official determination as to whether a student is missing.

Upon investigation, should local law enforcement determine that the student is missing, they will promptly notify the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security. Within 24 hours of a determination by police that a student is missing, Auburn University will notify:

- The student's missing person confidential contact(s), if they have registered any;
- The student's custodial parent or legal guardian, and any other designated contact person, if the missing student is under the age of 19 and is not an emancipated individual.
 - Because the age of adulthood in Alabama is 19, we choose to notify the parent or legal guardian of a missing student who is under the age of 19, which also meets the Clery Act requirement to notify the parent or legal guardian of a missing student under the age of 18.

Auburn University will make reasonable efforts to assist with missing person investigations for all Auburn

University students, regardless of whether they reside in on-campus housing.

Identifying Emergency Contacts and Missing Person Confidential Contacts

In addition to registering general emergency contacts, students, faculty, and staff have the option to confidentially identify one or more individuals to be contacted by Auburn University in the event the student, faculty, or staff member is determined to be missing for more than 24 hours. Missing person confidential contact information is only accessible to authorized campus officials and law enforcement and will not be disclosed outside of a missing person investigation.

In AU Access, on the My Campus tab, there is a link entitled “My Contacts” where students, faculty, and staff can register the following:

- General emergency contacts: This is who the university will contact in the event a student, faculty member, or staff member is involved in a serious emergency or crisis.
- Missing person confidential contacts: This is who the university will contact if the police determine the student, faculty member, or staff member to be missing.

Students residing in on-campus housing on the Main Campus are notified each fall semester of the need to provide missing person confidential contacts. Students residing at separate campuses with on-campus student housing are notified upon arrival of the need to provide missing person confidential contacts. Harrison School of Pharmacy Mobile students, although not residing on campus, also have the option of registering emergency and missing person confidential contacts with the University of South Alabama via their PAWS account.

Dangerous Weapons and Firearms Policy

In order to maintain a safe academic environment, Auburn University prohibits the possession and use of any dangerous or potentially dangerous weapon(s) or instrument(s), including but not limited to those described below, on all university properties, with limited exceptions.

This policy is applicable to all members of the university community, including students, faculty, staff, visitors (invited or uninvited), contractors, and guests at any university campus, facility, or event.

The following dangerous weapons and firearms are included within this prohibition:

- Firearms – Shotgun, rifle, pistol, revolver or other shoulder gun including ammunition. This also includes starter guns; the frame or receiver of any such weapon; any firearm muffler or silencer; or any machine gun.
- Any non-culinary knife, fixed or lockblade (e.g. Bowie knife, knife, or instrument of like kind or description), except common pocket knife or legitimate tools appropriately used in authorized work on campus.
- Stun Gun, Taser or instrument of like kind or description
- Air gun (e.g., air or gas-powered rifle or pistol)
- Bow and arrow (e.g., archery equipment)
- Slingshots (including throwing weapons)
- Swords
- Crossbows
- Brass knuckles
- Fireworks or explosive devices

Except as otherwise provided in this policy or in controlling law, the possession, transportation, and use of firearms on campus is prohibited. Dangerous weapons are not permitted on campus at any time.

Temporary exclusions may be granted in writing by the executive director of Campus Safety & Security for job-related, educational, or demonstration purposes. Department heads and respective instructors may be granted authorization for organized activities by the executive director of the Department of Campus Safety & Security of Auburn University. The requesting organization must guarantee qualified instruction, safety, and security for such activities. This policy shall not apply to duly designated law enforcement officers while in the discharge of their lawful duties.

An employee may not possess firearms on campus or while otherwise engaged in duties associated with their employment, except for a firearm properly maintained in a personal vehicle in a manner consistent with local law. University students may not possess firearms at any time on campus (except as expressly authorized by the executive director of Campus Safety & Security). The Department of Campus Safety & Security provides temporary storage for firearms lawfully possessed by students at its office on Main Campus.

Where applicable, all federal, state, and local laws and ordinances will be strictly enforced by Auburn Police Division (and other corresponding local law enforcement agencies) and respective mutual aid agencies and shall be separate from this administrative policy.

Threat Assessment Team

The Auburn University Threat Assessment Team is in place to advise and make recommendations on incidents involving members of the university community that pose, or may reasonably pose, a threat to the safety and well-being of themselves and/or other members of the university community. This is accomplished through outreach and educational programming, consultation, and appropriate referrals.

Referrals to the Threat Assessment Team

It is the responsibility of the university community to report any situation that could possibly result in a threat to the safety and well-being of other members of the university community. Any member of the university community that may become aware of such a situation can report the matter to the Threat Assessment Team.

It is important to emphasize that reports to the Threat Assessment Team not be made anonymously because of the limitations to investigating without complete information. Please include, at a minimum, your name, phone number and e-mail address.

Crime Prevention & Security Awareness Programs

The university offers a variety of informative programs for students and employees dealing with crime prevention, security awareness and campus safety. These programs are available several times a year and upon request by student groups, employees, or individuals. Students at all separate campuses have access to these programs while they are on the Main Campus and/or through remote delivery upon request by separate campus administrators. Harrison School of Pharmacy-Mobile campus students also have access to similar programs through the University of South Alabama Police Department.

Programs address topics such as security procedures and practices, personal safety, emergency preparedness and response, alcohol and drug abuse awareness, sexual assault, violence prevention, and bystander intervention. Additional information is available in the section of this report on Sexual Assault, Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, and Stalking Prevention and Awareness Programs.

During the 2021-2022 academic year, Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security provided numerous regularly scheduled security awareness and crime prevention programs. Other programs were provided upon request by specific groups. A common theme of all awareness and crime prevention programs is to encourage students and employees to be aware of their responsibility for their own security and the security of others.

Community members are encouraged to take part in the programs listed below in order to receive important tips and information pertaining to their personal safety. A training schedule is available on the Campus Safety & Security Web site at http://www.auburn.edu/administration/campus-safety/emergency/training_resources.html. All classes may also be scheduled on request to specific groups and most may be delivered via remote delivery to separate campuses and other locations outside of the Auburn area. Email campussafety@auburn.edu to make a request.

For Students:

Campus Safety and Active Shooter Response Training

This one and a half-hour training program is offered multiple times per semester by the Department of Campus Safety & Security and can also be specially scheduled upon request. It covers general emergency preparedness, crime prevention, and security awareness, and guidelines for responding to an active shooter situation.

Rape Aggression Defense (RAD) Class for Women

This 12-hour training program is offered at the Main Campus at six different times each semester as a for-credit class (one credit hour) through Physical Education. Students can sign up when they register for classes by selecting PHED 2200. This class, taught by Department of Campus Safety & Security and local law enforcement personnel, teaches security and safety awareness, risk reduction strategies, and hands-on self-defense techniques. For Employees:

Employee Emergency Preparedness

This one-hour training program is offered multiple times per semester by the Department of Campus Safety & Security and covers emergency guidelines, crime prevention and security awareness.

Active Shooter Response Training

This two-hour training program is offered multiple times per semester by the Department of Campus Safety & Security and provides an overview of a variety of options available in response to an active shooter situation.

Rape Aggression Defense (RAD) Class for Women

This 12-hour training program is offered by the Department of Campus Safety & Security periodically for female employees, and teaches security and safety awareness, risk reduction strategies, and hands-on self-defense techniques.

Crime Prevention Tips

Campus safety is everyone's responsibility. It is important that we all take our personal safety seriously. It is impossible to prevent all crimes and the perpetrator ultimately decides whether to commit a crime. However, there are some actions you can take to reduce your chance of being a victim of crime. Additional crime prevention and risk reduction information can be found in the Sexual Assault, Dating & Domestic Violence, and Stalking section of this report.

Three Simple Rules for Personal Safety

- Stay alert and tuned in to your surroundings. Be aware and prepared.
- Stand tall and walk confidently; do not show fear.
- Trust your instincts.
 - If you do not feel comfortable in a place or situation, leave.
 - If you see suspicious activity or a person behaving suspiciously, notify police at 911 in the U.S. (112 in Italy) For non-emergencies, call the number listed at the front of this report (in Auburn dial 334-501-3100 or call or text the Auburn Police Division tip line at 334-246-1391).

Protecting Your Property

- Don't mark your key chain with your name, address and/or license number. Lost keys can lead to theft. Take care of keys; don't give anyone the chance to duplicate them.
- Engrave all valuable personal property with your name and a unique number known only to you. Keep a detailed list of all valuables and serial numbers. Keep a copy of this list at your permanent residence as a backup. This list may help police recover your belongings.

- Move valuables out of view from windows and doors.
- Lock your vehicle and residence at all times, even when you're in them.
- Copy all important papers and cards that you carry in your purse or wallet, including your driver's license. Keep the copies in a safe place. The information will be invaluable if anything is stolen or lost.
- Copy your vehicle ID and tag number. If your vehicle is stolen, it cannot be entered into the nationwide law enforcement network without this information.
- Use a combination padlock on all storage units. Check the unit periodically to make sure nothing has been disturbed.

Protecting Yourself at Home

- Keep doors and windows locked at all times, even if you are only away for a few minutes. Do not "prop open" doors in residence halls.
- Be assertive and demand that any unwanted person in your residence leave or leave yourself. Anyone who refuses to leave is a trespasser. If you live in a residence hall, report any unescorted person to security or police.
- Make sure hallways, entrances, garages, and grounds are well lit. Leave porch lights on all night. Keep blinds and curtains shut after dark and never dress in front of a window.
- On campus, immediately report exterior lights that are out to Facilities Management on Main Campus, or to your local facility manager if outside Main Campus. Off campus, immediately report exterior lighting problems to the management of your apartment complex or landlord.
- When you expect to return after dark, leave an interior light on with the shades drawn.
- Know who is at your door before you open it. Campus staff members carry identification, and solicitors are not allowed on campus. Require proper identification from any repair or utility personnel. If you live off campus, install a peephole in your front door.
- Do not open your door to strangers or let them in. If they need assistance and ask to use your phone, call the police to assist them.
- List initials and last names only on your mailbox or door and in the telephone book. Don't leave your name on your door or answering machine if you live alone.
- If you are going out of town, do not state you are away or when you will return on your voice mail recording, e-mail automated reply, or social media networks.
- Get to know your neighbors. If you live off campus, join a neighborhood watch system and share information on suspicious circumstances.
- When you go home on breaks, have someone pick up your mail, newspaper, etc. Install timers and leave on all outside lights. Make your residence appear "lived in."
- If you come home and see a broken window or a jimmied door, don't go inside. Confronting a burglar can be dangerous. Phone police immediately at 911 (112 in Italy).

Protecting Yourself Away from Home

- Walk or jog with one or more friends. Avoid jogging after dark. If you must jog at night, stay in well-lit, well-traveled areas and do not go alone.
- Carry a whistle and don't hesitate to use it to alert others you need help. Vary your route frequently.
- Don't wear ear buds when jogging or biking, or at least leave one ear open so you can hear what's going on around you. Ear buds and headphones significantly reduce your ability to hear and thus affect your awareness.
- Tell someone where you are going and when you will return. Download the free Auburn Safety app and use the Friend Walk feature to have a friend virtually walk with you.
- Make sure your cell phone is charged before you go out, in case you need to use it to call for help.
- Don't fight back if your purse or wallet is snatched. Throw it in one direction and run in the other rather than risk personal injury. Call the police immediately at 911 (112 in Italy).
- Be careful when and where you patronize ATM machines. Accessing ATM cash machines in remote locations, particularly at night, could increase your risk of robbery and personal injury. While you are standing at the machine, keep turning around and scanning for people approaching you or loitering around. Cover the keypad while entering your passcode.
- Avoid working or studying alone in a building other than your residence at night.
- Stand and walk tall with a brisk, purposeful stride. Make brief eye contact with someone who makes you

feel uneasy to let them know that you see them and are not afraid, but don't stare too long or prolong your glance.

- Trust your instincts.

Protecting Yourself at Work

- Avoid working or studying alone in a building at night.
- When working late, make sure doors are locked.
- Keep your purse in a locked cabinet or drawer. Never leave it on or underneath a desk.
- Avoid using stairs in remote sections of the building.
- Do not hold the door open for strangers after normal business hours.
- Ask people you don't recognize if you can help them.
- Report suspicious activity to police. Call 911 (112 in Italy) for emergencies and crimes in progress, or appropriate non-emergency contacts.
- Be careful what you leave on your desk and on your computer screen when you step away from your desk.
- Keep passwords in secure places.

Have a Plan

It is very important for you to have a plan in case someone tries to steal your bag, attack you from behind, or your car breaks down at night, etc. Knowing how you would handle situations if you should ever have to face an attacker could save your life. Always be alert, pay attention to your surroundings, trust your instincts and report suspicious activity to the police.

If you have a cell phone, charge it before going out and keep it with you at all times so you can call for help if needed. On Main Campus, pay attention to locations of blue light emergency phones in case you need to activate one.

Auburn Safety App

A personal safety app, Auburn Safety, is available at no cost to Auburn University students and employees. This app allows users to have their friends monitor their location temporarily ("Friend Walk") or send messages about general safety or security concerns to Campus Safety & Security. Simply download the Auburn Safety app for iPhone or Android. For emergencies and crimes in progress, students or employees should always dial 911 (112 in Italy) as opposed to sending a message through the Auburn Safety app. The app also includes useful information such as emergency guidelines ("How to Respond") and resources for sexual assault and other interpersonal violence.

Sexual Assault, Domestic & Dating Violence, and Stalking

Auburn University is committed to providing a learning, working, and living environment that promotes personal integrity, civility, and mutual respect in an environment free of discrimination on the basis of sex. Sex-based discrimination includes all forms of sexual misconduct, including sexual or gender-based harassment, sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking. As a result, Auburn University issues this statement of policy to inform the community of our comprehensive plan addressing sexual misconduct, educational programs, and procedures that address sexual or gender-based harassment, sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking, whether the incident occurs on or off campus and when it is reported to a university official. In this context, Auburn University prohibits the offenses of sexual or gender-based harassment, sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking and reaffirms its commitment to maintain a campus environment emphasizing the dignity and worth of all members of the university community.

Definitions & Offenses (Clery Act and State Law)

There are numerous terms used by Auburn University in our policies. Some key definitions and offenses from state law and the Clery Act, which are applicable to sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking, are listed below. For crime definitions in Italy, see the Arricia – Joseph S. Bruno Auburn Abroad in Italy Section.

Sexual Assault Definitions According to the Clery Act

Sexual Assault: “Sexual assault” means an offense that meets the definition of rape, fondling, incest, or statutory rape as used in the FBI’s Uniform Crime Reporting system. A sex offense is any act directed against another person, without the consent of the victim, including instances where the victim is incapable of giving consent.

Rape is defined as the penetration, no matter how slight, of the vagina or anus, with any body part or object, or oral penetration by a sex organ of another person, without the consent of the victim.

Fondling is defined as the touching of the private body parts of another person for the purpose of sexual gratification, without the consent of the victim, including instances where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her age or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental incapacity.

Incest is defined as sexual intercourse between persons who are related to each other within the degrees wherein marriage is prohibited by law.

Statutory Rape is defined as sexual intercourse with a person who is under the statutory age of consent.

Key Sexual Offenses According to Alabama Statute

Definitions (AL Code § 13A-6-60 (2019)). The following definitions apply in this article:

- (1) **FORCIBLE COMPULSION.** Use or threatened use, whether express or implied, of physical force, violence, confinement, restraint, physical injury, or death to the threatened person or to another person. Factors to be considered in determining an implied threat include, but are not limited to, the respective ages and sizes of the victim and accused; the respective mental and physical conditions of the victim and the accused; the atmosphere and physical setting in which the incident was alleged to have taken place; the extent to which the accused may have been in a position of authority, domination, or custodial control over the victim; or whether the victim was under duress. Forcible compulsion does not require proof of resistance by the victim.
- (2) **INCAPACITATED.** The term includes any of the following:
 - a. A person who suffers from a mental or developmental disease or disability which renders the person incapable of appraising the nature of his or her conduct.
 - b. A person is temporarily incapable of appraising or controlling his or her conduct due to the influence of a narcotic, anesthetic, or intoxicating substance and the condition was known or should have been reasonably known to the offender.
 - c. A person who is unable to give consent or who is unable to communicate an unwillingness to an act because the person is unconscious, asleep, or is otherwise physically limited or unable to communicate.
- (3) **SEXUAL CONTACT.** Any touching of the sexual or other intimate parts of a person done for the purpose of gratifying the sexual desire of either party. The term does not require skin to skin contact.
- (4) **SEXUAL INTERCOURSE.** Such term has its ordinary meaning and occurs upon any penetration, however slight; emission is not required.

(5) SODOMY. Any sexual act involving the genitals of one person and the mouth or anus of another person.

Lack of consent (AL Code § 13A-6-70 (2019)):

- (a) Unless otherwise stated, an element of every offense defined in this article is that the sexual act was committed without the consent of the victim.
- (b) Lack of consent results from either of the following:
 - (1) Forcible compulsion.
 - (2) Being incapable of consent.
- (c) A person is deemed incapable of consent if he or she is either:
 - (1) Less than 16 years old.
 - (2) Incapacitated.
- (d) Consent to engage in sexual intercourse, sodomy, sexual acts, or sexual contact may be communicated by words or actions. The existence of a current or previous marital, dating, social, or sexual relationship with the defendant is not sufficient to constitute consent. Evidence that the victim suggested, requested, or otherwise communicated to the defendant that the defendant use a condom or other birth control device or sexually transmitted disease protection, without additional evidence of consent, is not sufficient to constitute consent.

Rape in the first degree (AL Code § 13A-6-61 (2019)):

- (a) A person commits the crime of rape in the first degree if he or she does any of the following:
 - (1) Engages in sexual intercourse with another person by forcible compulsion.
 - (2) Engages in sexual intercourse with another person who is incapable of consent by reason of being incapacitated.
 - (3) Being 16 years old or older, engages in sexual intercourse with another person who is less than 12 years old.
- (b) Rape in the first degree is a Class A felony.

Rape in the second degree (AL Code § 13A-6-62 (2019)):

- (a) A person commits the crime of rape in the second degree if, being 16 years old or older, he or she engages in sexual intercourse with another person who is 12 years old or older, but less than 16 years old; provided, however, the actor is at least two years older than the other person.
- (b) Rape in the second degree is a Class B felony.

Sodomy in the first degree (AL Code § 13A-6-63 (2019)):

- (a) A person commits the crime of sodomy in the first degree if he or she does any of the following:
 - (1) Engages in sodomy with another person by forcible compulsion.
 - (2) Engages in sodomy with another person who is incapable of consent by reason of being incapacitated.
 - (3) Being 16 years old or older, engages in sodomy with a person who is less than 12 years old.
- (b) Sodomy in the first degree is a Class A felony.

Sodomy in the second degree (AL Code § 13A-6-64 (2019)):

- (a) A person commits the crime of sodomy in the second degree if, being 16 years old or older, he or she engages in sodomy with another person 12 years old or older, but less than 16 years old; provided, however, the actor is at least two years older than the other person.
- (b) Sodomy in the second degree is a Class B felony.

Sexual misconduct (AL Code § 13A-6-65 (2019)):

- (a) A person commits the crime of sexual misconduct if he or she does any of the following:
 - (1) Engages in sexual intercourse with another person without his or her consent, under circumstances other than those covered by Sections 13A-6-61 and 13A-6-62; or with consent where consent was obtained by the use of any fraud or artifice.
 - (2) Engages in sodomy with another person, without his or her consent, under circumstances other

than those covered by Sections 13A-6-63 and 13A-6-64; or with consent where consent was obtained by the use of fraud or artifice.

- (3) Engages in sexual contact with another person without his or her consent under circumstances other than those under Section 13A-6-66, 13A-6-67, and 13A-6-69.1; or with consent where consent was obtained by the use of fraud or artifice.

(b) Sexual misconduct is a Class A misdemeanor.

Sexual torture (AL Code § 13A-6-65.1 (2019)):

(a) A person commits the crime of sexual torture if he or she does any of the following:

- (1) Penetrates the vagina, anus, or mouth of another person with an inanimate object, by forcible compulsion, with the intent to sexually torture, sexually abuse, or to gratify the sexual desire of either party.
- (2) Penetrates the vagina, anus, or mouth of a person who is incapable of consent by reason of being incapacitated, with an inanimate object, with the intent to sexually torture, sexually abuse, or to gratify the sexual desire of either party.
- (3) Penetrates the vagina, anus, or mouth of a person who is less than 12 years old, with an inanimate object, by a person who is 16 years old or older with the intent to sexually torture, sexually abuse, or to gratify the sexual desire of either party.
- (4) By inflicting physical injury, including, but not limited to burning, crushing, wounding, mutilating, or assaulting the sex organs or intimate parts of another person, with the intent to sexually torture, sexually abuse, or to gratify the sexual desire of either party.

(b) The crime of sexual torture is a Class A felony.

Sexual abuse in the first degree (AL Code § 13A-6-66 (2019)):

(a) A person commits the crime of sexual abuse in the first degree if he or she does any of the following:

- (1) Subjects another person to sexual contact by forcible compulsion.
- (2) Subjects another person to sexual contact who is incapable of consent by reason of being incapacitated.

(b) Sexual abuse in the first degree is a Class C felony.

Sexual abuse in the second degree (AL Code § 13A-6-67 (2019)):

(a) A person commits the crime of sexual abuse in the second degree if he or she does either of the following:

- (1) Subjects another person to sexual contact who is unable to consent by reason of some factor other than being less than 16 years old.
- (2) Being 19 years old or older, subjects another person to sexual contact who is 12 years old or older, but less than 16 years old.

(b) Sexual abuse in second degree is a Class A misdemeanor, except that if a person commits a second or subsequent offense of sexual abuse in the second degree within one year of another sexual offense, the offense is a Class C felony.

Indecent exposure (AL Code § 13A-6-68 (2019)):

(a) A person commits the crime of indecent exposure if, with intent to arouse or gratify sexual desire of himself or herself, or of any person other than his or her spouse, he or she exposes his or her genitals under circumstances in which he or she knows the conduct is likely to cause affront or alarm.

(b) Indecent exposure is a Class A misdemeanor, except a third or subsequent conviction shall be a Class C felony.

Distributing a private image with intent to harass, threaten, coerce, or intimidate the person depicted (AL Code § 13A-6-240 (2017)):

(a) A person commits the crime of distributing a private image if he or she knowingly posts, emails, texts, transmits, or otherwise distributes a private image with the intent to harass, threaten, coerce, or intimidate the person depicted when the depicted person has not consented to the transmission and the depicted person had a reasonable expectation of privacy against transmission of the private image.

- (b) For purposes of this section, private image means a photograph, digital image, video, film, or other recording of a person who is identifiable from the recording itself or from the circumstances of its transmission and who is engaged in any act of sadomasochistic abuse, sexual intercourse, sexual excitement, masturbation, breast nudity, as defined in Section 13A-12-190, genital nudity, or other sexual conduct. The term includes a recording that has been edited, altered, or otherwise manipulated from its original form.
- (c) (1) For purposes of this section, a reasonable expectation of privacy includes, but is not limited to, either of the following circumstances:
 - a. The person depicted in the private image created it or consented to its creation believing that it would remain confidential.
 - b. The sexual conduct depicted in the image was involuntary.
- (2) There is no reasonable expectation of privacy against the transmission of a private image made voluntarily in a public or commercial setting.
- (d) It is a defense to distributing a private image if the distribution of the private image was made in the public interest, including, but not limited to, the reporting of unlawful conduct; the lawful and common practices of law enforcement, legal proceedings, or medical treatment; or a bona fide attempt to prevent further distribution of the private image.
- (e) A violation of this section is a Class A misdemeanor. A subsequent adjudication or conviction under this section is a Class C felony.

Sexual extortion (AL Code § 13A-6-241 (2019)):

- (a) A person commits the crime of sexual extortion if he or she knowingly causes or attempts to cause another person to engage in sexual intercourse, sodomy, sexual contact, or in a sexual act or to produce any photograph, digital image, video, film, or other recording of any person, whether recognizable or not, engaged in any act of sadomasochistic abuse, sexual intercourse, sodomy, sexual excitement, masturbation, breast nudity, genital nudity, or other sexual conduct by communicating any threat to injury the body, property, or reputation of any person.
- (b) Sexual extortion is a Class B felony.

Assault with bodily fluids (AL Code § 13A-6-242 (2017)):

- (a) A person commits the crime of assault with bodily fluids if he or she knowingly causes or attempts to cause another person to come into contact with a bodily fluid unless the other person consented to the contact or the contact was necessary to provide medical care.
- (b) For purposes of this section, a bodily fluid is blood, saliva, seminal fluid, mucous fluid, urine, or feces.
- (c) Assault with bodily fluids is a Class A misdemeanor; provided, however, a violation of this section is a Class C felony if the person commits the crime of assault with bodily fluids knowing that he or she has a communicable disease.

Domestic Violence Definition According to the Clery Act

Domestic Violence: The term “domestic violence” means a felony or misdemeanor crime of violence committed:

- By a current or former spouse or intimate partner of the victim.
- By a person with whom the victim shares a child in common.
- By a person who is cohabitating with, or has cohabitated with, the victim as a spouse or intimate partner.
- By a person similarly situated to a spouse of the victim under the domestic or family violence laws of the jurisdiction in which the crime of violence occurred.
- By any other person against an adult or youth victim who is protected from that person’s acts under the domestic or family violence laws of the jurisdiction in which the crime of violence occurred.

For the purposes of complying with the Clery Act, any incident meeting this definition is considered a crime for the purposes of Clery Act reporting.

Domestic Violence Offenses According to Alabama Statute

Definitions (AL Code § 13A-6-141 (2015)). As used in this article, the following terms shall have the following

meanings, respectively, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

- (1) **DOMESTIC VIOLENCE PROTECTION ORDER.** A domestic violence protection order is any protection from abuse order issued pursuant to the Protection from Abuse Act, Sections 30-5-1 to 30-5-11, inclusive. The term includes the following:
 - a. A restraining order, injunctive order, or order of release from custody which has been issued in a circuit, district, municipal, or juvenile court in a domestic relations or family violence case;
 - b. An order issued by municipal, district, or circuit court which places conditions on the pre-trial release on defendants in criminal cases, including provisions of bail pursuant to Section 15-13-190;
 - c. An order issued by another state or territory which may be enforced under Sections 30-5B-1 through 30-5B-10. Restraining or protection orders not issued pursuant to the Protection from Abuse Act, Sections 30-5-1 to 30-5-11, inclusive, must specify that a history of violence or abuse exists for the provisions of this chapter to apply.
- (2) **VIOLATION.** The knowing commission of any act prohibited by a domestic violence protection order or any willful failure to abide by its terms.

Domestic violence – First degree (AL Code § 13A-6-130 (2019)):

- (a) (1) A person commits the crime of domestic violence in the first degree if the person commits the crime of assault in the first degree pursuant to Section 13A-6-20; aggravated stalking pursuant to Section 13A-6-91, or burglary in the first degree pursuant to Section 13A-7-5, and the victim is a current or former spouse, parent, step-parent, child, step-child, any person with whom the defendant has a child in common, a present household member, or a person who has or had a dating relationship with the defendant.
(2) For the purposes of this section, a household member excludes non-romantic or non-intimate co-residents, and a dating relationship means a current or former relationship of a romantic or intimate nature characterized by the expectation of affectionate or sexual involvement by either party.
- (b) Domestic violence in the first degree is a Class A felony, except that the defendant shall serve a minimum term of imprisonment of one year without consideration of probation, parole, good time credits, or any other reduction in time for any second or subsequent conviction under this subsection.
- (c) The minimum term of imprisonment imposed under subsection (b) shall be double without consideration of probation, parole, good time credits, or any reduction in time if either of the following occurs:
 - (1) A defendant willfully violates a protection order issued by a court of competent jurisdiction and in the process of violating the order commits domestic violence in the first degree.
 - (2) The offense was committed in the presence of a child under the age of 14 years at the time of the offense, who is the victim's child or step-child, the defendant's child or step-child, or who is a child residing in or visiting the household of the victim or defendant. For purposes of this subsection, "in the presence of a child" means that the child was in a position to see or hear the act.
- (d) The court shall make a written finding of fact, to be made part of the record upon conviction or adjudication, of whether or not the act was committed in the presence of a child. If a defendant has a trial by jury and the jury finds the defendant guilty, the jury shall also render a special verdict as to whether or not the defendant committed the act in the presence of a child.

Domestic violence – Second degree (AL Code § 13A-6-131 (2019)):

- (a) (1) A person commits the crime of domestic violence in the second degree if the person commits the crime of assault in the second degree pursuant to Section 13A-6-21; the crime of intimidating a witness pursuant to Section 13A-10-123; the crime of stalking pursuant to Section 13A-6-90; the crime of burglary in the second or third degree pursuant to Sections 13A-7-6 and 13A-7-7; or the crime of criminal mischief in the first degree pursuant to Section 13A-7-21 and the victim is a current or former spouse, parent, step-parent, child, step-child, any person with whom the defendant has a child in common, a present household member, or a person who has or had a dating relationship with the defendant.

(2) For the purposes of this section, a household member excludes non-romantic or non-intimate co-residents, and a dating relationship means a current or former relationship of a romantic or intimate nature characterized by the expectation of affectionate or sexual involvement by either

party.

- (b) Domestic violence in the second degree is a Class B felony, except the defendant shall serve a minimum term of imprisonment of six months without consideration of probation, parole, good time credits, or any reduction in time for any second or subsequent conviction under this subsection.
- (c) The minimum term of imprisonment imposed under subsection (b) shall be double without consideration of probation, parole, good time credits, or any reduction in time if either of the following applies:
 - (1) A defendant willfully violates a protection order issued by a court of competent jurisdiction and in the process of violating the order commits domestic violence in the second degree.
 - (2) The offense was committed in the presence of a child under the age of 14 years at the time of the offense, who is the victim's child or step-child, the defendant's child or step-child, or who is a child residing in or visiting the household of the victim or defendant. For purposes of this subsection, "in the presence of a child" means that the child was in a position to see or hear the act.
- (d) The court shall make a written finding of fact, to be made part of the record upon conviction or adjudication, of whether or not the act was committed in the presence of a child. If a defendant has a trial by jury and the jury finds the defendant guilty, the jury shall also render a special verdict as to whether or not the defendant committed the act in the presence of a child.

Domestic violence – Third degree (AL Code § 13A-6-132 (2019)):

- (a) (1) A person commits domestic violence in the third degree if the person commits the crime of assault in the third degree pursuant to Section 13A-6-22; the crime of menacing pursuant to Section 13A-6-23; the crime of reckless endangerment pursuant to Section 13A-6-24; the crime of criminal coercion pursuant to Section 13A-6-25; the crime of harassment pursuant to subsection (a) of Section 13A-11-8; the crime of criminal surveillance pursuant to Section 13A-11-32; the crime of harassing communications pursuant to subsection (b) of Section 13A-11-8; the crime of criminal trespass in the third degree pursuant to Section 13A-7-4; the crime of criminal mischief in the second or third degree pursuant to Sections 13A-7-22 and 13A-7-23; or the crime of arson in the third degree pursuant to Section 13A-7-43; and the victim is a current or former spouse, parent, step-parent, child, step-child, any person with whom the defendant has a child in common, a present household member, or a person who has or had a dating relationship with the defendant.
 - (2) For the purpose of this section, a household member excludes non-romantic or non-intimate co-residents, and a dating relationship means a current or former relationship of a romantic or intimate nature characterized by the expectation of affectionate or sexual involvement by either party.
- (b) Domestic violence in the third degree is a Class A misdemeanor. The minimum term of imprisonment imposed under subsection (a) shall be 30 days without consideration of reduction in time if a defendant willfully violates a protection order issued by a court of competent jurisdiction and in the process of violating the order commits domestic violence in the third degree.
- (c) A second conviction under subsection (a) is a Class A misdemeanor, except the defendant shall serve a minimum term of imprisonment of 10 days in a city or county jail or detention facility without consideration for any reduction in time.
- (d) A third or subsequent conviction under subsection (a) is a Class C felony.
- (e) If the defendant has a previous conviction for domestic violence in the first degree pursuant to Section 13A-6-130, domestic violence in the second degree pursuant to Section 13A-6-131, domestic violence by strangulation or suffocation pursuant to Section 13A-6-138, or a domestic violence conviction or other substantially similar conviction from another state or jurisdiction, a conviction under subsection (a) is a Class C felony.
- (f) For purposes of determining second, third, or subsequent number of convictions, convictions in municipal court shall be included.

Interference with a domestic violence emergency call (AL Code § 13A-6-137 (2011)):

- (a) A person commits the crime of interference with a domestic violence emergency call if he or she intentionally hinders, obstructs, disconnects, or in any way prevents the victim from calling for assistance.
- (b) Interference with a domestic violence emergency call is a Class B misdemeanor.

Domestic violence by strangulation or suffocation (AL Code § 13A-6-138 (2019)):

- (a) For the purposes of this section, the following terms have the following meanings:
- (1) STRANGULATION. Intentionally causing asphyxia by closure or compression of the blood vessels or air passages of the neck as a result of external pressure on the neck.
 - (2) SUFFOCATION. Intentionally causing asphyxia by depriving a person of air or by preventing a person from breathing through the inhalation of toxic gases or by blocking or obstructing the airway of a person, by any means other than by strangulation.
- (b) A person commits the crime of domestic violence by strangulation or suffocation if he or she commits an assault with intent to cause physical harm or commits the crime of menacing pursuant to Section 13A-6-23, by strangulation or suffocation or attempted strangulation or suffocation and the victim is a current or former spouse, parent, step-parent, child, step-child, any person with whom the defendant has a child in common, a present household member, or a person who has or had a dating relationship with the defendant. For the purpose of this section, a household member excludes non-romantic or non-intimate co-residents, and a dating relationship means a current or former relationship of a romantic or intimate nature characterized by the expectation of affectionate or sexual involvement by either party.
- (c) Domestic violence by strangulation or suffocation is a Class B felony punishable as provided by law.

Violation of a domestic violence protection order; penalties (AL Code § 13A-6-142 (2019)):

- (a) A person commits the crime of violation of a domestic violence protection order if the person knowingly commits any act prohibited by a domestic violence protection order or willfully fails to abide by any term of a domestic violence protection order.
- (b) A violation of a domestic violence protection order is a Class A misdemeanor which shall be punishable as provided by law. A second conviction for violation of a domestic violence protection order, in addition to any other penalty or fine, shall be punishable by a minimum of 30 days imprisonment which may not be suspended. A third or subsequent conviction is a Class C felony.
- (c) In addition to any other fine or penalty provided by law, the court shall order the defendant to pay an additional fine of fifty dollars (\$50) for a violation of a domestic violence protection order to be distributed to the Domestic Violence Trust Fund, established by Section 30-6-11.

Dating Violence Definition According to the Clery Act

Dating Violence: The term “dating violence” means violence committed by a person who is or has been in a social relationship of a romantic or intimate nature with the victim. The existence of such a relationship shall be determined based on the reporting party’s statement and with consideration of the length of the relationship, the type of relationship, and the frequency of interaction between the persons involved in the relationship.

For the purposes of this definition:

- Dating violence includes, but is not limited to, sexual or physical abuse or the threat of such abuse.
- Dating violence does not include acts covered under the definition of domestic violence.

For the purposes of complying with the requirements of the Clery Act, any incident meeting this definition is considered a crime for the purposes of Clery Act reporting.

Dating Violence Offenses According to Alabama Statute

Dating Violence: According to Alabama statute, dating violence is considered domestic violence and is covered under the domestic violence definitions above. Since the Clery Act definition of domestic violence includes acts of violence committed by any person protected from that person’s acts under the domestic or family violence laws of the jurisdiction, and dating violence is covered under Alabama domestic violence definitions, all reports that meet the Clery definition of dating violence are counted as domestic violence in the crime statistics in this report.

Stalking Definition According to the Clery Act

Stalking: The term “stalking” means engaging in a course of conduct directed at a specific person that would cause a reasonable person to:

- Fear for the person’s safety or the safety of others; or
- Suffer substantial emotional distress.

For the purposes of this definition:

- Course of conduct means two or more acts, including, but not limited to, acts in which the stalker directly, indirectly, or through third parties, by any action, method, device, or means, follows, monitors, observes, surveils, threatens, or communicates to or about a person, or interferes with a person’s property.
- Reasonable person means a reasonable person under similar circumstances and with similar identities to the victim.
- Substantial emotional distress means significant mental suffering or anguish that may, but does not necessarily, require medical or other professional treatment or counseling.

For the purposes of complying with the requirements of the Clery Act, any incident meeting this definition is considered a crime for the purposes of Clery Act reporting.

Stalking Offenses According to Alabama Statute

Definitions (AL Code § 13A-6-92 (1994)):

- (a) **Course of conduct:** A pattern of conduct composed of a series of acts over a period of time which evidences a continuity of purpose.
- (b) **Credible threat:** A threat, expressed or implied, made with the intent and the apparent ability to carry out the threat so as to cause the person who is the target of the threat to fear for his or her safety or the safety of a family member and to cause reasonable mental anxiety, anguish, or fear.
- (c) **Harasses:** Engages in an intentional course of conduct directed at a specified person which alarms or annoys that person, or interferes with the freedom of movement of that person, and which serves no legitimate purpose. The course of conduct must be such as would cause a reasonable person to suffer substantial emotional distress and must actually cause substantial emotional distress. Constitutionally protected conduct is not included within the definition of this term.

Stalking in the first degree (AL Code § 13A-6-90 (2012)):

- (a) A person who intentionally and repeatedly follows or harasses another person and who makes a threat, either expressed or implied, with the intent to place that person in reasonable fear of death or serious bodily harm is guilty of the crime of stalking in the first degree.
- (b) The crime of stalking in the first degree is a Class C felony.

Stalking in the second degree (AL Code § 13A-6-90.1 (2012)):

- (a) A person who, acting with an improper purpose, intentionally and repeatedly follows, harasses, telephones, or initiates communication, verbally, electronically, or otherwise, with another person, any member of the other person's immediate family, or any third party with whom the other person is acquainted, and causes material harm to the mental or emotional health of the other person, or causes such person to reasonably fear that his or her employment, business, or career is threatened, and the perpetrator was previously informed to cease that conduct is guilty of the crime of stalking in the second degree.
- (b) The crime of stalking in the second degree is a Class B misdemeanor.

Aggravated stalking in the first degree (AL Code § 13A-6-91 (2012)):

- (a) A person who violates the provisions of Section 13A-6-90(a) and whose conduct in doing so also violates any court order or injunction is guilty of the crime of aggravated stalking in the first degree.

(b) The crime of aggravated stalking in the first degree is a Class B felony.

Aggravated stalking in the second degree (AL Code § 13A-6-91.1 (2012)):

- (a) A person who violates the provisions of Section 13A-6-90.1 and whose conduct in doing so also violates any court order or injunction is guilty of the crime of aggravated stalking in the second degree.
- (b) The crime of aggravated stalking in the second degree is a Class C felony.

Education and Prevention Programs

Each year, prior to matriculation, the university engages in comprehensive, intentional, and integrated programming, initiatives, strategies, and campaigns intended to end sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking that:

- Are culturally relevant, inclusive of diverse communities and identities, sustainable, responsive to community needs, and informed by research, or assessed for value, effectiveness, or outcome; and
- Consider environmental risk and protective factors as they occur on the individual, relationship, institutional, community and societal levels.

Educational programming consists of primary prevention and awareness programs for all incoming students and new employees and ongoing awareness and prevention campaigns for students and employees that:

- Identify sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking as prohibited conduct;
- Define what behavior constitutes sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking using definitions provided by the Department of Education, as well as local law and university policy;
- Define what behavior and actions constitute a lack of consent to sexual activity in the local jurisdiction;
- Provide a description of safe and positive options for bystander intervention. Bystander intervention means safe and positive options that may be carried out by an individual or individuals to prevent harm or intervene when there is a risk of sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, or stalking. Bystander intervention includes recognizing situations of potential harm, understanding institutional structures and cultural conditions that facilitate violence, overcoming barriers to intervening, identifying safe and effective intervention options, and taking action to intervene;
- Include information on risk reduction. Risk reduction means options designed to decrease perpetration and bystander inaction, and to increase empowerment for victims in order to promote safety and to help individuals and communities address conditions that facilitate violence;
- Provide an overview of information contained in the Annual Security and Fire Safety Report in compliance with the Clery Act.

The university has developed an annual educational campaign consisting of presentations that include distribution of educational materials to new students; participating in and presenting information and materials during new employee orientation; conducting events throughout the year to include presentations to specific groups, such as Athletics, Greek Life, and student organizations; peer-to-peer education activities; concourse outreach events; and targeted events during certain months of the year such as Domestic Violence Awareness Month, Sexual Assault Awareness Month, and National Stalking Awareness Month.

Each year, prior to matriculation, all new students are asked to take an education and awareness program for sexual violence prevention. For the 2020-21 academic year, the training was provided through a program called AlphaPoint, which educates students about consent, sexual misconduct, and the importance of being an active bystander in preventing sexual misconduct. For the 2021-22 academic year, a comparable EverFi sexual assault prevention training program is being offered to all incoming students. The Green Dot We.Auburn bystander intervention education program engages faculty, staff, and students as leaders for intervention around power-based interpersonal violence with the goal of reducing sexual violence, relationship violence, and stalking. The program engages all communities at the university for a unified prevention effort. A Green Dot is a moment in time when words, choices, and behaviors communicate intolerance of violence. Training and social media focus on giving campus community members tools to intervene, as well as building a culture around the premises that (1) violence will not be tolerated, and (2) everyone has a role in preventing violence.

Procedures the University Will Follow When a Crime of Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, Sexual Assault and Stalking is Reported

The university has procedures in place that serve to be sensitive to those who report sexual misconduct, including sexual assault, sexual exploitation, intimate partner violence (domestic violence or dating violence), stalking, sexual or gender-based harassment, complicity, or retaliation. Procedures include informing individuals about their right to file or choose not to file criminal charges; the availability of counseling, health, mental health, victim advocacy, legal assistance referrals, visa and immigration assistance, and other services on and/or off campus; and additional remedies to prevent contact between a complainant¹ and an accused party, such as no-contact directives and/or housing, academic, transportation, or working accommodations, if reasonably available. The university will make such accommodations, if the victim requests them and if they are reasonably available, regardless of whether the victim chooses to report the crime to local law enforcement. Students and employees should contact Safe Harbor victim/survivor advocates at 334-844-7233 or the Title IX Coordinator at 334-844-4794 for assistance with accommodations requests.

¹ This document will use "victim," "survivor," "accuser," and "complainant" interchangeably. The terms "perpetrator," "respondent," and "accused party" are also used interchangeably.

Procedures Victims Should Follow if a Crime of Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, Sexual Assault and Stalking Occurs

After an incident of sexual assault, domestic violence and/or dating violence, the survivor should consider seeking medical attention as soon as possible. In the Auburn area, survivors are encouraged to seek care at the Freestanding Emergency Department, located at 900 Camp Auburn Road, Auburn, AL 36832 (24/7); East Alabama Medical Center, located at 2000 Pepperell Parkway, Opelika, AL 36801 (24/7); or the Auburn University Medical Clinic located at 300 Lem Morrison Drive on campus (8:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. on weekdays when the clinic is open). These facilities have specially trained personnel called Sexual Assault Nurse Examiners (SANE), who can collect evidence following a sexual assault or domestic violence incident. Outside of the Auburn area, survivors can get information on the nearest facility that offers sexual assault forensic exams in the appropriate separate campus section of this report or by contacting the National Sexual Assault Telephone Hotline, 24/7 at 800-656-4673. Evidence may be collected through a forensic exam even if you chose not to make a report to law enforcement.² Survivors have the right to a free sexual assault forensic exam without having to provide their name or make a report to law enforcement if they choose not to do so. It is important that a survivor of sexual assault not bathe, brush teeth, douche, smoke, change clothing, or clean the bed/linen/area where they were assaulted if the offense occurred within the past 72 hours, so that evidence may be preserved that may assist in proving that the alleged criminal offense occurred. This evidence may also be helpful in obtaining a protection order. If survivors do not opt for forensic evidence collection, health care providers can still treat injuries and take steps to address concerns of pregnancy and/or sexually transmitted disease, as appropriate.

Survivors of sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking are encouraged to also preserve evidence by saving text messages, instant messages, social networking posts, or other communications, and keeping pictures, logs, or other copies of documents, if they have any, that would be useful to the university conduct process/investigation, to police, or to obtaining a protection from abuse order.

Victims/survivors of sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, or stalking are encouraged to report the incident promptly, if they so desire, to the Title IX Coordinator, Kelley Taylor, by calling, writing or coming into the office to report in person (317 Foy Hall, 334-844-4794) and local law enforcement (see page 4 for contact info). Reports to the university may also be made online at <http://auburn.edu/administration/aaeeo/title-ix/help/report/>. The Title IX Coordinator handles all formal complaints of violations of the *Title IX Sexual Harassment Policy* and *Policy Against Discrimination and Harassment*, regardless of where the incident occurs. The university will inform the victim about on-campus and off-campus resources, remedial and protective measures, and will discuss the victim's option to contact law enforcement, to pursue the university disciplinary process, or to pursue neither or both. The procedures set forth below are intended to afford a prompt response to charges of sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking; to maintain confidentiality and fairness consistent with applicable legal requirements; and to impose appropriate sanctions on violators of this policy.

While there is no time limit for reporting an incident of sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, or stalking to the university, certain statutes of limitations exist for the prosecution of crimes through the criminal justice system. As time passes, evidence may dissipate or become lost or unavailable, thereby making investigation, possible prosecution, disciplinary proceedings, or obtaining protection from abuse orders related to the incident more difficult. If a victim chooses not to make a complaint regarding an incident, he or she nevertheless should consider speaking with local law enforcement to preserve evidence in the event that the victim changes their mind at a later date.

If a formal complaint of sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, or stalking is made to the university through the Title IX Coordinator, below are the procedures that the university will follow, as well as a statement of the standard of evidence that will be used during any disciplinary hearing on campus arising from such a report.

² Under the Violence Against Women and Department of Justice Reauthorization Act of 2005, starting in 2009, states must certify that they do not "require a victim of sexual assault to participate in the criminal justice system or cooperate with law enforcement in order to be provided with a forensic medical exam, reimbursement for charges incurred on account of such an exam, or both."

Involvement of Law Enforcement and Campus Authorities

Although the university strongly encourages all members of its community to report violations of these policies to law enforcement, it is the survivor's choice whether or not to make such a report, and survivors have the right to decline involvement with the police. Safe Harbor survivor advocacy services on campus, available 24/7 at 334-844-7233, will assist any survivor with notifying local police if they so desire. Local law enforcement may be reached at the contacts provided at the beginning of this report.

What to Do if You Think You Were Drugged

Regardless of whether the victim chose to ingest alcohol or other drugs or they were unknowingly drugged, it is never the victim's fault if they are assaulted. Alcohol is the most common "date rape drug," and other drugs taken voluntarily may also render a person incapacitated. Predators may take advantage of this or may intentionally add something into a victim's drink without the victim knowing. Most drugs (other than alcohol) used to facilitate sexual assault (often referred to as "date rape drugs") pass through the body quickly, in as little as a few hours to a few days.

Some signs that you might have been drugged include:

- You feel more intoxicated than expected based on the amount of alcohol you consumed, especially if you are accustomed to drinking alcohol and know how it affects you.
- You remember having a drink but can't remember what happened after you drank it.
- You feel like you've had sex but don't fully recall the encounter and did not drink an amount of alcohol that would cause you to black or brown out.
- You wake up feeling fuzzy and can't remember all or part of the last night.

If you believe that you or a friend were drugged:

- Get immediate medical attention. Some date rape drugs can only be detected in urine from 3-12 hours after they are consumed.
- Call 911 or have a trusted friend take you to a nearby medical facility. In Auburn, you can go to the Auburn University Medical Clinic during their normal operating hours, to the East Alabama Medical Center Freestanding Emergency Department, located at 900 Camp Auburn Road, Auburn, AL 36832 (24/7) or to the East Alabama Medical Center emergency room, located at 2000 Pepperell Parkway, Opelika, AL 36801 (24/7).
- Do not urinate before going to the hospital or medical clinic, if at all possible. If you cannot wait, collect your urine in a clean container and bring it with you for testing.
- Report the incident to local police. Local law enforcement agencies and contact numbers for each Auburn University separate campus are listed at the beginning of this report.
- If you are a victim/survivor, contact Safe Harbor at 334-844-7233 for access to support services and more information on your options.

Incident Type Being Reported: Sexual Assault, Domestic Violence, Dating Violence or Stalking

Evidentiary Standard: Preponderance of the evidence, which means it is more likely than not that a policy violation occurred.

Initial Procedure Auburn University Will Follow:

1. Assess the survivor's safety and well-being and offer the university's immediate support and assistance.
2. Assess the nature and circumstances of the report.
3. Inform the survivor of the right to seek medical treatment and explain the importance of obtaining and preserving forensic and other evidence.
4. Inform the survivor of the right to contact law enforcement, decline to contact law enforcement, seek a protective order, and to have university assistance in doing so.
5. Inform the survivor about university and community resources, the right to seek appropriate and available remedial and protective measures, and how to request those resources and measures.
6. Inform the survivor of the option to seek Informal Resolution (where available) or Formal Resolution under

the university's procedures; ascertain the survivor's expressed preference (if any) for pursuing Informal Resolution, Formal Resolution, or neither; and discuss with the survivor any concerns or barriers to participating in any university investigation and resolution.

7. Explain the university's prohibition against Retaliation and that the university will take prompt action in response to any act of Retaliation.
8. Ascertain the ages of the survivor and the accused individual, if known, and, if either of the parties is under 19, determine whether the conduct must be reported under state law.
9. Communicate with appropriate university officials to determine whether the report triggers any Clery Act obligations, including entry of the report in the daily crime log and/or issuance of a timely warning, and take steps to meet those obligations.
10. If a decision is reached to initiate an investigation or to take any other action under the policy that impacts the accused, the university will ensure the accused is notified, receives a written explanation of all available resources and options, and is offered the opportunity to meet to discuss those resources and options.

Assistance for Survivors: Rights & Options

Regardless of whether a survivor elects to pursue a criminal complaint or whether the offense is alleged to have occurred on or off campus, the university will assist survivors of sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking and will provide each survivor with a written explanation of their rights and options (either a printed or digital copy).

Safe Harbor – Advocates for Sexual Assault Survivors

Auburn University strives to foster a community free of sexual assault and interpersonal violence. Sexual assault or intimate partner violence can have a profound impact on one's personal and academic life. If sexual assault or an act of interpersonal violence occurs, the university encourages individuals to access whichever reporting options and resources they so choose.

For many individuals, Safe Harbor can be the most beneficial first point of contact. Safe Harbor has trained victim/survivor advocates who have the ability to connect survivors with a variety of available resources. Through Safe Harbor, university personnel will assist survivors in evaluating options and identifying resources to help with immediate and long-term recovery.

Services are available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week for students and employees. To contact Safe Harbor, please call 334-844-7233 (SAFE).

Title IX Process Advisors

Title IX Process Advisors are a resource for individuals who are involved in cases that fall under the *Title IX Sexual Harassment Policy* and *Policy Against Discrimination and Harassment*. This team of faculty and staff are trained to provide support, guidance, and information about the policy and the accompanying procedures. They are available to both complainants and respondents and offer step-by-step assistance on an individual level. To contact a Title IX Process Advisor, please call 334-844-1384.

Protection Orders

Protection orders are civil court orders (issued by circuit courts) meant to provide protection and relief to victims of domestic violence.

In Alabama, a protection from abuse order is a court order issued based upon a petition filed under the Protection From Abuse Act (PFA), which provides for limited protection for persons who have been threatened, harassed, or physically abused by a spouse or former spouse; common-law or former common-law spouse; parent; stepparent; child or stepchild who has lived with the abuser; person with whom they have a child in common; person with whom they have or have had a dating relationship; or a present or former household member with whom the victim was engaged in a romantic or sexual relationship.

Victims who need protection may go to the local circuit court (in Lee County, the Lee County Justice Center at 1900 Frederick Road, Opelika, AL 36801) and request a Petition for a Protection from Abuse Order from the circuit clerk. Victims may file this petition without costs and without assistance from an attorney. However,

protection orders may involve long-term legal consequences or safety issues, so victims are strongly encouraged to contact a lawyer or the National Domestic Violence Hotline at 800-799-7233 before filing for a protection order.

Relief that may be requested includes:

- Order the victim's home or work address, phone number, or other related information deleted from all records filed with the court concerning the protection order.
- Restrain the defendant from committing or threatening to commit acts of abuse, or from harassing, annoying, telephoning, contacting, or otherwise communicating directly or indirectly with the victim or other designated persons.
- Order the defendant to stay away from victim's residence and place of work or other designated places or persons.
- Award the victim temporary custody of any minor children and restrain the abuser from removing the children from the victim's custody.
- Remove the defendant from the residence, regardless of who owns the residence.
- Prohibit the defendant from selling, disposing, destroying, hiding, or mortgaging mutually owned or leased real estate or personal property.
- Order other relief as necessary to provide for the safety and protection of the victim.
- A victim may request an emergency temporary protection order if needed. Otherwise a final protection order, if granted, is valid for one year or until the court-determined expiration date.

Getting a Protection Order

(for Protection Orders in Italy see the Ariccia - Joseph S. Bruno Auburn Abroad in Italy Section)

For assistance with obtaining a protection order, contact Safe Harbor, the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security, or the National Domestic Violence Hotline (800-799-7233) for the nearest domestic violence survivor advocacy services.

The survivor will need to go to court to get a protection order. Auburn University cannot apply for a legal protection order for the survivor. Criminal charges do not need to be filed and the stalker or abuser does not need to be arrested in order for a survivor to request a protection order. This is not a criminal matter. However, police reports documenting incidents of abuse can be helpful in obtaining the protection order.

Important things for survivors to say when testifying or making a statement in court:

- Provide very specific details when describing the stalking or abuse, including date(s), time(s) of day, and other details. Maintain a log of all behavior and provide it as a part of the protection order petition.
- Describe exactly what the stalker or abuser said and did.
- Describe the impact of the behavior on the survivor mentally and emotionally.
- State why the behavior caused fear and why a protection order is necessary.
- Describe all injuries caused as a result of the stalker's or abuser's behavior, to the survivor or anyone else, and any property damage caused by the stalker or abuser (including injuries to any children or pets, destruction to valued objects, etc.).
- Show the judge or magistrate any pictures of injuries or property damage.
- Show the judge or magistrate any communications from the stalker or abuser that caused the survivor to fear for their safety.
- For the protection order hearing, have any witnesses testify to the abuse, stalking, injuries, or property damage.

Important Information About Protection Orders

Once the protection order has been issued, survivors are advised to:

- Remember that a protection order is a piece of paper that must be respected by the stalker/abuser to be effective. It is also only enforceable after a sheriff's deputy or police officer has served it on the stalker/abuser. After it has been served, if the abuser or stalker does not comply with the order, call the police immediately (911 in the U.S.). If they arrive in time to witness the abuser's violation of the order, they can make an immediate arrest. If not, the survivor may need to get a criminal warrant from the

magistrate.

- Check the conditions of the order once it is issued. If there are errors, it is unclear, it has not been signed, or boxes don't appear to be checked, ask the clerk or advocate for help.
- Keep a copy with them at all times. This is important if the abuser/stalker violates the order and police or other authorities need to be contacted for assistance enforcing the order.
- Give a copy to the Title IX Coordinator, University Housing staff (if living in a university residence hall) and their supervisor at work (if employed).
- If children are included, make sure anyone responsible for them has a copy.
- If planning to or considering leaving the state, make sure to get a certified copy of the protection order from the clerk's office. Federal law requires recognition of one state's protection order by others.

In addition to a copy of the protection order, survivors should keep copies of any of the abuser's criminal convictions. These should be shown to the police officer, magistrate, prosecutor, or judge if the abuser violates the order.

Auburn University complies with Alabama law in recognizing orders of protection. Any student or employee who obtains a protection order from Alabama or any other state should provide a copy to the City of Auburn Police Division (or other local law enforcement, if not in Auburn), the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security, and the Office of the Title IX Coordinator. A complainant may then meet with local law enforcement or Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security personnel to develop a safety action plan, which is a plan for safety personnel and the victim to reduce risk of harm while on campus or coming and going from campus. This plan may include, where reasonable, but is not limited to: escorts, special parking arrangements, providing a temporary cell phone, changing classroom location, or allowing a student to complete assignments from home.

Enforcing Protection Orders

Orders issued by Alabama courts are enforceable under Alabama law. A willful violation of a protection order is a Class A misdemeanor (for the first offense) and the officer may arrest without a warrant when there is probable cause that the defendant has violated a valid protection order. Victims should immediately contact local law enforcement if their order is violated.

Out of State Orders

Under the federal Violence Against Women Act and Alabama law, valid protection orders should be given full faith and credit. This means that if a protection order is issued in another state and the victim is in Alabama, Alabama will enforce the valid protection order. Violations of valid protection orders from other states are enforced as if the order were issued by an Alabama court. Law enforcement may arrest without a warrant for any violation of the valid protection order and the punishment upon conviction is a Class A misdemeanor (for the first offense).

Protection orders from other states are valid if the defendant has had notice of the order and an opportunity to be heard, and the order:

- Includes the names of the parties;
- Contains the date the order was issued;
- Is not expired;
- Contains the name of the issuing court;
- Is signed by a judicial officer; and
- Contains specific terms.

Registration of Protection Orders

Survivors may register their out-of-state protection orders by taking a certified copy of the order to their local circuit clerk's office and requesting that the order be entered into the Alabama Protection Order Database. This is NOT a requirement for enforcement. However, survivors should always keep a copy of their protection order with them at ALL times to prove the existence of the order if the defendant violates it. Survivors are encouraged to give copies of the protection order to their local city police and sheriff departments.

University Protective Actions and Accommodations

Upon receipt of a report of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault or stalking, Auburn University will provide written notification to students and employees about accommodations available to them, including academic, living, transportation, protective orders and working situations. The written notification will include information regarding the accommodation options, available assistance in requesting accommodations, and how to request accommodations and protective measures (i.e., the notification will include the name and contact information for the individual or office that should be contacted to request the accommodations).

The university may issue an institutional no-contact directive if deemed appropriate or at the request of the survivor or accused. Upon the survivor's request and to the extent of the survivor's cooperation and consent, university offices will work cooperatively to assist the survivor with their health, physical safety, work, and academic status, pending the outcome of a formal university investigation of the complaint. For example, if reasonably available, a complainant may be offered changes to academic, living, working, protective measures, or transportation situations, regardless of whether the survivor chooses to report the crime to local law enforcement. Examples of options for a potential change to the academic situation may be to transfer the complainant or the accused to a different section of a class; complete a medical withdrawal; or make special arrangements for completing coursework in a non-traditional manner. Potential changes to living situations may include moving to a different room or residence hall. Possible changes to work situations may include changing working hours. Possible changes to transportation may include providing alternative parking arrangements for the survivor or assisting the survivor with a safety escort. Auburn University will also provide assistance with and/or information about obtaining resources and services such as counseling, health services, visa and immigration assistance, and assistance in notifying appropriate local law enforcement.

If warranted, Campus Safety & Security may issue a no trespass letter prohibiting the accused from being on any properties owned or controlled by Auburn University. If the trespassed individual violates the letter, they can be arrested for criminal trespassing.

To request changes to academic, living, transportation, and/or working situations or protective measures (referred to as supportive measures in the *Title IX Sexual Harassment Policy* and *Policy Against Discrimination and Harassment*), a victim should contact the Title IX Coordinator at 334-844-4794 or Safe Harbor at 334-844-7233.

Confidentiality

Additionally, personally identifying information about the survivor will be treated as confidential and only shared with persons with a specific need to know who are investigating/adjudicating the complaint or delivering resources or support services to the survivor. (For example, publicly available record-keeping for purposes of Clery Act reporting and disclosures will be made without inclusion of identifying information about the survivor, as defined in 42 USC 1395 (a) (20).) Further, the university will maintain as confidential any accommodations or protective measures provided to the survivor to the extent that maintaining such confidentiality would not impair the ability of the institution to provide the accommodations or protective measures.

The university does not publish the names of crime victims nor house identifying information regarding victims in the Department of Campus Safety's daily crime log, in the annual crime statistics that are disclosed in compliance with the Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act, or online. Victims may request that directory information on file be removed from public sources by request to the Office of Communications & Marketing at 334-844-9999. Regardless of whether a victim has opted-out of allowing the University to share "directory information," personally identifying information about the victim and other involved parties will be treated as confidential and only shared with persons who have a specific need to know (i.e. those who are investigating/adjudicating the report or those involved in providing support services to the victim, including accommodations and protective measures).

How to be an Active Bystander

Auburn University does not tolerate power-based personal violence, and everyone has a role in preventing it. Bystanders play a critical role in the prevention of sexual and relationship violence. They are individuals who observe violence or witness the events that could lead to violence. They are not directly involved but have the choice to intervene, speak up, or do something about it. We want to promote a culture of community accountability where bystanders are actively engaged in the prevention of violence without causing further harm. Bystanders may not always know what to do even when they want to help. Below is a list of some ways to be an active bystander. For further information regarding bystander intervention, contact the Division of Student Affairs Office of Health Promotion & Wellness Services at 334-844-1528.

- Dial 911 if someone is in immediate danger. This may include when a person is being physically abusive towards another, or the conflict seems to be escalating, and it is not safe for a bystander to interrupt.
- Watch out for all members of the Auburn Family. If someone looks like they could be in trouble or need help, ask if they are okay.
- Confront people who seclude, hit on, try to make out with, or have sex with people who are incapacitated.
- Speak up when someone discusses plans to take sexual advantage of another person.
- Believe someone who discloses sexual assault, abusive behavior, or experience with stalking.
- Refer people to on or off campus resources listed in this document for support in health, counseling, or with legal assistance.

Risk Reduction

With no intent to blame victims and recognizing that only abusers are responsible for their abuse, the following are some strategies to reduce one's risk of sexual assault or harassment (taken from Rape, Abuse, & Incest National Network, www.rainn.org):

- Be aware of your surroundings. Knowing where you are and who is around you may help you to find a way to get out of a bad situation.
- Try to avoid isolated areas. It is more difficult to get help if no one is around.
- Walk with purpose. Even if you don't know where you are going, act like you do.
- Try not to load yourself down with packages or bags as this can make you appear more vulnerable.
- Make sure your cell phone is with you and charged and that you have a way to pay for a safe ride.
- Don't allow yourself to be isolated with someone you don't trust or someone you don't know.
- Avoid using ear buds or headphones in both ears so that you can be more aware of your surroundings, especially if you are walking alone.
- When you go to a social gathering, go with a group of friends. Arrive together, check in with each other throughout the evening, and leave together.
- Trust your instincts. If you feel unsafe in any situation, go with your gut. If you see something suspicious, notify police at 911 (emergencies or crimes in progress), or at the non-emergency numbers listed in page 4 of this report.
- Don't leave your drink unattended while talking, dancing, using the restroom, or making a phone call. If you've left your drink alone, just get a new one.
- Don't accept drinks from people. If you choose to accept a drink, go with the person to the bar to order it, watch it being poured, and carry it yourself. At parties, don't drink from punch bowls or other large, common open containers.
- Watch out for your friends. If a friend seems out of it, is way too intoxicated for the amount of alcohol

- they've had, or is acting out of character, get him or her to a safe place immediately.
- If you suspect you or a friend has been drugged, contact local law enforcement by dialing 911 (112 in Italy). Be explicit with doctors so they can order the correct tests. Samples should be collected by professionals as soon as possible after the suspected consumption of the drug to get the most accurate results.
 - If you need to get out of an uncomfortable or scary situation, here are some things that you can try:
 - Remember that being in this situation is not your fault. You did not do anything wrong; it is the person who is making you uncomfortable that is to blame.
 - Be true to yourself. Don't feel obligated to do anything you don't want to do. "I don't want to" is always a good enough reason. Do what feels right to you and what you are comfortable with.
 - Have a code word with your friends or family so you can let them know you are in an uncomfortable situation without alerting the person who is making you uncomfortable. Your friends or family can then come to get you or make up an excuse for you to leave.
 - Lie. If you don't want to hurt the person's feelings, it is better to lie and make up a reason to leave than to stay and be uncomfortable, scared, or worse. Some excuses you could use are: needing to take care of a friend or family member, not feeling well, having somewhere else that you need to be, etc.
 - Try to think of an escape route. How would you try to get out of the room? Where are the doors? Windows? Are there people around who might be able to help you? Is there an emergency phone nearby?
 - If you and/or the other person have been drinking, you can say that you would rather wait until you both have your full judgment before doing anything you may regret later.

Adjudication of Policy Violations

Whether or not criminal charges are filed, a person may file a complaint under the university's *Title IX Sexual Harassment Policy* and *Policy Against Discrimination and Harassment*, alleging that a student or employee violated university policy.

Applicable Policies: *Title IX Sexual Harassment Policy* and *Policy Against Discrimination and Harassment*

Decision-Making Process: Preponderance of the evidence standard will be used for determining if a violation of the institution's misconduct policy related to incidents of Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, Sexual Assault and Stalking occurred. This means that it is more likely than not that a policy violation occurred.

Anticipated Timeline for Resolution: Investigations will be completed in a reasonably prompt and equitable manner.

Resolution Options: Informal Resolution, Administrative Adjudication

How to File a Disciplinary Complaint Under this Policy

The university urges anyone who becomes aware of an incident of Prohibited Conduct under the *Title IX Sexual Harassment Policy* or *Policy Against Discrimination and Harassment* to report the incident immediately to the university through one of the following options:

Major Steps in Policy:

1. The Title IX Coordinator conducts an initial assessment of the report, including discussion with the complainant about health and safety concerns, options, and resources.
2. Resources and protective measures (called supportive measures in the policies) are provided, as appropriate and requested.
3. If the complainant wishes to pursue Informal or Formal action, they must submit a Formal Complaint to the Title IX Coordinator. If the Title IX Coordinator determines that the university's obligations to the health and safety of the complainant and other members of the university community require that informal or formal action be pursued, the Title IX Coordinator may submit a Formal Complaint on behalf of the university. Informal or formal resolution is pursued based on the nature of the report and input from the complainant. Informal resolution can only be pursued if both parties consent to that form of resolution. In the case of a Formal Complaint being submitted by the Title IX Coordinator, the Title IX Coordinator and Respondent must both agree to the Informal Resolution process.
4. The following steps are completed for a formal resolution:
 - a. Formal Complaint
 - b. Investigation
 - c. Sharing of all relevant evidence with parties for review
 - d. Final Investigation Report that includes a summary of all relevant evidence sent to parties & Title IX Coordinator
 - e. Hearing Officer Notification to Parties
 - f. Pre-Hearing Conference
 - g. Live Hearing with Hearing Officer held virtually
 - h. Appeal Panel Review (if appealed): Paper review only
 - i. Sanction

Reports of all sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking made to Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security will automatically be referred to the Title IX Coordinator for investigation regardless of whether the complainant chooses to pursue criminal charges. The complainant may choose not to participate in the investigation, which may limit the ability of the university to eliminate or address the conduct. When a complainant does not consent to the disclosure of his or her name or other identifying information to the alleged perpetrator, the university's ability to respond to the complaint may be limited.

The university's disciplinary process for allegations of dating violence, domestic violence, stalking and sexual assault, is consistent with the university's policy and will include a prompt, fair, and impartial initial investigation and final resolution process transparent to the accuser and the accused. The proceedings timeframe allows for extensions for good cause, with notice to the accuser and the accused of the delay and the reason for the delay. The Title IX coordinator, deputy Title IX coordinators, sexual misconduct officer, and

investigators are trained annually on the issues related to sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking and taught how to conduct an investigation and hearing process that protects the safety of the survivor and promotes accountability while protecting due process. University policy provides the following expectations for complainants and respondents as part of the *The Title IX Sexual Harassment Policy and Policy Against Discrimination and Harassment*:

- Prompt and equitable resolution of allegations of violations of the *The Title IX Sexual Harassment Policy and Policy Against Discrimination and Harassment*;
- Privacy in accordance with university policy and any legal requirements;
- Reasonably available supportive measures;
- Freedom from Retaliation for making a good faith report of Prohibited Conduct or participating in any proceeding under the Policy;
- The responsibility to refrain from Retaliation directed against any person for making a good faith report of Prohibited Conduct or participating in any proceeding under the Policy;
- The responsibility to provide truthful information in connection with any report, investigation, or resolution of Prohibited Conduct under the Policy or these Procedures;
- Timely notice of any meeting or proceeding at which the party's presence is expected under these Procedures;
- The opportunity to have an advisor of choice, including the right to have that advisor attend any meeting or proceeding at which the party's presence is expected under these Procedures;
- Written notice of an investigation, including notice of potential Policy violations and the nature of the alleged Prohibited Conduct;
- The institutional disciplinary procedures will not be conducted by officials who have a conflict of interest or bias for or against the accuser or the accused;
- The opportunity to challenge the Investigator or any decision maker for actual bias or conflict of interest;
- The opportunity to offer or present information and identify witnesses during an investigation;
- Timely and equal access to complainants, respondents and appropriate officials to any information that will be used during (informal and formal disciplinary meetings and hearings) Informal or Formal Resolution proceedings and related meetings;
- The opportunity to be heard prior to the final determination of a Policy violation and the imposition of any sanction(s);
- Reasonable time to prepare any response allowed by these Procedures;
- Written notice of any extension of timeframes for good cause, and the reason for the extension;
- Simultaneous written notice of the results of any institutional disciplinary proceeding that arises from an allegation of dating violence, domestic violence, sexual assault, or stalking, including the determination of a Policy violation, imposition of any sanction(s), and the rationale for each;
- The opportunity to appeal the decision on the bases of procedural error that affected the outcome; new evidence that was not reasonably available at the time a determination or dismissal was made, that could have affected the outcome; or the Title IX Coordinator, investigator, hearing officer or administrative officer, as the case may be, had a conflict of interest or bias for or against complainants or respondents generally, or against the individual Complainant or Respondent, that affected the outcome.

Confidentiality

The university will protect the identity of persons who report having been victims of sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, or stalking to the fullest extent of the law and as previously mentioned in this document.

Where the Title IX Coordinator has determined that the university must proceed with an investigation despite a Complainant's request that personally-identifying information not be shared with the Respondent, that no investigation be pursued, and/or that no disciplinary action be taken, the Title IX Coordinator will make reasonable efforts to protect the privacy of the Complainant. However, actions that may be required as part of the University's investigation typically involve speaking with the Respondent and others who may have relevant information, in which case the Complainant's identity may have to be disclosed. In such cases, the

Title IX Coordinator will notify the Complainant that the University intends to proceed with an investigation, but that the Complainant is not required to participate in the investigation or in any other actions undertaken by the University.

Note that certain types of Sexual Harassment are considered crimes for which the University must disclose crime statistics in its Annual Security Report. These disclosures will be made without including personally identifying information

Sanctions and Protective Measures

In all cases, investigations that result in a finding of more likely than not that a violation of the *Title IX Sexual Harassment Policy* and *Policy Against Discrimination and Harassment* occurred will lead to the initiation of disciplinary procedures against the accused individual. University sanctions including those listed below may be imposed upon those determined to have violated this policy. Sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, stalking, and harassment are criminal acts which also may subject the perpetrator to criminal and civil penalties under federal and state law.

Possible sanctions for students found responsible for violating the policy include admonition, warning notice, reprimand, disciplinary probation, restitution, suspension held in abeyance, suspension, expulsion, and no trespass order.

Possible sanctions for employees found responsible for violating the policy include informal and formal counseling, written reprimand, written final reprimand, suspension with or without pay, demotion, transfer of position, removal of administrative appointment, recommended initiation of tenured faculty dismissal process, performance improvement plan-required education/training, loss of annual pay increase, loss of supervisory responsibility, termination of employment, and no trespass order.

Possible sanctions for third parties found responsible for violating the policy include termination of relationship with the university, withdrawal of privileges of being on university premises, and no trespass order.

The Title IX Coordinator or their designee will determine whether supportive measures should be implemented, and, if so, take steps to implement those supportive measures as soon as possible. Examples of supportive measures include, but are not limited to: a university order of no contact, residence hall relocation, adjustment of course schedules, counseling, a leave of absence, or reassignment to a different supervisor or position. These remedies may be applied to one, both, or multiple parties involved. Violations of the Title IX Coordinator's directives and/or protective measures are policy violations that may lead to additional disciplinary action. Supportive measures imposed may be temporary pending the results of an investigation or may become permanent as determined by Auburn University.

The university will disclose to the alleged victim of a crime of violence, or a non-forcible sex offense, the report of the results of any disciplinary proceeding conducted by the university against a student who is the alleged perpetrator of such crime or offense. If the alleged victim is deceased as the result of such crime or offense, the next of kin of such victim shall be treated as the alleged victim for purposes of this paragraph.

Registered Sex Offender Search Sites (sex offender registration is not required in Italy)

The federal Campus Sex Crimes Prevention Act, enacted on October 28, 2000, requires institutions of higher education to issue a statement advising the campus community where law enforcement agency information provided by a state concerning registered sex offenders may be obtained. It also requires sex offenders already required to register in a state to provide notice, as required under state law, of each institution of higher education in that state at which the person is employed, carries on a vocation, offers services as a volunteer, or is a student.

In Alabama, convicted sex offenders must register with local law enforcement in each county/municipality where the offender intends to reside, be employed, or attend school.

Drug-Free Campus and Workplace Policy Statement

In compliance with the Drug Free Schools and Communities Act, Auburn University publishes information regarding the university's educational programs related to drug and alcohol abuse prevention; sanctions for violations of federal, state, and local laws and university policy; a description of health risks associated with alcohol and other drug use; and a description of available treatment programs for Auburn University students and employees. A complete description of these topics, as provided in the university's annual notification to students and employees, is available online in the Drug and Alcohol Abuse Prevention Program at:

The full *Drug-Free Campus and Workplace Policy* can be found on the university's policies Web page at www.auburn.edu/policies. Below is a summary of the policy and program.

Standards of Conduct

The unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensation, sale, possession, or use of illicit drugs or alcohol by students or employees of Auburn University are prohibited at any time on any university property or at any university activity. No employee will report for work, will work, or be present in the workplace that is impaired by an illegal drug or by alcohol. No student, who is impaired by illegal drugs or alcohol, will attend classes or any other university activity.

Local law enforcement enforces all liquor laws, including underage drinking violations, and all federal and state drug laws.

Disciplinary Sanctions

The university will impose sanctions (consistent with local, state, and federal law) upon all employees and students who violate these standards of conduct. Such sanctions may include but are not limited to:

- Referral for prosecution;
- Probation, suspension, or expulsion of students;
- Suspension or termination of employees.

Education and Treatment Programs

The university has developed a program to prevent the illicit use of drugs and the abuse of alcohol by students and employees. The program provides services related to drug use and abuse including information/education resources, self-help resources, and professional treatment. Educational and treatment programs are available to students and employees of Auburn University as outlined in the online Drug and Alcohol Abuse Prevention Program. A few key programs include:

Employee Assistance Program (EAP): Auburn University's EAP provides information and referral to employees about a variety of topics, including alcohol and drugs.

Student Counseling and Psychological Services (SCPS): SCPS provides assessment, education, and first-level intervention (individual & group counseling) for students with alcohol and other drug concerns. Referrals are provided for intensive inpatient or outpatient services when indicated. Educational information on alcohol and other drugs is available through SCPS. Staff is available to provide campus-wide educational programs upon request. Additional educational resources/links are available at www.auburn.edu/scps. Click on the "Mental Health Screening" link under the "Outreach" menu.

Private Alcohol and Drug Treatment Programs: A number of private programs are operated in proximity to Auburn University, throughout Alabama, and in neighboring states. Information may be obtained from the above referral sources.

Preparation of the Annual Disclosure of Clery Act Crime Statistics

The crime statistics in each separate campus section are provided in compliance with the Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act. Crime statistics include reports made in good faith which are collected from the City of Auburn Police Division and other law enforcement agencies, the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security, and designated “campus security authorities” as defined under the Clery Act. Statistics are compiled and published by the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security. For statistical purposes, crime statistics reported to any of these sources are recorded in the calendar year the crime was reported.

A comprehensive list of all law enforcement agencies exercising jurisdiction over properties owned or controlled by Auburn University is maintained by the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security. Each year, requests are sent to each of these agencies requesting crime statistics for the previous calendar year. Follow up phone calls are placed to any non-reporting agency and documented for reporting purposes.

Additionally, campus security authorities (as previously defined in this report) are contacted at least annually to request any crime reports for the previous calendar year that may have not previously been submitted to the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security. Referrals for disciplinary action are requested from the university’s Title IX Coordinator, Office of Student Conduct, University Housing and Human Resources.

Once all statistics are gathered from each reporting source, they are compiled, reviewed, and published in the Annual Security & Fire Safety Report.

Clery Act Reporting Definitions

The Clery Act specifies the categories of crimes and specific geographic locations that must be included in annual crime statistics. This allows students, parents, and employees to make reasonable comparisons of crime rates at different institutions.

Geographic Locations Included

For purposes of reporting statistics, the university must count criminal offenses according to where they occur. There are four geographic locations for which statistics must be reported. These include:

On Campus: (1) Any building or property owned or controlled by an institution within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area (generally within one mile of the edge of the core of campus) and used by the institution in direct support of, or in a manner related to, the institution’s educational purposes, including residence halls; and (2) any building or property that is within or reasonably contiguous to the area identified in paragraph (1), that is owned by the institution but controlled by another person, is frequently used by students, and supports institutional purposes (such as a food or retail vendor).

On-Campus Student Housing Facilities: Any student housing facility that is owned or controlled by the institution, or is located on property that is owned or controlled by the institution, and is within the reasonably contiguous geographic area that makes up the campus is considered an on-campus student housing facility. This includes houses of recognized fraternities where the land is owned by the university, but the building is owned by the fraternity.

Crime statistics for on-campus student housing facilities must be reported as a subset of the on-campus totals (i.e. they are included in both on-campus and on-campus student housing facility categories).

Noncampus: (1) Any building or property owned or controlled by a student organization that is officially recognized by the institution; or (2) any building or property owned or controlled by an institution that is used

in direct support of, or in relation to, the institution's educational purposes, is frequently used by students, and is not within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area of the institution. This includes houses of recognized fraternities where the land and building are both privately owned.

Public Property: All public property, including thoroughfares, streets, sidewalks, parking facilities, and recreation facilities, that is within the campus, or immediately adjacent to and accessible from the campus. This generally includes, but is not limited to, public streets bordering the campus and the sidewalk on both sides of the street.

Definitions of Reportable Crimes

Primary Crimes

Murder/Non-Negligent Manslaughter: The willful (non-negligent) killing of one human being by another. Any death caused by injuries sustained in a fight, argument, quarrel, assault, or commission of a crime is classified as Murder and Non-negligent Manslaughter. Do NOT count suicides, fetal deaths, traffic fatalities, accidental deaths, attempted murder, or justifiable homicide. Count one offense per victim.

Manslaughter by Negligence: The killing of another person through gross negligence. Do NOT count deaths of persons due to their own negligence, accidental deaths not resulting from gross negligence, or traffic fatalities. Count one offense per victim.

Sexual Assault (Sex Offenses) – Any sexual act directed against another person, without consent of the victim, including instances where the victim is incapable of giving consent. Include attempted and completed sexual assaults of the following four types. Count one offense per victim.

- **Rape:** The penetration, no matter how slight, of the vagina or anus with any body part or object, or oral penetration by a sex organ of another person, without the consent of the victim.
- **Fondling:** The touching of the private body parts of another person for the purpose of sexual gratification, without the consent of the victim, including instances where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her age or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental incapacity.
- **Incest:** Sexual intercourse between persons who are related to each other within the degrees wherein marriage is prohibited by law.
- **Statutory Rape:** Sexual intercourse with a person who is under the statutory age of consent.

Robbery: The taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear. Count one offense for each distinct operation (i.e. incident), including attempts.

Aggravated Assault: An unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault is usually accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. Include assaults or attempts to kill or murder, poisoning (including use of date rape drugs), assault with a dangerous or deadly weapon (or any other item that becomes one in the commission of a crime), maiming, mayhem, assault with explosives, and assault with disease. Count one offense per victim.

Burglary: The unlawful entry of a structure (four walls, a roof, and a door) to commit a felony or a theft. For reporting purposes this definition includes: unlawful entry with intent to commit a larceny or a felony; breaking and entering with intent to commit a larceny; housebreaking; safecracking; and all attempts at these offenses. Count one offense per each distinct operation.

Motor Vehicle Theft: The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. Classify as motor vehicle theft all cases where automobiles are taken by persons not having lawful access, even though the vehicles are later abandoned - including joy riding. Include any self-propelled vehicle that runs on land surface and not on rails, such as sport utility vehicles, automobiles, trucks, buses, golf carts, trail bikes, mopeds, self-propelled motor homes, motorcycles, motor scooters, motorized wheelchairs, all-terrain vehicles, and snowmobiles. Count one offense for each stolen vehicle.

Arson: Any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, or personal property of another, etc. Count one offense for each distinct incident of arson occurring on Clery geography.

Domestic Violence: A felony or misdemeanor crime of violence committed:

- By a current or former spouse or intimate partner of the victim;
- By a person with whom the victim shares a child in common;
- By a person who is cohabitating with, or has cohabitated with, the victim as a spouse or intimate partner;
- By a person similarly situated to a spouse of the victim under the domestic or family violence laws of the jurisdiction in which the crime of violence occurred, or
- By any other person against an adult or youth victim who is protected from that person's acts under the domestic or family violence laws of the jurisdiction in which the crime of violence occurred.

Dating Violence: Violence committed by a person who is or has been in a social relationship of a romantic or intimate nature with the victim. The existence of such a relationship shall be determined based on the reporting party's statement and with consideration of the length of the relationship, the type of relationship, and the frequency of interaction between the persons involved in the relationship.

For the purposes of this definition

- Dating violence includes, but is not limited to, sexual or physical abuse or the threat of such abuse.
- Dating violence does not include acts covered under the definition of domestic violence. In the State of Alabama, dating violence is covered in the definition of domestic violence; therefore, dating violence statistics for campuses in Alabama will always be zero.

Stalking: Engaging in a course of conduct directed at a specific person that would cause a reasonable person to:

- Fear for the person's safety or the safety of others; or
- Suffer substantial emotional distress.

For the purposes of this definition -

- Course of conduct means two or more acts, including, but not limited to, acts in which the stalker directly, indirectly, or through third parties, by any action, method, device, or means, follows, monitors, observes, surveils, threatens, or communicates to or about a person, or interferes with a person's property.
- Reasonable person means a reasonable person under similar circumstances and with similar identities to the victim.
- Substantial emotional distress means significant mental suffering or anguish that may, but does not necessarily, require medical or other professional treatment or counseling.

Hate Crimes:

A hate crime is not a separate, distinct crime, but is a criminal offense that manifests evidence that the victim was intentionally selected because of the perpetrator's bias against the victim's race, religion, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity, ethnicity, national origin, and/or disability. Report statistics for hate crimes for the following classifications: murder and non-negligent manslaughter, sexual assault, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, motor vehicle theft, arson, larceny-theft, simple assault, intimidation, and destruction/damage/vandalism of property. If a hate crime occurs where there is an incident involving larceny, vandalism, intimidation, or destruction/damage/vandalism of property, the law requires that the statistic be reported as a hate crime even though there is no requirement to report the crime classification in any other area of this report.

Larceny-Theft: The unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another.

Simple Assault: An unlawful physical attack by one person upon another where neither the offender displays a weapon, nor the victim suffers obvious severe or aggravated bodily injury involving apparent broken bones,

loss of teeth, possible internal injury, severe laceration or loss of consciousness.

Intimidation: To unlawfully place another person in reasonable fear of bodily harm through the use of threatening words and/or other conduct, but without displaying a weapon or subjecting the victim to actual physical attack.

Destruction/Damage/Vandalism of Property: To willfully or maliciously destroy, damage, deface, or otherwise injure real or personal property without the consent of the owner or person having custody or control of it.

Arrests (or Citations) & Referrals for Disciplinary Action:

Weapon Law Violations (Carrying, Possessing, etc.): defined as the violation of laws or ordinances prohibiting the manufacture, sale, purchase, transportation, possession, concealment, or use of firearms, cutting instruments, explosives, incendiary devices, or other deadly weapons. This classification encompasses weapons offenses that are regulatory in nature.

Drug Abuse Violations: defined as the violation of laws prohibiting the production, distribution, and/or use of certain controlled substances and the equipment or devices utilized in their preparation and/or use. The unlawful cultivation, manufacture, distribution, sale, purchase, use, possession, transportation, or importation of any controlled drug or narcotic substance. Arrests for violations of state and local laws, specifically those relating to the unlawful possession, sale, use, growing, manufacturing, and making of narcotic drugs.

Liquor Law Violations: defined as the violation of state or local laws or ordinances prohibiting the manufacture, sale, purchase, transportation, possession or use of alcoholic beverages, not including driving under the influence and drunkenness.

Unfounded Crimes:

Auburn University may withhold a reported crime from its crime statistics only if sworn or commissioned law enforcement personnel have fully investigated the reported crime and, based on the results of this full investigation and evidence, have made a formal determination that the crime report is false or baseless and therefore “unfounded.” According to Department of Education federal regulations, only sworn or commissioned law enforcement personnel may “unfound” a crime report for purposes of Clery crime statistics reporting. Auburn University is required to report to the Department of Education and disclose in this report the total number of crimes that were unfounded and subsequently withheld from its crime statistics.

Fire Safety at Auburn University

The mission of the Auburn University Department of Risk Management & Safety is to ensure the safety and welfare of university students, faculty, staff and visitors, protect the university infrastructure, and minimize disruption of academic programs through fire prevention and life safety code efforts. The department oversees fire safety programs for all Auburn University campuses.

The Clery Act requires campuses with on-campus student housing to publish an Annual Fire Safety Report. The section of this report for each separate campus with on-campus student housing includes the required Annual Fire Safety Report elements, including information about fire safety systems, policies, and statistics. The Department of Risk Management & Safety provided significant input into these portions of the report.

Separate Campuses

Auburn University has identified multiple separate campuses, listed below. For the purpose of Clery requirements, a location is a separate campus if it meets all of the following criteria:

- The university owns or controls the site;
- It is frequently used by students;
- It is not reasonably geographically contiguous with the Main Campus;
- It has an organized program of study; and
- There is at least one person on site acting in an administrative capacity.

A separate section of this report has been prepared for each separate campus. For campuses without on-campus student housing, information is provided about security and campus safety policies, procedures, and crime statistics specific to that campus. Sections about campuses with on-campus student housing contain the above information plus information about fire safety policies, on-campus student housing fire safety systems, and fire statistics.

Auburn University is a public, land-grant university with an 1,841-acre main campus, located in east central Alabama, within the city limits of the city of Auburn. 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Campus Security Authorities

In addition to the general categories of campus security authorities described earlier in this report, there are several preferred campus security authorities to whom crimes should be reported. For Main Campus, these include:

- Executive Director, Campus Safety & Security
- Director of AA/EEO and Title IX Coordinator (discrimination, harassment, sexual and gender-based misconduct)
- Director, Student Conduct (student conduct issues)
- Director, University Housing (student conduct issues in on-campus student housing)
- Executive Director, Campus Relations (employee conduct issues)
- Threat Assessment Team Leader (threats or concerning behavior)

Response to Reports

The City of Auburn Public Safety Department is available 24 hours a day to answer calls for emergency police, fire, or medical assistance. In response to a call, appropriate action will be taken by either dispatching an officer and/or other emergency services or asking the individual reporting the crime to go to one of the City of Auburn Police Division locations to file a report.

When a crime is reported to the Auburn Police Division, an Incident/Offense Report will be created. The City of Auburn Police Division is responsible for investigating criminal activity at Auburn University. Portions of the report are a matter of public record, but information containing personally identifying information (PII) may only be released to the public at the direction of the Police Chief. The victim will be asked to provide a statement. Witnesses and/or possible suspects may be interviewed. Evidence will be collected, where available. Auburn Police Division will earnestly attempt to keep victims informed of the progress of the investigation.

Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security receives accident, incident, and arrest reports, as well as non-traffic citations, from the City of Auburn Police Division for incidents occurring on the university's Clery geography each business day. The Department of Campus Safety & Security also receives reports of student arrests and serious incidents (to include acts of violence) involving students regardless of location. Certain details from reports received, or full reports, may be shared with the Division of Student Affairs for review and referral to the Office of Student Conduct for potential action, if the behavior documented is in violation of university policy. If sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, or stalking is reported, details from the incident report will be shared with the Title IX Coordinator for investigation, and personnel taking the report, including City of Auburn Police Division, will offer the victim a wide variety of services, detailed in the earlier section of this report on sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking.

Voluntary Confidential Reporting and Anonymous Reporting

Anyone who witnesses, or has been a victim of, a crime is encouraged to immediately report the incident to the City of Auburn Police Division by dialing 911, or 334-501-3100 (for non-emergency situations or delayed reports). Police reports in the state of Alabama are public records, meaning that police cannot hold reports of crime in confidence and thus do not allow voluntary confidential or anonymous reporting. The City of Auburn Police Division maintains a Crime Stoppers tip line that can be used for reporting security and safety-related concerns, or to provide tips about criminal incidents or behavior on campus or within the City of Auburn. Call or text Crime Stoppers at 334-246-1391.

The Clery Act requires Auburn University to include in our annual crime statistics disclosure all reported

crimes that fall into one of the Clery reportable crime categories and occur on our Clery geography. (See the earlier section of this report on Clery Act reporting definitions for more information about Clery reportable crime categories and geography.) Confidential reports for inclusion in the annual disclosure of crime statistics, and for assessment for a timely warning notice, generally can be made to those campus security authorities who are not members of the City of Auburn Police Division; however, if a violation of *The Title IX Sexual Harassment Policy* or *Policy Against Discrimination and Harassment* is reported, or if there is a potential for a serious or ongoing threat to the campus community, some information may be required to be shared with certain campus administrators. In all cases, every effort will be made to maintain the confidentiality of crime victims to the extent possible. Individuals are always encouraged to report incidents to the police so they can be properly investigated.

Timely Warning of Crimes

The executive director of Campus Safety & Security, or designee, will determine if a crime reported represents a serious or ongoing threat to students and employees, develop the content of the message, and initiate distribution. Timely warnings will generally be distributed to the Main Campus community via blast e-mail and Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security non-emergency social media outlets (Facebook and Twitter: @AuburnSafety).

Emergency Preparedness

What to Do in the Event of a Campus Emergency

If you have an EMERGENCY requiring police, fire, or ambulance, DIAL 911 without delay.

- When you call for emergency services, stay on the line and give the following information:
 - Your name, telephone number, and exact location.
 - The location of the emergency.
 - The nature and extent of the emergency (e.g. Are there injuries and how many?)
- Be informed and prepared in advance. Review emergency guidelines and building-specific plans, and do not wait until an emergency strikes to know what to do.
- Be aware of your surroundings and report any suspicious activities.
- Know the locations of fire alarm activation pull stations in your building and how to evacuate your building if the alarm is set off.
- Know the locations of severe weather shelter areas in your building and when to seek shelter.
- Emergency call boxes (also called “blue light emergency phones”) have been installed in nearly 200 locations around campus. The call boxes call 911 when activated. Once activated, call box speakers remain open until disconnected by the emergency services dispatcher. Call boxes are equipped with a blue light for identification, which strobes when activated. Locations are shown online on the campus map under “placemarks” at www.auburn.edu/map.
- Over 180 automated external defibrillators (AEDs) are available in public areas on campus for use in medical emergencies when a person is unresponsive and not breathing normally. These are fully automated and can be used by any lay person. Locations are shown online on the campus map under “placemarks” at www.auburn.edu/map.

Evacuation Procedures

Emergency response and building evacuation procedures are included in building-specific emergency response plans available through the AU Department of Campus Safety & Security. The Campus Evacuation Plan Annex to the Emergency Operations Plan covers specific planning considerations for a large-scale evacuation.

The decision to conduct a large-scale evacuation of campus would be an extreme measure and require university, city, and possibly mutual aid resources (local and state law enforcement and transportation services). The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security, in coordination with the City of Auburn Public Safety Department, is responsible for initiating any partial or campus-wide evacuations.

When deciding whether to conduct an evacuation, consideration will be made for the type of hazard or threat,

credibility of the threat, area of campus in danger, and ability to contain the threat to a specified area of campus. The campus community may be notified to evacuate on foot or by vehicle, depending on the nature and timing of the threat, as well as other hazards that may impact the safety of persons evacuating.

Communication of an evacuation order will be facilitated through the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security, using the AU ALERT system. Messages will include the nature of the incident and directions for the campus community, including when the evacuation will begin, how to evacuate (on foot or by vehicle), where to go, and how updates will be provided.

The method and direction of the evacuation route during a campus evacuation will depend on the nature and location of the emergency or disaster warranting the evacuation. Plans are a result of training and past experience directing large volumes of traffic off campus, as well as traffic studies performed by consultants. These plans also consider the number of officers and resources that will be needed quickly to facilitate a partial or full evacuation.

Once the campus is evacuated, a priority clearing approach will likely be taken in order to restore critical services first, such as public safety, housing, dining, and animal care. Thus, buildings may be opened in a phased approach. Once public safety officials decide it is safe to return, announcements will be made to return to normal operations.

Emergency Notifications

The City of Auburn Public Safety Department has the primary responsibility of responding to, and summoning the necessary resources to mitigate, investigate, and document, emergencies on campus. University resources can be requested through the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security. In addition, the City of Auburn Public Safety Department has the responsibility to determine if the situation does, in fact, pose a threat to the Auburn University community and to notify the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security when this determination is made. If a situation poses an immediate threat to the Auburn University campus community, the institution (via a trained member of the AU ALERT Notification Team, described later) will immediately notify the campus community or the appropriate segments of the community that may be affected by the situation.

The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security establishes and maintains emergency notification systems for the university and utilizes different methods of emergency notification depending on the nature of the incident or event, as further outlined below.

Notification Procedure

Upon confirmation by the City of Auburn Public Safety Department (Police or Fire Division) that a significant emergency or dangerous situation poses an immediate threat to the health or safety of members of the Auburn University campus community, the City of Auburn Public Safety Department will either immediately notify the campus community directly using the AU ALERT system or will notify the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security on-call supervisor to do so.

The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security may receive information regarding significant emergencies or dangerous situations from other sources as well, such as university administrators, other first responders, the Auburn University Medical Clinic director or public health officials (for public health emergencies) and the National Weather Service. In such cases, the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security will be responsible for confirming that a significant emergency or dangerous situation poses an immediate threat to the health or safety of the Auburn University community. Factors that are quickly considered in making this determination include the nature, timing, location, and anticipated duration of the threat, as well as the population and activities that may be impacted.

Upon confirmation of an immediate threat to the safety or health of the campus community, the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security will, without delay and taking into account the safety of the community, determine the content of the notification and initiate the notification system, unless issuing a notification will, in the professional judgment of first responders (including, but not limited to, the City of

Auburn Police Division, the City of Auburn Fire Division, and Emergency Medical Services), compromise the efforts to assist a victim or to contain, respond to, or otherwise mitigate the emergency.

The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security is charged with coordinating communication of immediate threats to the Auburn University community, or to the appropriate segment(s) of the community that may be affected, and has developed pre-written templates that can quickly be utilized for initial notification of protective actions needed. A member of the AU ALERT Notification Team, which consists of designated and trained members of the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security and the City of Auburn Public Safety Department, will determine the content of the initial notification using all available information. The content will convey the nature of the threat and immediate actions to be taken by the campus community or affected segment thereof. The notification will be initiated by a member of the AU ALERT Notification Team. The Department of Campus Safety & Security will determine the content of all subsequent messaging providing updated information and protective actions to the campus community, as additional information becomes available.

AU ALERT System

Auburn University has numerous systems in place for communicating information quickly to university students, faculty, staff, and visitors. The main components of the AU ALERT System are briefly described below.

Text, Voice, E-mail and RSS Messaging

This contracted emergency notification system has the ability to notify students, faculty, and staff of critical information and situations affecting campus through the use of text and voice messages to multiple phone numbers, e-mail to multiple e-mail addresses, and messages via RSS feeds. This system makes immediate notifications across campus without delay. All active university e-mail addresses are automatically included in the system. Students, faculty, and staff are encouraged to sign up with a phone number for this important service by logging into AU Access and clicking on the AU ALERT link located on the My Campus tab. Each user can register up to three e-mail addresses, three mobile phone numbers, and three “voice only” phone numbers to receive alerts. Parents and others who are not directly affiliated with Auburn University who would like to receive text notification can sign up by texting the phrase AuburnFamily to 226787. Visit www.auburn.edu/aualert for more information about the system.

Social Networking

AU ALERT messages are also available through Twitter and Facebook (@AU ALERT). These methods are considered passive methods of communication. They can be used to supplement other notification methods, but should not be relied upon by students, faculty, and staff as the sole means of receiving notification. Parents are, however, encouraged to use these social media sources to monitor alerts. Parents and other off-campus constituents who are interested in receiving notifications from AU ALERT can find detailed instructions at www.auburn.edu/aualert.

Outdoor Warning Sirens

Auburn University has eight voice and tone outdoor warning sirens on main campus. These sirens, sometimes referred to as “giant voice,” are used to notify the campus community of emergencies requiring immediate action. They are intended to reach those who are outside at the time of the notification. These sirens can broadcast any of 14 pre-programmed voice messages or can be used to broadcast incident-specific live public address messages. The outdoor warning siren system is tested on the fourth Wednesday of each month at noon (weather permitting) with a message that clearly states that it is a system test.

Tone Alert Radios

Tone alert radios have been placed in some regularly occupied campus buildings. The radios broadcast a warning tone and then specific information such as severe weather warnings or other pertinent information

regarding emergencies on campus. Each radio is issued to a point of contact within the building that can relay the information received to others in the building. Buildings that have an indoor mass notification system (i.e. public address capability) may not have a tone alert radio.

NOAA Weather Radios

Located in most regularly occupied buildings on campus, NOAA weather radios receive information directly from the National Weather Service. This information includes current weather and also any issued watches or warnings for Lee County, Alabama, where Auburn University's main campus is located. Each radio is issued to a point of contact within the building that can relay the information that is received to others in the building.

Building Fire Alarms/Mass Notification Systems

Fire alarms are in place to notify building occupants of possible fire dangers in the building. Upon activation, evacuate the building immediately. The fire alarm has a distinct tone that is not used for any other purposes.

Some buildings also have mass notification capabilities through the fire alarm system. In buildings with this capability, pre-programmed or live voice messages can be broadcast to provide verbal instructions to building occupants for any type of emergency. Some of these buildings also have scrolling message boards to convey the emergency messages in text format and dual strobe lights. When dual strobe lights are present, clear strobe lights indicate a fire emergency and amber strobe lights indicate an emergency message about something other than a fire.

Digital Signs

Electronic signage is installed and utilized in numerous university buildings to broadcast news and other information. Many of these are configured to receive and display alert messages during an emergency situation.

Desktop Alerts

A desktop alerting system is installed on most university-owned computers, including those in classrooms and computer labs. This system generates alerts on computer screens using a full-screen, prominent graphic that requires acknowledgement from the user. Students, faculty, and staff can also install the AU ALERT/Alertus Desktop Alert Client on their personal computers, which can be downloaded from AU Install (<http://www.auburn.edu/administration/campus-safety/aualert/>).

Push Notification

AU ALERT messages are also sent to the Auburn Safety mobile app via push notification. This is one of the fastest ways to receive alerts. The app is free for anyone to download.

Additional Notification Methods

The university uses other notification methods such as posting of main campus alerts to the university's home Web page at <http://www.auburn.edu/>. During a large scale, ongoing emergency such as a disease outbreak, the university may use the website and/or university email system as primary methods of ongoing communication to the campus community or segments thereof. Emergency management personnel are routinely evaluating and adopting new technologies for emergency notification in an effort to most effectively reach members of the campus community during an emergency.

The messages for all systems listed above are developed and distributed to the university community by a member of the AU ALERT Notification Team. The Office of Communications and Marketing may also develop similar messages and distribute them to the news media and through other campus communication channels, as deemed necessary. The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security may communicate directly with the news media at the direction of the executive director of Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security.

Emergency Updates

Pertinent follow-up information will be disseminated as soon as it is available. For members of the campus community, updates and follow-up messages may be sent via any of the communication methods listed above. In addition, for members of the larger community (parents, neighbors, etc.), the university will post information during a significant emergency or dangerous situation on its Web page at <http://www.auburn.edu/> (either directly on the page or via a clearly identifiable link) and may also post them on Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security's AU ALERT social media sites (Facebook and Twitter: @AUALERT).

Campus Security and Law Enforcement

The City of Auburn Public Safety Department (Police Division) provides police services, including the investigation of criminal incidents, for the campus through a contract with Auburn University. Operating out of the Auburn Police Division University Precinct, sworn officers conduct investigations, write reports for all criminal offenses, and enforce all laws and university policies. These officers are armed and have full arrest powers. The University Precinct is collocated with the Department of Campus Safety & Security at 543 West Magnolia Avenue and is open 24-hours a day, year-round. Through contract with Auburn University, the University Precinct has a geographic jurisdiction to include the core of the main campus, including the College of Veterinary Medicine, plus an area to the north between West Magnolia Avenue and the CSX railroad. The precinct is divided into four beats (11-14) with beats 11-13 generally bounded by Shug Jordan Parkway on the west, College Street on the east, and the CSX railroad on the north. Beat 14 is situated primarily west of Shug Jordan Parkway, but extends no further south than West Longleaf Drive and no further west than Webster Road. A map of the police beats for the City of Auburn, including beats 11-14, can be found by selecting the Public Safety Police Beats Layer on the City of Auburn map at <http://webgis.auburnalabama.org/COAMap/>.

Unarmed, unsworn security staff members (employed directly by the Department of Campus Safety & Security or through contracted service) provide security services only. Certain armed, unsworn personnel with critical safety functions are employed by the Department of Campus Safety & Security. Unsworn personnel (both armed and unarmed) do not have arrest powers or enforcement authority on behalf of the university and do not conduct investigations, write reports for criminal offenses, or enforce laws. If they observe a law violation, they immediately contact City of Auburn Police Division who will investigate and write a report. The role of unsworn security personnel is to provide a security presence (mainly after hours and for special events), and to assess and monitor campus security. Unsworn security personnel have a geographical jurisdiction of properties owned or controlled by Auburn University.

Auburn University strives to maintain an excellent working relationship with local and state law enforcement agencies, including the City of Auburn Police Division, Lee County Sheriff's Office, and Alabama Law Enforcement Agency. Radio communication is in place with these agencies. While no formal written agreement exists with any law enforcement agency other than the Auburn Police Division, the university enjoys full cooperation and assistance from all other agencies with jurisdiction over university facilities on main campus and its multiple separate campuses.

Noncampus Organizations

The Division of Student Affairs maintains contact with recognized student organizations through the Office of Greek Life (fraternities and sororities) and the Office of Student Involvement (non-Greek student organizations). The majority of fraternities are located on campus and sororities are housed within designated on-campus residence halls. Criminal activity by students engaged in activities at noncampus locations (within the City of Auburn) of student organizations officially recognized by the university, including noncampus fraternities, is monitored and recorded by the City of Auburn Police Division. Reports associated with criminal activity at noncampus locations of student organizations are provided to the Department of Campus Safety & Security by Auburn Police Division. Certain details from reports received, or full reports, may be shared with the Division of Student Affairs for review and referral to the Office of Student Conduct for potential action, if the behavior documented is in violation of university policy.

Events registered by student organizations are shared with the Department of Campus Safety & Security by

the Division of Student Affairs. For events occurring in locations owned or controlled by the student organization, the Department of Campus Safety & Security requests crime statistics from local law enforcement agencies having jurisdiction. Any crime statistics or reports received for these locations are evaluated for timely warning and inclusion in annual crime statistics.

Night Transportation

There are several safe modes of night transportation for students, as outlined below. Students are strongly encouraged to utilize these resources and avoid the need to walk on campus alone at night.

Campus Night Security Shuttle Service

Destination: On Campus

The Night Security Shuttle offers a safe ride between on-campus locations from 6 p.m. to 7 a.m. seven days a week when classes are in session. Hours may vary for the evenings of home football games and official Auburn University holidays. Passenger guidelines are available at aub.ie/SecurityShuttle and are advertised to students regularly at outreach events and via social media. To obtain on-campus door-to-door service, call 334-844-7400 or contact the shuttle service through the free Auburn Safety app.

Security Escort Service

The City of Auburn Police Division offers, without charge, an on-campus security escort service when Tiger Transit and the Night Security Shuttle is not in operation. If you need an escort, phone Auburn Police Division at 334-501-3100. An officer will respond to your location and escort you to your campus destination. The Security Escort Service is available during university holidays and semester breaks.

Tiger Transit

Destination: Off Campus

Routes and schedules change periodically based on ridership and needs of the campus community. Get up-to-date information by visiting Tiger Transit's Web page at www.auburn.edu/tigertransit.

In January 2020, the Auburn Lyft Late Night Smart Ride service was established as another means of safe transportation for students from campus to their residence. The agreement with Lyft provides discounted rides to residential locations within a designated service area. Details are available at <http://auburn.edu/administration/parking/cwe.php>.

Access to and Security of Campus Facilities

The Auburn University campus is generally open to the public during normal hours of operation (7:45 a.m. to 4:45 p.m., Monday through Friday), with the exception of residence halls and specialized research areas. Schedules for campus buildings fluctuate depending on the nature of their operations, as well as events and class schedules. The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security and Auburn Police Division University Precinct offices, both located in the Campus Safety & Security Building at 543 West Magnolia Avenue, are open 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

An extensive security camera system is in place to monitor activity in and around many public areas on campus for the protection of students, faculty and staff. The Department of Campus Safety & Security maintains a Campus Security Operations Center, where security camera footage can be monitored and reviewed, if needed. While it is not feasible to actively monitor all cameras continuously, security personnel (both contracted and directly employed by the university) do staff the Campus Security Operations Center 24 hours a day to oversee camera operation and initiate response to security alarm and panic button activations. Auburn University's Video Surveillance Policy (<https://sites.auburn.edu/admin/universitypolicies/Policies/VideoSurveillancePolicy.pdf>) provides additional information about the use of video surveillance on campus.

City of Auburn Police Division officers patrol the university's academic and administrative buildings on a regular basis. Officers patrol the campus via foot, bike, golf carts, electric standup vehicles (T3s), and cars. Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security staff also patrol academic and administrative buildings after normal business hours on foot and golf cart. For information about the access protocol for a specific building, see the building manager, a department head or contact Facilities Management at 334-844-HELP (4357).

Access to residence halls is restricted to residents, their approved guests, University Housing staff, and other approved members of the university community with a legitimate need for access. Residents gain entry by

holding their phone to the card access readers, which allow access to the residence hall in which they live. In some residence halls, their AU ID card also provides access to their specific hallway within the building. Residents are issued keys for their individual suites and rooms. Guests of residents must be accompanied at all times by the resident whom they are visiting. For security reasons, residents should not allow individuals without authorized access into their residence hall. Door alarms are in place which activate when residence hall doors are propped open. When activated, these door alarms sound with a loud tone locally and also notify someone in the Campus Security Operations Center, which is staffed by security officers 24 hours a day. These officers can monitor the camera footage on the door where the alarm has been activated and either notify a security officer in the area to check the door or notify police if they believe there may be criminal activity or an emergency situation.

City of Auburn Police Division officers patrol the residence hall areas on a regular basis. Additionally, contracted security officers patrol the areas surrounding residence halls and campus parking lots after normal business hours to assess and monitor building security, and to provide a security presence.

Maintenance of Campus Facilities

Facilities and landscaping are maintained in a manner that minimizes hazardous conditions. Personnel from the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security and the City of Auburn Police Division regularly patrol campus and report malfunctioning lights and other unsafe physical conditions to Facilities Management for correction.

The Student Government Association, Auburn University Campus Safety & Security, City of Auburn Police Division, Facilities Management, and Office of Information Technology also periodically participate in nighttime campus safety walks, focusing on emergency phones, lighting, and landscaping issues. Other members of the university community are encouraged to report equipment problems or unsafe conditions to Auburn University Campus Safety & Security.

The mission of Student Counseling and Psychological Services is to provide comprehensive preventative and clinical mental health services to enhance the psychological well-being of individual students, as well as the broader campus culture. Students have access to a number of mental health services including:

- Individual counseling that provides an opportunity to explore concerns in a confidential, one-on-one setting;
- Group counseling that provides the opportunity to learn from others as group members work to solve problems in a supportive environment;
- Consultation to students, faculty, staff, and parents to assist in how to intervene with distressed students of concern;
- Outreach programs, seminars, workshops, and presentations on social, emotional adjustment, and psycho-educational issues;
- The Zen Den that houses biofeedback and relaxation technology to help students build stress reduction skills; and
- Psychiatric consultation for psychotropic medication evaluation and treatment.

Bicycle Safety

- All bicycles operated on campus are required to be registered online in AU Access. Registration is free.
- Wear a helmet. Seventy-five percent of deaths caused by biking accidents are a result of head injuries.
- Carry some form of identification (such as a valid driver's license or student ID) at all times.

- Observe all state traffic laws. Obey all traffic signals and signs. Bicycles ridden on public roadways are subject to the same laws as motor vehicles.
- Slow down and check traffic at all intersections, including parking lot entrances/exits.
- Ride bikes on designated bike paths where they are available. Otherwise, ride on the right side of the street. Never ride on the sidewalk.
- Auburn city ordinance prohibits riding a bicycle on sidewalks in downtown Auburn.
- University traffic regulations prohibit riding a bicycle on campus sidewalks of 10' or less in width.
- Avoid busy streets when possible.
- Be sure you have a front light and rear reflector at night, as required by city ordinance.
- Always park and lock your bike to a rack.
- Respect pedestrians and their right-of-way. Always let cars and people go first.
- When riding with others, travel single file rather than side-by-side.
- Maintain your bike – keep the brakes and other components in good working condition. Auburn Outdoors periodically offers bicycle maintenance courses (<http://www.campusrec.auburn.edu/outdoors/rental>).
- Cross at intersections. When you pull out between parked cars, drivers can't see you coming.
- Use bike lanes or designated bike routes wherever you can.
- Don't ride too close to parked cars. Doors can open suddenly.

Hate Crime Reporting

2020

- There were two reported intimidation crimes with a bias of race that occurred on public property. The first incident involved an individual using racial slurs and threatening to shoot someone after an argument outside a downtown establishment. The second incident involved an individual yelling negative comments at an anti-racism group and driving his vehicle near the group in an intimidating fashion.

2019

- There was one reported simple assault crime with a bias of national origin that occurred on public property. The incident involved an intoxicated person punching a ride-share driver and making a derogatory comment about the driver's national origin.
- There was one reported intimidation crime with a bias of race that occurred on campus. The incident involved an employee being given a plant with a noose on it.

2018

- There were two reported aggravated assault crimes with a bias of ethnicity that occurred in an on-campus student housing facility. These occurred in one incident and involved an ongoing dispute between roommates, which was also counted as two counts of stalking.
- There was one reported destruction/damage/vandalism of property crime with a bias of race that occurred on public property. The crime resulted from a road rage incident and occurred on a public road on the periphery of campus. It was also counted as one count of stalking.
- There was one reported intimidation crime with a bias of race that occurred in an on-campus student housing facility. It involved an ongoing dispute between roommates and was also counted as one count of stalking.
- There was one reported intimidation crime with a bias of sexual orientation that occurred in an on-campus facility. It involved unknown persons making derogatory comments and engaging in threatening behavior.

Units at The Beacon are still leased by Auburn University (Auburn Global) to house students. Their lease term began August 2015. Units at 160 Ross are leased by Auburn University Housing beginning in August 2020.

² In 2018 there were three separate fires in three distinct units of The Beacon at three distinct times during the year.

Description of On-Campus Housing and Fire Safety Systems

Quad Residence Halls

The Quad consists of ten residence halls with a total occupant capacity of 967. There are 463 double occupancy rooms and 41 single occupancy rooms.

Broun Residence Hall, 246 Mell Street

Built in 1938 and renovated in 1994, Broun Residence Hall is a three-story building with a basement. The building contains 23,316 square feet and can house 101 students. The structural members including floors, ceilings and walls are concrete with brick veneer. The fire alarm system was upgraded with newer panels and devices, and addition of a mass notification system, in 2020.

- All exit corridors and stairwells have a 1-hour fire rating.
- Exits are marked with illuminated exit signs and emergency lighting is provided in corridors and stairwells.
- All bedrooms and common areas are equipped with addressable smoke detectors that are monitored by an addressable fire alarm system. The fire alarm system is monitored 24/7 in a central location.

- An automatic sprinkler and standpipe system are provided.
- Portable fire extinguishers are provided in all exit corridors.
- Fire evacuation maps are posted inside each bedroom, at elevator lobbies and stairwell entrances.

Dowdell Residence Hall, 266 Mell Street

Built in 1957 and renovated in 1999, Dowdell Hall is a three-story building with a basement. The building contains 23,576 square feet and can house 104 students. The structural members including floors, ceilings and walls are concrete with brick veneer. The fire alarm system was upgraded with newer panels and devices and addition of a mass notification system in 2021.

- All exit corridors and stairwells have a 1-hour fire rating.
- Exits are marked with illuminated exit signs and emergency lighting is provided in corridors and stairwells.
- All bedrooms and common areas are equipped with addressable smoke detectors that are monitored by a fire alarm system. The fire alarm system is monitored 24/7 in an off-site location.
- An automatic sprinkler and standpipe system are provided.
- Portable fire extinguishers are provided in all exit corridors.
- Fire evacuation maps are posted inside each bedroom, at elevator lobbies and stairwell entrances.

Glenn Residence Hall, 262 Roosevelt Drive

Built in 1957 and renovated in 1999, Glenn Hall is a three-story building with a basement. The building contains 23,552 square feet and can house 104 students. The structural members including floors, ceilings and walls are concrete with brick veneer. The fire alarm system was upgraded with newer panels and devices and addition of a mass notification system in 2021.

- All exit corridors and stairwells have a 1-hour fire rating.
- Exits are marked with illuminated exit signs and emergency lighting is provided in corridors and stairwells.
- All bedrooms and common areas are equipped with addressable smoke detectors that are monitored by a fire alarm system. The fire alarm system is monitored 24/7 in an off-site location.
- An automatic sprinkler and standpipe system are provided.
- Portable fire extinguishers are provided in all exit corridors.
- Fire evacuation maps are posted inside each bedroom, at elevator lobbies and stairwell entrances.

Harper Residence Hall, 226 Mell Street

Built in 1938 and renovated in 1994, Harper Hall is a three-story building with a basement. The building contains 20,868 square feet and can house 78 students. The structural members including floors, ceilings and walls are concrete with brick veneer. The fire alarm system was upgraded with newer panels and devices, and addition of a mass notification system, in 2020.

- All exit corridors and stairwells have a 1-hour fire rating.
- Exits are marked with illuminated exit signs and emergency lighting is provided in corridors and stairwells.
- All bedrooms and common areas are equipped with addressable smoke detectors that are monitored by an addressable fire alarm system. The fire alarm system is monitored 24/7 in a central location.
- An automatic sprinkler and standpipe system are provided.
- Portable fire extinguishers are provided in all exit corridors.
- Fire evacuation maps are posted inside each bedroom, at elevator lobbies and stairwell entrances.

Keller Residence Hall, 329 Quad Drive

- All bedrooms and common areas are equipped with addressable smoke detectors that are monitored by a fire alarm system. The fire alarm system is monitored in a central location 24/7.
- An automatic sprinkler and standpipe system are provided.
- Portable fire extinguishers are provided in all exit corridors.
- Fire evacuation maps are posted inside each bedroom, at elevator lobbies and stairwell entrances.
- A building-wide mass notification system is in place, which can be activated by Campus Safety & Security personnel for a variety of emergencies.

Lupton Residence Hall, 300 Roosevelt Drive

Built in 1957 and renovated in 1997, Lupton Hall is a three-story building with a basement. The building contains 21,868 square feet and can house 88 students. The structural members including floors, ceilings and walls are concrete with brick veneer.

- All exit corridors and stairwells have a minimum of 1-hour fire rating.
- Exits are marked with illuminated exit signs and emergency lighting is provided in corridors and stairwells.
- All bedrooms and common areas are equipped with addressable smoke detectors that are monitored by a fire alarm system. The fire alarm system is monitored 24/7 in a central location.
- An automatic sprinkler and standpipe system are provided.
- Portable fire extinguishers are provided in all exit corridors.
- Fire evacuation maps are posted inside each bedroom, at elevator lobbies and stairwell entrances.

Owen Residence Hall, 330 Roosevelt Drive

Built in 1957 and renovated in 1998, Owen Hall is a three-story building with a basement. The building contains 23,085 square feet and can house 104 students. The structural members including floors, ceilings and walls are concrete with brick veneer.

Teague Residence Hall, 302 Quad Drive

- All bedrooms and common areas are equipped with addressable smoke detectors that are monitored by an addressable fire alarm system. The fire alarm system is monitored 24/7 in a central location.
- An automatic sprinkler system, standpipe system and fire pump are provided.
- Portable fire extinguishers are provided in all exit corridors.
- Fire evacuation maps are posted inside each bedroom, at elevator lobbies and stairwell entrances.
- An emergency generator is provided and supplies back-up power for all fire and life safety systems (i.e. fire pump, fire alarm system, emergency lights/exit signs).

Dowell Residence Hall, 320 PO Davis Drive

Built in 1965 and renovated in 1989, Dowell Hall is a three-story building with a basement. The building contains 31,445 square feet and can house 107 students. The structural members including floors, ceilings and walls are concrete with brick veneer.

Sasnett Residence Hall, 350 PO Davis Drive

Built in 1967 and renovated in 1990, Sasnett Hall is a six-story building with a basement. The building contains 60,898 square feet and can house 212 students. The structural members including floors, ceilings and walls are concrete with brick veneer.

- All exit corridors and stairwells have a 2-hour fire rating.
- Exits are marked with illuminated exit signs and emergency lighting is provided in corridors and stairwells.
- All bedrooms and common areas are equipped with addressable smoke detectors that are monitored by an addressable fire alarm system. The fire alarm system is monitored 24/7 in a central location.
- An automatic sprinkler system, standpipe system and fire pump are provided.
- Portable fire extinguishers are provided in all exit corridors.
- Fire evacuation maps are posted inside each bedroom, at elevator lobbies and stairwell entrances.
- An emergency generator is provided and supplies back-up power for all fire and life safety systems (i.e. fire pump, fire alarm system, emergency lights/exit signs).

Note – Graves and Toomer Residence Halls were vacated May 3, 2021. Dunn and Dobbs Residence Halls were vacated August 7, 2021. Residence Hall L (formerly Leischuck) was last used as a primary

residence hall May 3, 2021, but was used for quarantine and isolation until August 7, 2021. All these residence halls are scheduled for eventual demolition.

The Village Residence Halls

The Village consists of eight residence halls with a total occupant capacity of 1,666. Buildings share a fire pump.

Aubie Residence Hall, 201-H Wire Road

Stand Alone Halls

Auburn has two residence halls that are not part of a larger community.

- All exit corridors and stairwells have a minimum of 1-hour fire rating.
- Exits are marked with illuminated exit signs and emergency lighting is provided in corridors, stairwells and assembly areas.
- All bedrooms are equipped with electrical hardwired smoke alarms and the common areas are equipped with smoke detectors that are monitored by a fire alarm system. The fire alarm system is monitored 24/7 in a central location.
- An automatic sprinkler system, standpipe system and fire pump are provided.
- Portable fire extinguishers are provided in all exit corridors.
- Fire evacuation maps are posted inside each bedroom, at elevator lobbies and stairwell entrances.
- A building-wide mass notification system is in place, which can be activated by Campus Safety & Security personnel for a variety of emergencies.

Cambridge Residence Hall, 132 East Thach Avenue

Built in 1989, Cambridge Hall is a five-story building with two-person bedroom occupancy. It was acquired by the university in 2014. The building contains 75,440 square feet and can house 316 students.

- All exit corridors and stairwells have a minimum of 1-hour fire rating.
- Exits are marked with illuminated exit signs and emergency lighting is provided in corridors, stairwells and assembly areas.
- Bedrooms are equipped with smoke alarms. All other smoke detection devices are monitored by the building fire alarm system. The fire alarm system is monitored 24/7 in a central location.
- An automatic sprinkler system, standpipe system and fire pump are provided.
- Portable fire extinguishers are provided in all exit corridors.
- Fire evacuation maps are posted inside each bedroom, at elevator lobbies and stairwell entrances.

Off Campus Leases

Auburn Global leases rooms in one off-campus property (The Beacon) within one mile of the Auburn University main campus. Starting in 2020, Auburn University leases rooms in one off-campus property (160 Ross) within one mile of the Auburn University main campus.

The Beacon on South College, 1255 S College Street (Leased August 2015)

Built in 1999, The Beacon is a sixteen-building leased apartment complex with three -story structures containing two, three- and four-bedroom apartments of which Auburn University leases 284 rooms. The buildings are constructed with concrete floors and wood walls and ceilings.

- All exit corridors and stairwells have a minimum of 1-hour fire rating.
- Exits are marked with illuminated exit signs and emergency lighting is provided in corridors, stairwells and assembly areas.
- Bedrooms are equipped with electrical hardwired smoke alarms and the common areas are equipped with smoke detectors that are monitored by a fire alarm system. The fire alarm system is monitored 24/7 in a central location.
- An automatic sprinkler system is provided.
- Portable fire extinguishers are provided in all exit corridors.
- Fire evacuation maps are posted inside each bedroom, at elevator lobbies and stairwell entrances.

160 Ross, 160 Ross Street (Leased August 2020)

Built in 2015, 160 Ross is a single structure four-story apartment building containing two and four-bedroom apartments. The first-floor apartments are constructed with concrete walls, ceilings and floors. All other floors are constructed of gypcrete flooring and drywall ceilings and walls.

- All exit corridors and stairwells have a minimum of 1-hour fire rating.
- Exits are marked with illuminated exit signs and emergency lighting is provided in corridors, stairwells and assembly areas.
- Bedrooms are equipped with electrical hardwired smoke detectors with 9-volt battery backup. The sprinkler system is equipped with horns and strobes and is monitored by fire alarm system. All hallway corridors are equipped with smoke detectors that detect heat and smoke and are monitored by a fire alarm system.
- The fire alarm system is monitored 24/7 in a central location.
- Portable fire extinguishers are provided in all units and all exit corridors.
- Fire evacuation maps are posted at elevator lobbies and stairwell entrances.

West & Wright, 201 West Glenn Avenue (Leased August 2021)

Built in 2018, West & Wright is a single structure six-story apartment building containing two, three, four and five bedroom apartments. The apartments are constructed with concrete walls, ceiling and floors.

- All exit corridors and stairwells have a minimum of 1-hour fire rating.
- Exits are marked with illuminated exit signs and emergency lighting is provided in corridors, stairwells and assembly areas.
- Bedrooms are equipped with electrical hardwired smoke alarms and the common areas are equipped with smoke detectors that are monitored by a fire alarm system.
- Fire alarm system monitored 24/7 in a central location.
- Portable fire extinguishers are provided in all exit corridors.
- Fire evacuation maps are posted inside each bedroom, at elevator lobbies and stairwell entrances.

Fire Drills

Each university-owned on-campus student housing facility and fraternity residence has two mandatory fire evacuation drills annually conducted and evaluated by the City of Auburn Fire Division. Fire drills in residence halls and fraternities are required by Alabama law and all residents are required to participate if present. Evacuation is required in all instances. No residents may remain in the building during the fire drill. Residents must remain outside until cleared to return. Procedures for evacuation are explained at the first residence hall meeting which is held within the first few weeks of school.

Fire drills are more difficult to facilitate in the leased apartment units, because they are all located in privately-owned apartment complexes that have a mix of university-leased units and privately-rented units. With the exception of 160 Ross, the university does not control all units in the buildings where the units are leased.

Student Housing Policies on Portable Electrical Appliances, Smoking, and Open Flames

Appliances

- **Extension Cords:** The use of extension cords in the residence halls is prohibited.
- **Appliances (all halls):** Appliances prohibited in all residence halls include, but are not limited to: air-conditioning units, ceiling fans, halogen lamps, personal microwaves exceeding 700 watts, personal refrigerators exceeding 4.3 cubic feet, dishwashers, hot plates, personal washers and dryers, space heaters, appliances with open or exposed heating coils, and those which pose an electrical overload hazard.
- **Appliances (Hill, Quad, Cambridge):** In the Hill, Quad, and Cambridge residence halls, crockpots, toaster ovens, and toasters are prohibited.

Holiday Decorations

- The use of natural cut trees, branches, or greens is prohibited.

Fire Safety

- **Arson:** Regardless of size of fire or whether or not damage is caused, starting and/or maintaining a fire or causing an explosion in any residence hall or outside area is prohibited.
- **Candles/Incense:** The burning of candles and/or incense is prohibited. Candles with burnt wicks are prohibited.
- **Evacuation Procedures:** Interference with or non-adherence to emergency evacuation procedures in the residence halls during a fire drill are prohibited. Returning to the residence halls before the "all-clear" signal has been given after a fire drill is prohibited.
- **Fireworks/Explosive Materials:** The storage, possession, or use of any type of fireworks, firecracker, or explosive material in the residence halls or surrounding vicinity is prohibited.
- **Flammable:** The storage, possession, or use of flammable materials/liquids in the residence halls is prohibited. Gas grills and gas cylinders/tanks are prohibited.
- **Vandalism of Safety Equipment:** Removal, tampering with, and/or the disabling of fire alarm pull

stations, smoke or heat detectors, fire extinguishers, sprinkler heads, or other life safety equipment is prohibited.

- **False Fire Alarms:** Activating a fire alarm without due cause and/or falsely reporting a fire to the police or fire department is prohibited.

Smoking

- Smoking is prohibited within all University buildings, facilities, grounds, University-owned vehicles, and property leased to or managed by the University with the exceptions of:
 - Controlled research, or educational, theatrical, or religious ceremonial purposes, with prior approval from the Dean or Director responsible for the facility.
 - Privately-owned vehicles and locations outside of the Auburn University campus perimeter. Smoke-Free Campus maps can be found at <http://cws.auburn.edu/map/?smokefree>.

NOTE: *The campus map online does not depict all property that is leased or managed by Auburn University.*

- Littering the campus with remains of disposable tobacco products is prohibited.
- Assistance with smoking cessation for students, faculty, and staff is available through the Auburn University Medical Clinic, the Harrison School of Pharmacy, and the Office of Health Promotion and Wellness Services. More information can be found at <http://auburn.edu/smokefree>.

Candles

Candles and other sources of open flame are not permitted inside University buildings.

Cooking

There are common kitchens located in most residence halls. Do not leave cooking food unattended. Do not cook food (such as popcorn) too long in the microwave as it will burn, smoke, and set off alarms. The Fire Department is summoned automatically when the smoke alarms go off. Village residents: Do not use the popcorn button on your microwave.

Fire Safety

If you discover a fire, pull the nearest fire alarm and call the Fire Department immediately by dialing 911. Fire drills are required by Alabama law and all residents are required to participate if present. Any time an alarm sounds, please exit the building immediately and do not re-enter the building (even if the alarm silences) until told to do so by the Auburn Fire Department or a member of the University Housing Staff.

Fire Evacuation Procedures for All Campus Buildings Including Campus Housing

In the event of a fire or fire alarm:

- Exit the area immediately.
- Close all doors as you leave, taking keys and medications with you if possible. DO NOT delay evacuation to retrieve these items.
- Activate the closest fire alarm pull station along your evacuation route.
- Notify others around you as you leave.
- **Call 911** and report the emergency after you are out of the building and safe.

If the fire is small enough, you may attempt to extinguish it with a portable fire extinguisher, ONLY IF: The fire alarm pull station has been activated; 911 has been dialed; you are properly trained; and the fire is trash can size or similar.

- If leaving a room, feel the door with the back of your hand before opening it. Do not open any door that feels hot.
- If smoke is present, stay low. The best quality air is near the floor.
- Always use the stairs to exit upper floors.
- DO NOT use the elevator.
- Once the building is evacuated, do not re-enter it for any reason. Return to the building ONLY when instructed to do so by emergency responders or administrators.
- DO NOT return for personal belongings.
- Direct and assist visitors and persons with disabilities who appear to need direction or assistance.
- Notify the Department of Campus Safety & Security on-call phone (334-750-9795) that a fire has occurred AFTER you exit the building and 911 has been dialed.

If You Are Trapped and Cannot Evacuate

- Close any doors between you and the fire.
- If available, wedge wet towels or cloth materials along the bottom of the door to keep out smoke.
- Call 911 and notify the dispatcher of your location.
- Remain on the phone with the 911 dispatcher as long as possible.
- Break a window only as a last resort, such as needing oxygen to breathe.
- Use caution when breaking any window.

Response to Fire Alarms

- NEVER assume that a fire alarm is a false alarm.
- If the alarm sounds and/or emergency fire strobes begin to blink, evacuate immediately.

Fire Safety Education and Training Programs for Students, Faculty and Staff

University Housing provides a life safety class and portable fire extinguisher training annually for all hall directors, resident assistants, and area coordinators. General fire safety training is also provided to sorority officers and members housed in the Village Residence Halls.

Risk Management & Safety provides the following education/training to all other faculty, staff and students:

- Fraternity fire safety education is mandatory for fraternity chapter fire marshals and chapter presidents. This class is held at the beginning of the fall semester and the spring semester.
- Portable fire extinguisher training (upon request).
- Annual Campus Fire Safety Month (CFSM) Awareness Campaign which is an annual university event during the month of September that coincides with the National Campus Fire Safety Month, which is an initiative founded by the Center for Campus Fire Safety to raise fire and life safety awareness on campuses. The CFSM at Auburn University is hosted by Risk Management & Safety's Safety & Health Program, and the inaugural event was held in 2016. The goal of the event is to help students have a greater awareness of the dangers of dormitory, residence hall and/or off-campus housing-related fires, and the steps they can take to prevent them or, if need be, survive them.
- Other fire safety education as requested.

Reporting Fires

Students and employees should report that a fire occurred to the following persons and organizations:

In the event of a fire emergency, report the fire by dialing 911.

After the emergency, please contact the Department of Campus Safety & Security on-call phone at 334-750-9795. Campus Safety & Security is responsible for coordinating Auburn University's response to emergencies, including fires, and will notify Risk Management & Safety for follow-up on investigation, tracking, and recording on the fire log. This information allows us to take proactive measures to reduce future occurrences.

Plans for Future Improvement in Fire Safety

University Housing initiated a project to upgrade the fire alarm systems in Dowdell and Glenn Residence Hall with newer panels and devices, and addition of a mass notification system, that was completed summer of 2021.

Risk Management and Safety works collaboratively with the university's Facilities Management, University Housing, Athletics, and other administrative offices to ensure plans for future renovations or new construction projects include required fire protection systems and fire-rated building components. Risk Management and Safety assumes all inspection, testing, and maintenance responsibilities for new water-based fire protection systems, pre-engineered restaurant fire extinguishment systems, special hazard fire extinguishment systems, and portable fire extinguishers upon completion of building projects to ensure these systems are maintained in accordance with state fire codes and to ensure the operational integrity of each system.

Campus Security Authorities

In addition to the general categories of campus security authorities described earlier in this report, there are several preferred campus security authorities to whom crimes should be reported. For the AU Airport Campus, these include:

- AU Airport Director
- AU Airport Assistant Director

- Director of AA/EEO and Title IX Coordinator (discrimination, harassment, sexual and gender-based misconduct)

Response to Reports

The City of Auburn Public Safety Department is available 24 hours a day to answer calls for emergency police, fire or medical assistance. In response to a call appropriate action will be taken by either dispatching an officer and/or other emergency services or asking the individual reporting the crime to go to one of the City of Auburn Police Division locations to file a report.

When a crime is reported to the Auburn Police Division, an Incident/Offense Report will be created. The City of Auburn Police Division is responsible for investigating criminal activity at Auburn University. Portions of the report are a matter of public record, but information containing personally identifying information (PII) may only be released to the public at the direction of the Police Chief. The victim will be asked to provide a statement. Witnesses and/or possible suspects may be interviewed. Evidence will be collected, where available. Auburn Police Division will earnestly attempt to keep victims informed of the progress of the investigation.

Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security receives accident, incident, and arrest reports, as well as non-traffic citations, from the City of Auburn Police Division for incidents occurring on the university's Clery geography on a regular basis. The Department of Campus Safety & Security also receives reports of student arrests and serious incidents (to include acts of violence) involving students regardless of location. Certain details from reports received, or full reports, may be shared with the Division of Student Affairs for review and referral to the Office of Student Conduct for potential action, if the behavior documented is in violation of university policy. If sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, or stalking is reported, details from the incident report will be shared with the Title IX Coordinator for investigation and personnel taking the report, including City of Auburn Police Division, will offer the victim a wide variety of services, detailed in the previous section of this report on sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence and stalking.

Voluntary Confidential Reporting and Anonymous Reporting

Anyone who witnesses, or has been a victim of, a crime is encouraged to immediately report the incident to the City of Auburn Police Division by dialing 911, or 334-501-3100 (for non-emergency situations or delayed reports). Police reports in the state of Alabama are public records, meaning that police cannot hold reports of crime in confidence and thus do not allow voluntary confidential or anonymous reporting. The City of Auburn Police Division maintains a Crime Stoppers tip line that can be used for reporting security and safety-related concerns, or to provide tips about criminal incidents or behavior on campus or within the City of Auburn. Call or text Crime Stoppers at 334-246-1391.

The Clery Act requires Auburn University to include in our annual crime statistics disclosure all reported crimes that fall into one of the Clery reportable crime categories and occur on our Clery geography. (See the section of this report on Clery Act reporting definitions for more information about Clery reportable crime categories and geography.) Confidential reports for inclusion in the annual disclosure of crime statistics, and for assessment for a timely warning notice, generally can be made to those campus security authorities who are not members of the City of Auburn Police Division; however, if a violation of the *Title IX Sexual Harassment Policy* or the *Policy Against Discrimination and Harassment* is reported, or if there is a potential for a serious or ongoing threat to the campus community, some information may be required to be shared with certain campus administrators. In all cases, every effort will be made to maintain the confidentiality of crime victims to the extent possible. Individuals are always encouraged to report incidents to the police so they can be properly investigated.

Timely Warning of Crimes

The executive director of Campus Safety & Security, or a designee, will determine if a crime reported represents a serious or ongoing threat to students and employees, develop the content of the message, and initiate distribution. Timely warnings will generally be distributed to the AU Airport Campus community

via blast e-mail and in person via site administrators.

Emergency Preparedness

What to Do in the Event of a Campus Emergency

If you have an EMERGENCY requiring police, fire or ambulance, DIAL 911 without delay.

- When you dial 911 for emergency services, stay on the line and give the following information:
 - Your name, telephone number, and exact location.
 - The location of the emergency.
 - The nature and extent of the emergency (e.g. Are there injuries and how many?)
- Be informed and prepared in advance. Review emergency guidelines and building-specific plans, and do not wait until an emergency strikes to know what to do.
- Be aware of your surroundings and report any suspicious activities.
- Know the locations of fire alarm activation pull stations in your building and how to evacuate your building if the alarm is set off.
- Know the locations of severe weather shelter areas in your building and when to seek shelter.
- Know the location of the automated external defibrillator (AED) (in the lobby of the Terminal Building) and be prepared to use it if someone is unresponsive and not breathing normally.

Air Crash Alarm

When a crash occurs or AU Airport personnel are notified that a plane is coming in for an emergency landing, the crash alarm is activated. This notifies both City of Auburn and City of Opelika Communications, so that first responders from both jurisdictions can respond. In this case, the City of Auburn Public Safety Department maintains incident command while the aircraft is in the air. During post-accident response, incident command may be transferred to the Opelika Police Department if the aircraft comes to rest on the airfield in the city limits of Opelika. The responding agencies are responsible, in coordination with AU Airport site administration and the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security, for initiating any necessary protective actions to remove the campus community from danger.

Evacuation Procedures

Emergency response and building evacuation procedures are included in building-specific emergency response plans available through the AU Department of Campus Safety & Security.

The senior site administrator present (Airport director, assistant director, office manager, or designee), in coordination with the City of Auburn Public Safety Department or other first responders, is responsible for initiating any partial or campus-wide evacuations. The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security is available 24 hours a day at 334-750-9795 for assistance or consultation as needed.

When deciding whether to conduct an evacuation, consideration will be made for the type of hazard or threat, credibility of the threat, area of campus in danger, and ability to contain the threat to a specified area of campus. The AU Airport campus community may be notified to evacuate on foot or by vehicle, depending on the nature and timing of the threat, as well as other hazards that may impact the safety of persons evacuating.

Communication of an evacuation order should be facilitated through the senior site administrator present, using the AU ALERT system. Messages should include the nature of the incident and directions for the AU Airport campus community, including when the evacuation will begin, how to evacuate (on foot or by vehicle), where to go, and how updates will be provided.

The method and direction of the evacuation route during a campus evacuation will depend on the nature and location of the emergency or disaster warranting the evacuation. Once public safety officials decide it is safe to return, announcements will be made to return to normal operations.

Emergency Notifications

The City of Auburn Public Safety Department has the primary responsibility of responding to, and summoning the necessary resources to mitigate, investigate, and document, emergencies on campus. University resources can be requested through the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security. In addition, the City of Auburn Public Safety Department has the responsibility to determine if the situation does, in fact, pose a threat to the AU Airport community and to notify the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security when this determination is made. If a situation poses an immediate threat to the AU Airport campus community, the institution (via a trained member of the AU ALERT Notification Team) will immediately notify the AU Airport campus community or the appropriate segments of the community that may be affected by the situation.

The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security establishes and maintains emergency notification systems for the university and utilizes different methods of emergency notification depending on the nature of the incident or event, as further outlined below.

Notification Procedure

Upon confirmation by the City of Auburn Public Safety Department (Police or Fire Division) that a significant emergency or dangerous situation poses an immediate threat to the health or safety of members of the AU Airport campus community, the City of Auburn Public Safety Department will either immediately notify the AU Airport campus community directly using the AU ALERT system or will notify the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security to do so.

The AU Airport site administration or the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security may receive information regarding significant emergencies or dangerous situations from other sources as well, such as university administrators, other first responders, the Auburn University Medical Clinic director or public health officials (for public health emergencies) and the National Weather Service. In such cases, the AU Airport site administration will be responsible for confirming that a significant emergency or dangerous situation poses an immediate threat to the health or safety of the AU Airport campus community. Factors that are quickly considered in making this determination include the nature, timing, location, and anticipated duration of the threat as well as the population and activities that may be impacted. This may be done in conjunction with the AU Department of Campus Safety & Security and/or first responders, if needed.

Upon confirmation of an immediate threat to the safety or health of the campus community, the senior AU Airport site administrator, in consultation with Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security as needed, will, without delay and taking into account the safety of the community, determine the content of the notification and initiate the notification system, unless issuing a notification will, in the professional judgment of first responders (including, but not limited to, the City of Auburn Police Division, the City of Auburn Fire Division, Opelika Police Department, Opelika Fire Department and Emergency Medical Services), compromise the efforts to assist a victim or to contain, respond to, or otherwise mitigate the emergency.

The AU Airport site administration, with support from the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security, is charged with coordinating communication of immediate threats to the AU Airport campus community, or to the appropriate segment(s) of the community that may be affected. Pre-written templates are in place that can quickly be utilized for initial notification of protective actions needed. A member of the AU ALERT Notification Team, which consists of designated and trained members of the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security, the City of Auburn Public Safety Department, and key site administrators, will determine the content of the initial notification using all available information. The content will convey the nature of the threat and immediate actions to be taken by the campus community or affected segment thereof. The notification will be initiated by a member of the AU ALERT Notification Team. The Department of Campus Safety & Security will determine the content of all subsequent messaging providing updated information and protective actions to the campus community, as additional information becomes available.

Emergency Notification System

Auburn University has numerous systems in place for communicating information quickly to AU Airport campus students, faculty, staff, and visitors. The main components of the AU ALERT System that are used for notification to the AU Airport campus are briefly described below.

Text and E-mail Messaging

This contracted emergency notification system has the ability to notify students, faculty, and staff of critical information and situations affecting campus through the use of text messages to multiple phone numbers and e-mail to multiple e-mail addresses. This system makes immediate notifications to the AU Airport campus community without delay. All active university e-mail addresses are automatically included in the system for main campus alerts. Students, faculty, and staff are required to sign up with a phone number by logging into AU Access and clicking on the “Add/Update AU ALERT Contacts” link located on the My Campus tab. Visit www.auburn.edu/aualert for more information. AU Airport students, faculty and staff are encouraged to also subscribe to alerts that are specific to the AU Airport campus by clicking on the “Groups” tab in their AU ALERT profile and selecting to receive text and/or email alerts for the “AU Airport” group.

Tone Alert Radios

A tone alert radio is in place in the main reception area. The radio broadcasts a warning tone and then specific information, such as severe weather warnings or other pertinent information regarding emergencies on campus. The radio is issued to a point of contact within the building that can relay the information received to others in the building.

NOAA Weather Radios

A NOAA weather radio is in place in the main reception area. It receives information directly from the National Weather Service. This information includes current weather and also any issued watches or warnings for Lee County, Alabama, where the AU Airport campus is located. The radio is issued to a point of contact within the building that can relay the information that is received to others in the building.

Building Fire Alarms

Fire alarms are in place in some buildings to notify building occupants of possible fire dangers. Older buildings have smoke detectors only. If you hear the fire alarm or smoke detector, evacuate the building immediately. The fire alarm has a distinct tone that is not used for any other purpose.

Additional Notification Methods

The messages for all systems listed above are developed and distributed to the university community by a member of the AU ALERT Notification Team. The Office of Communications and Marketing may also develop similar messages and distribute them to the news media, as deemed necessary. The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security may communicate directly with the news media at the direction of the executive director of Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security.

Emergency Updates

Pertinent follow-up information will be disseminated as soon as it is available. For members of the campus community, updates and follow-up messages may be sent via any of the communication methods listed above. In addition, for members of the larger community (parents, neighbors, etc.), the AU Airport campus will post information during a significant emergency or dangerous situation on its Web page at <http://www.auoairport.com/>.

Campus Security and Law Enforcement

The City of Auburn Public Safety Department (Police Division) provides police services, including the investigation of criminal incidents, for the campus through a contract with Auburn University. Sworn officers conduct investigations, write reports for all criminal offenses, and enforce all laws and university policies. These officers are armed and have full arrest powers. The University Precinct is collocated with the Department of Campus Safety & Security at 543 W Magnolia Ave, and is open 24 hours a day year-round.

Through contract with Auburn University, Auburn Police Division provides law enforcement services for AU Airport Clery geography (on campus and public property) within Lee County, Alabama when working on behalf of Auburn University.

Unarmed, unsworn security staff members (employed directly by the Department of Campus Safety & Security or through contracted service) provide security services only. They do not have arrest powers or enforcement authority and do not conduct investigations, write reports for criminal offenses, or enforce laws or campus policies. If they observe a law violation, they immediately contact City of Auburn Police Division who will investigate and write a report. The role of unsworn security personnel is to provide a security presence (mainly after hours), and to assess and monitor campus security. Unsworn security personnel have a geographical jurisdiction of properties owned or controlled by Auburn University.

Auburn University maintains an excellent working relationship with local and state law enforcement agencies, including the City of Auburn Police Division, Opelika Police Department, Lee County Sheriff's Office, and Alabama Law Enforcement Agency. Radio communication is in place with these agencies. While no formal written agreement exists with any law enforcement agency other than the Auburn Police Division, the university enjoys full cooperation and assistance from all other agencies with jurisdiction over university facilities on main campus and its multiple separate campuses.

Noncampus Organizations

Students at the AU Airport campus have the opportunity to participate in recognized student organizations, coordinated through the Main Campus Office of Student Involvement. The Division of Student Affairs maintains contact with these recognized student organizations. Criminal activity by students engaged in activities at noncampus locations of student organizations officially recognized by the university is responded to by local law enforcement. The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security receives information on student organization registered events and requests information about crimes reported at these locations from local law enforcement at least annually.

Night Transportation

There are a number of different safe modes of night transportation for students, as outlined below. Students are strongly encouraged to utilize these resources and avoid the need to walk alone at night.

Campus Night Security Shuttle Service

Destination: On Campus

The Night Security Shuttle Service offers a safe ride between on-campus locations from 6 p.m. to 7 a.m. seven days a week when classes are in session hours may vary for the evenings of home football games and official Auburn University holidays. Passenger guidelines are available at aub.ie/SecurityShuttle and are advertised to students regularly at outreach events. To obtain on-campus door-to-door service, call 334-844-7400. Rides may also be requested through the free Auburn Safety app.

Security Escort Service

The City of Auburn Police Division offers, without charge, an on-campus security escort service when the Campus Security Shuttle is not in operation. If you need an escort, phone Auburn Police Division at 334-501-3100. An officer will respond to your location and escort you to your campus destination. The Security Escort Service is available during university holidays and semester breaks.

Access to and Security of Campus Facilities

The AU Airport campus is generally open to the public during normal hours of operation (7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m., Monday through Friday and 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Saturday and Sunday with the exception of special events such as football). Schedules for campus buildings fluctuate depending on the nature of their operations, as well as events and class schedules.

City of Auburn Police Division officers patrol the AU Airport Campus by vehicle on a regular basis. Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security staff also patrol after normal business hours by vehicle. For information about the access protocol for a specific building, contact the AU Airport assistant director or office manager.

Maintenance of Campus Facilities

Facilities are maintained by both AU Airport personnel and Facilities Management. AU Airport personnel handle all landscaping issues in a manner that minimizes hazardous conditions. Personnel from the AU Airport campus regularly patrol the campus and report malfunctioning lights and other unsafe physical conditions to the airport director or assistant director.

Bicycle Safety

- All bicycles operated on campus shall be registered online in AU Access. Registration is free.
- Wear a helmet. Seventy-five percent of deaths caused by biking accidents are a result of head injuries.
- Carry some form of identification (such as a valid driver's license or student ID) at all times.
- Observe all state traffic laws. Obey all traffic signals and signs. Bicycles ridden on public roadways are subject to the same laws as motor vehicles.
- Slow down and check traffic at all intersections, including parking lot entrances/exits.
- Ride bikes on designated bike paths where they are available. Otherwise, ride on the right side of the street. Never ride on the sidewalk.
- Auburn city ordinance prohibits riding a bicycle on sidewalks in downtown Auburn.
- University traffic regulations prohibit riding a bicycle on campus sidewalks of 10' or less in width.
- Avoid busy streets when possible.
- Be sure you have a front light and rear reflector at night, as required by city ordinance.
- Always park and lock your bike to a rack.
- Respect pedestrians and their right-of-way. Always let cars and people go first.
- When riding with others, travel single file rather than side-by-side.
- Maintain your bike – keep the brakes and other components in good working condition. Campus Recreation – Auburn Outdoors periodically offers bicycle maintenance courses (<http://www.campusrec.auburn.edu/outdoors/rental>).
- Cross at intersections. When you pull out between parked cars, drivers can't see you coming.
- Use bike lanes or designated bike routes wherever you can.
- Don't ride too close to parked cars. Doors can open suddenly.

Introduction

The Joseph S. Bruno Auburn Abroad in Italy ("Ariccia") Campus, within the Auburn University College of Human Sciences, provides a semester-long program in Ariccia, Italy for Auburn students (suspended for part of 2020 and 2021 due to restrictions on international travel caused by the COVID-19 pandemic). Students are immersed in Italian history on Auburn's overseas campus, the grand Palazzo Chigi, a 16th century palace, where they both reside and attend classes. The curriculum combines a mixture of classroom lectures and field trips. The campus has two directors, an executive director who works for Auburn University, and a resident director who works for the university's Italian affiliate, Interlinea. The executive director manages the program, and the resident director manages the facility and compliance with local laws and standards.

Prompt Reporting of a Crime or Emergency

Ariccia students, faculty, staff, contractors, and visitors are encouraged to follow this procedure for reporting a crime or emergency:

- Immediately and accurately report all crimes and public safety-related incidents to police, fire, or medical emergency services by dialing 112.
- Immediately notify one of the following facilitators who can assist with interpretation and coordination with emergency services:
 1. Cinzia Bracalente
 2. Roberta Londi
 3. Maurizio Antonini
- Notify the executive director, Lacey Armstrong, or designee.

Students are provided cards with these emergency contact numbers when they arrive for the Ariccia program and are encouraged to keep the cards with them at all times. Individuals are encouraged to report a crime to the Albano Police when the victim elects not to or is unable to make such a report. When calling for emergency services, the operator will most likely not speak English. To ensure help is sent to campus, continually repeat "Palazzo Chigi, Ariccia." Callers should also be prepared with as much of the following information as possible, which can be shared with emergency responders through one of the facilitators listed above:

- Name
- Exact location of the incident
- Description of the scene
- Description of any suspects
- Description and license numbers of any involved vehicles.

For any situation or incident on campus that involves a significant emergency or dangerous situation that may involve an immediate or on-going threat to the health and safety of the campus community, the Ariccia executive director will initiate emergency notification to members of the campus community where appropriate. For serious crimes and emergency situations, the executive director will also immediately notify the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security on-call emergency coordinator at 334-750-9795. Crimes reported to the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security will be assessed for timely warning notification and potential inclusion in the annual statistical disclosure.

Campus Security Authorities

In addition to the general categories of campus security authorities described earlier in this report, there are several preferred campus security authorities to whom crimes should be reported. For the Ariccia Campus, these include:

- Director of AA/EEO and Title IX Coordinator (discrimination, harassment, sexual and gender-based misconduct)

Response to Reports

When emergency services are summoned by dialing the number for police, fire, or emergency medical services above, the appropriate emergency service personnel will be dispatched to assist as appropriate. All reported crimes will be investigated by the responding agency, generally the Albano Police, and may become a matter of public record. The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security requests information about crimes occurring on Ariccia's Clery geography from the Albano Police and other local law enforcement agencies, with assistance from campus staff. If reports are received, certain details may be shared with the Division of Student Affairs for review and referral to the Office of Student Conduct for potential action, as appropriate. If sexual assault, domestic/dating violence, or stalking is reported, Ariccia staff will offer the victim a wide variety of services, detailed in the section of this report on sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking and the incident will be reported to the Title IX Coordinator.

Voluntary Confidential Reporting and Anonymous Reporting

Anyone who witnessed or has been a victim of a crime is encouraged to immediately report the incident to the police. The Italian police do not have a confidential or anonymous reporting process available. The Ariccia campus does ask students to complete a mid-term and final program evaluation, on which crimes may be reported anonymously.

The Clery Act requires Auburn University to include in our annual crime statistics disclosure all reported crimes that fall into one of the Clery reportable crime categories and occur on our Clery geography. (See the section of this report on Clery Act reporting definitions for more information about Clery reportable crime categories and geography.) Confidential reports for inclusion in the annual disclosure of crime statistics, and for assessment for a timely warning notice, generally can be made to campus security authorities who are not local law enforcement; however, if a violation of the *Title IX Sexual Harassment Policy* or *Policy Against Discrimination and Harassment* is reported, or if there is a potential for a serious or ongoing threat to the campus community, some information may be required to be shared with certain campus administrators. In all cases, every effort will be made to maintain the confidentiality of crime victims to the extent possible. Individuals are always encouraged to report incidents to the police so they can be properly investigated.

Timely Warning of Crimes

The Ariccia Campus executive director, or designee, will determine if a crime reported represents a serious or ongoing threat to students and employees, develop the content of the message, and initiate distribution. The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security on-call supervisor is available 24/7 at 334-750-9795 to assist with this process as needed. Timely warnings will generally be distributed to the Ariccia campus community via blast e-mail, group texts, and in person via site administrators.

Emergency Preparedness

What to Do in the Event of a Campus Emergency

If you have an EMERGENCY requiring police, fire or ambulance, DIAL 112 without delay.

- When you call for emergency services, the operator will most likely not speak English. To ensure help is sent to campus, continually repeat "Palazzo Chigi, Ariccia."
- Be informed and prepared in advance. Review emergency guidelines and building-specific plans, and do not wait until an emergency strikes to know what to do.
- Be aware of your surroundings and report any suspicious activities.
- Know the locations of fire alarm activation buttons (3) and how to evacuate the building if the alarm is set off.
- Know when and where to seek shelter in the Palace, if there is severe weather.

Emergency Response and Evacuation Procedures

Emergency Response Procedures

The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security has primary responsibility for emergency management at properties owned or controlled by Auburn University. Auburn University has an *Emergency*

Operations Plan in place that defines the organizational structure for response to emergencies of a magnitude that would cause significant disruption to university operations. The plan identifies responsibilities of the Crisis Management Team, which is responsible for managing the operational aspects of the university's response to an emergency event at any of the university's properties. The *Management of International Travel Crises* plan outlines additional structure for managing four levels of crisis involving Auburn University programs and travel overseas, with responsibilities outlined for the executive director/program leader, the Department of Campus Safety & Security, and the Office of International Programs.

Evacuation Procedures

The senior site administrator present (Ariccia executive director or designee), in coordination with emergency responders, is responsible for initiating any partial or campus-wide evacuations. The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security is available 24 hours a day at 334-750-9795 for assistance or consultation as needed.

When deciding whether to conduct an evacuation, consideration will be made for the type of hazard or threat, credibility of the threat, area of campus in danger, and ability to contain the threat to a specified area of campus. Evacuation instructions may vary depending on the nature and timing of the threat, as well as other hazards that may impact the safety of persons evacuating.

Communication of an evacuation order will be facilitated through the senior site administrator present, using in-person notification, group texting, and e-mail. Messages will include the nature of the incident and directions for the Ariccia campus community, including when the evacuation will begin, how to evacuate, where to go, and how updates will be provided.

The method and direction of the evacuation route during a campus evacuation will depend on the nature and location of the emergency or disaster warranting the evacuation. Once public safety officials and site administrators decide it is safe to return, announcements will be made to return to normal operations.

Emergency Notifications

The Albano Police have the primary responsibility of responding to, and summoning the necessary resources to mitigate, investigate, and document, emergencies on campus. Ariccia campus resources can be requested through the campus' executive director, and additional university resources can be requested through the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security. In addition, the responding public safety agency has the responsibility to determine if the situation does, in fact, pose a threat to the Ariccia campus community and to notify the Ariccia resident director or one of his staff when this determination is made, who will then notify the Ariccia executive director. If a situation poses an immediate threat to the Ariccia campus community, the executive director will immediately notify the campus community or the appropriate segments of the community that may be affected by the situation.

The Ariccia site administration utilizes different methods of emergency notification depending on the nature of the incident or event requiring notification, as further outlined below.

Notification Procedure

Upon confirmation by the responding public safety agency that a significant emergency or dangerous situation poses an immediate threat to the health or safety of members of the Ariccia campus community, the agency making the determination will immediately notify the program's resident director or one of his staff, who will in turn, notify the executive director. The Ariccia site administration may receive information regarding significant emergencies or dangerous situations from other sources as well, such as campus administrators, other emergency responders, the Auburn University Medical Clinic director or public health officials (for public health emergencies) and the U. S. Department of State. In such cases, the Ariccia site administration will be responsible for confirming that a significant emergency or dangerous situation poses an immediate threat to the health or safety of the Ariccia campus community. This may be done in consultation with the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security and/or emergency responders, if needed, without delaying critical notification.

Upon confirmation of an immediate threat to the safety or health of the Ariccia campus community, the Ariccia executive director or designee, in consultation with the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security as needed, will, without delay and taking into account the safety of the community, determine the content of the notification and initiate the notification system, unless issuing a notification will, in the professional judgment of emergency responders (police, fire, or emergency medical services), compromise the efforts to assist a victim or to contain, respond to, or otherwise mitigate the emergency.

The Ariccia site administration, with support from the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security, is charged with coordinating communication of immediate threats to the Ariccia campus community, or to the appropriate segment(s) of the community that may be affected, and will determine the content of the notification using all available information. The content will convey the nature of the threat and immediate actions to be taken by the campus community or affected segment thereof. The notification will be initiated by the executive director or designee. Campus staff members are instructed that they are responsible for notifying others on the campus without delaying taking protective actions for themselves.

Emergency Notification System

Auburn University has several systems in place for communicating information quickly to Ariccia students, faculty, staff, and visitors. The main components that are used for notification to the Ariccia Campus are briefly described below.

Text and E-mail Messaging

Group texting and e-mail lists are used to notify students, faculty, and staff of critical information and situations affecting campus. These systems make immediate notifications to the Ariccia campus community without delay. Students are set up in the text and e-mail groups upon arrival at the Ariccia campus. Staff and faculty are included in the notification groups as well.

Building Fire Alarm

A fire alarm system is in place to notify building occupants of possible fire dangers. The fire alarm has a distinct tone that is not used for any other purposes and indicates a need to immediately evacuate the building.

In-Person Notification

Due to the size of the facility and close proximity of the classroom and on-campus student housing, in-person notification is often a very quick and effective means of communicating with students and employees.

Additional Notification Methods

Emergency management personnel are routinely evaluating and adopting new technologies for emergency notification in an effort to most effectively reach members of the campus community during an emergency. Because the campus is small and close-knit, notification systems do not need to be sophisticated to be effective.

Alerts for the Ariccia campus community are developed and distributed to the Ariccia campus community by the Ariccia executive director or designee.

Emergency Updates

Pertinent follow-up information will be disseminated as soon as it is available. For members of the campus community, updates and follow-up messages may be sent via the appropriate communication methods listed above. In addition, for members of the larger community (parents, neighbors, etc.), the Ariccia campus will post information during a significant emergency or dangerous situation on its Web page at <http://www.humsci.auburn.edu/italy/> (either directly on the page or through a prominent link).

Campus Security and Law Enforcement

The Albano Police provides police services, including the investigation of criminal incidents, for the Ariccia campus. Officers conduct investigations, write reports for criminal offenses, and enforce all laws.

The Ariccia campus does not have a campus police or security department and does not employ security personnel or contract for such services. Local law enforcement personnel may patrol on and near the campus, but not through a written agreement or contract for these services.

Auburn University maintains a good working relationship with local law enforcement agencies and is assisted by the Italian program facilitator in communication and coordination with law enforcement and other public safety agencies.

Noncampus Organizations

The Ariccia campus does not have any recognized student organizations. Student organizations are coordinated through the main campus Division of Student Affairs and the College of Human Sciences.

Missing Student Policy

The Ariccia campus provides on-campus student housing for students completing the semester-long study abroad program. If a member of the campus community has reason to believe that a student residing in on-campus housing is missing, he or she should immediately notify the Ariccia executive director, who will evaluate the situation and notify local police as appropriate. The local police have primary responsibility for investigating reports of missing students residing in Ariccia on-campus housing and will make an official determination as to whether a student is missing.

Upon investigation, should the Albano Police determine that the student is missing, they will promptly notify Ariccia site administration, who will notify the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security. Within 24 hours of a determination by police that a student is missing, Auburn University will notify:

- The student's missing person confidential contact(s), if they have registered any;
- The student's custodial parent or legal guardian, and any other designated contact person, if the missing student is under the age of 19 and is not an emancipated individual.
 - Because the age of adulthood in Alabama is 19, we choose to notify the parent or legal guardian of a missing student who is under the age of 19, which also meets the Clery Act requirement to notify the parent or legal guardian of a missing student under the age of 18.

Students residing in on-campus housing are notified upon arrival at the Ariccia campus of the need to provide missing person confidential contacts through AU Access, as detailed in a previous section of this report.

Dangerous Weapons and Firearms Policy

Possession of fireworks, firearms, other weapons, or explosives is prohibited conduct within the Joseph S. Bruno Auburn Abroad in Italy program and its facilities. This is stated in the program's Code of Conduct policy that each student signs prior to coming to Italy to indicate that they have read and understand. Consequences for possession of these items can lead to removal from the program and premises and may, in addition, result in a decision by Auburn University to impose further sanctions, such as suspension or dismissal from school. Misconduct abroad refers to student actions that, in the judgment of the program executive director and/or Auburn University officials, jeopardize the student's own welfare or that of fellow students and/or the program.

The Auburn University Dangerous Weapons and Firearms Policy, available on the policies Web site at www.auburn.edu/policies, and in a previous section of this report, also applies to the Ariccia campus.

Access to and Security of Campus Facilities

The Ariccia campus is not open to the public. Access is restricted to students, faculty, and staff, who are given a security code which is used to access the facility. The 5-number code sequence is changed periodically due to security concerns or for other reasons. Students, faculty, and staff are notified by the Ariccia executive or resident director whenever the security code is changed. For information about the access protocol, contact the Ariccia executive or resident director.

Access to on-campus student housing is restricted by policy to residents and site administrators. Bedroom doors are equipped with deadbolt locks on the interior and only the executive director and Interlinea staff

have access to the keys. As per the policies of the program, guests, parents, and service providers are not allowed into the bedroom areas at any time unless accompanied by the executive director, the teaching assistant, or one of the Interlinea staff that works directly with the program (the resident director, program coordinator, or program facilitator).

A security camera system is in place to monitor activity in and around the Ariccia Campus for the protection of students, faculty, and staff. Security camera footage can be monitored and reviewed, if needed, by the Ariccia Campus executive director and certain staff members of the Department of Campus Safety & Security. The camera feed of the front entrance is displayed inside the building to provide security awareness for campus community members. Auburn University's Video Surveillance Policy (<https://sites.auburn.edu/admin/universitypolicies/Policies/VideoSurveillancePolicy.pdf>) provides additional information about the use of video surveillance on university properties.

Maintenance of Campus Facilities

Facilities and landscaping are maintained in a manner that minimizes hazardous conditions. Campus personnel are encouraged to report malfunctioning lights and other unsafe physical conditions to the Ariccia resident director for correction.

Sexual Assault, Domestic & Dating Violence, and Stalking

The Ariccia director and/or program facilitator will assist any survivor with notifying local police and/or the Title IX Coordinator if they so desire.

Definitions

Some key definitions applicable to sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking in Italy are listed below.

Definitions According to Italian Law

A definition of "consent" under Italian law could not be found.

"Sexual violence" is committed under the Italian Penal Code whenever a person with force or by threat or abuse of authority forces another person to commit or suffer sexual acts. Neither "rape" nor "sexual assault" is separately defined under the Code.

The Code also recognizes the crime of "violence in family or against children," which covers all forms of violence perpetrated against a family member or partner.

A person commits "stalking" under the Code through persistent harassing, threatening, or persecuting behavior which causes the victim either: (1) to feel anxious or fearful, (2) to fear for his/her own safety or the safety of a family member or person with whom the victim has an emotional relationship, or (3) to change his/her living habits.

Important Information Regarding Sexual Assault in Italy

Laws in Italy differ from those in the U.S. The information below was adapted from previously posted content from the U.S. embassy in Italy's web page.

Special Information for Cases of Sexual Assault and Rape

Physical evidence is very important in sexual assault cases and can deteriorate as time passes. As such, victims should not change clothes, avoid bathing if possible, and have a physical exam at the first opportunity. You should take these steps even if you are unsure about whether to report the crime to police. If you decide to pursue a prosecution at a later time, these steps preserve evidence that will assist the prosecutor. A consular officer or after-hours duty officer from the U.S. Embassy or nearest U.S. Consulate General may be able to accompany victims of sexual assault for the medical exam.

According to Italian law, the definitions of sexual assault and rape overlap and do not differ from region to region. Italian law regards all forms of sexual assault, including date rape, spousal rape, and rape of males, as serious violent crimes. Rape/sexual assault is defined as the act of forcing someone to perform or experience sexual acts by using violence, under threat of injury, or by abusing her/his authority, and is punishable with imprisonment from 5 to 10 years.

You should get medical attention to determine if you have been injured in any way and to discuss treatment and prevention options for pregnancy and sexually transmitted diseases. Be aware that medical providers in Italy may be required to notify law enforcement if injuries were sustained from an assault. Emergency contraception, in the form of the 'morning-after' pill, is available at all public hospitals in Italy or through any private gynecologist. HIV prophylaxis is also available in Italy. The victim can be accompanied to the hospital by a support person. Emergency medical and forensic exams are paid for by the government of Italy. If the victim reports the sexual assault or rape to emergency room doctors, they are able to begin collecting forensic evidence. Forensic collection for sexual assault normally involves a pelvic exam, vaginal/penile/anal swabs, head and pubic hair samples, fingernail scrapings, blood samples, and saliva samples. Victims can file rape/sexual assault charges (within six months of the crime's occurrence) without a medical exam; however, without forensic evidence the case will be more difficult to prosecute.

If you file a police report, in addition to police investigators, you should also expect to be interviewed by the public prosecutor who will lead the investigation and ultimately bring the case to court.

Important Information Regarding Domestic Violence in Italy

Laws in Italy differ from those in the U.S. The information below was adapted from previously posted content on the U.S. embassy in Italy's web page.

Special Information for Cases of Domestic Violence

Domestic violence is considered a crime in Italy. If domestic violence occurs, the victim is encouraged to notify local law enforcement authorities, file a police report, and seek medical attention at the nearest public hospital. A protective/restraining order against the perpetrator can be issued by a local judge. If the perpetrator violates the judge's restraining order, the victim should call the police to intervene. Domestic violence shelters are available throughout Italy and are considered secure. The number of beds and rooms offered may vary from shelter to shelter. To be admitted to a shelter, the victim has to be evaluated by shelter staff. Depending on the circumstances, victims may be accepted on a walk-in basis. At most shelters, children are also admitted.

Although some operators may speak English, it is not the general rule. Victims can contact the following domestic violence websites for more information.

Education and Prevention

Students participating in the Ariccia program are required to attend a pre-departure safety training that addresses issues such as sexual and gender-based misconduct, security awareness, crime prevention,

bystander intervention, and emergency response. They are encouraged to attend the trainings offered in the earlier section of the report prior to traveling abroad as well.

Protection Orders

Protection orders are civil court orders (issued by circuit courts) meant to provide protection and relief to victims of domestic violence.

If a student or employee at the Ariccia campus obtains a protective/restraining order from an Italian judge:

- Remember that a protection order is a piece of paper that must be respected by the stalker or abuser to be effective. After it has been served, if the abuser or stalker does not comply with the order, call the police immediately (112).
- Check the conditions of the order once it is issued. Interlinea staff can help translate the document if needed. If there are errors, ask for help getting it corrected.
- Keep a copy with you at all times. This is important if the abuser or stalker violates the order and police or other authorities need to be contacted for assistance enforcing the order.

Auburn University recognizes orders of protection. Any person who obtains a protection order while participating in the Ariccia program should provide a copy to the Ariccia executive director, resident director, program facilitator, and program coordinator. The Ariccia executive director may share the protection order with the Auburn University Title IX Coordinator, with your permission.

Personnel from the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security can help by phone (334-750-9795) with safety planning if needed. A safety action plan is a plan for public safety personnel and the victim to reduce risk of harm while on campus or coming and going from campus. This plan may include, where reasonable, but is not limited to: escorts, providing a temporary cell phone, or making special arrangements for completion of coursework.

Drug-Free Campus and Workplace Policy Statement

Standards of Conduct

Students attending the Ariccia program are required to sign a Housing Policy prior to arrival that outlines acceptable alcohol consumption on the program. This is also discussed during on-campus orientation. Laws governing alcohol consumption are different in Italy than in the U.S. In Italy, it is the norm to drink wine in moderation with meals. As such, students are allowed to have wine in the campus area of the Palace and to drink it in moderate portions. No hard liquor of any kind is allowed in the housing facilities. By the same token, excessive drinking and public intoxication will not be tolerated. Any student who “gets drunk,” either in the housing facilities or in other contexts, will be counseled by the Ariccia executive director and, concurrently, will be given a written warning. As per the program’s Code of Conduct, immediate expulsion from the program may also occur concurrently. Students are also responsible for guests who violate this policy.

Description of On-Campus Housing and Fire Safety Systems

Palazzo Chigi di Ariccia, Via del Parco 149, 00040 Ariccia (Rome), Italy

Constructed in approximately 1580, Palazzo Chigi di Ariccia houses the Joseph S. Bruno Auburn Abroad in Italy campus, including student housing and classroom facilities. The building has four student bedroom suites that can house up to 22 students at any given time. Fire safety features include:

- Two emergency exits, one to the exterior of the building and the other into an enclosed courtyard associated with the public museum that occupies the remainder of Palazzo Chigi.
- All bedrooms are equipped with smoke detectors.
- A central fire alarm system can be activated by a push button.
- Portable fire extinguishers are provided throughout the building.
- Fire evacuation maps are posted throughout the campus.

Fire Drills

A fire drill was held in July 2019, but due to the lack of students during the Covid-19 pandemic there were no fire drills conducted in 2020. However, normally fire drills are held at the beginning of each semester. These drills are conducted and evaluated by the Ariccia executive director, with assistance from the Department of Risk Management & Safety and/or the Department of Campus Safety & Security, if needed.

All residents are required to participate in fire drills if present. Evacuation is required in all instances. No residents may remain in the building during the fire drill. Residents must remain outside until cleared to return. Procedures for evacuation are explained in orientation shortly after students arrive on site.

Student Housing Policies on Portable Electrical Appliances, Smoking and Open Flames

Appliances

- Appliances prohibited in student housing include, but are not limited to: air-conditioning units, ceiling fans, halogen lamps, personal microwaves exceeding 700 watts, personal refrigerators exceeding 4.3 cubic feet, dishwashers, hot plates, personal washers and dryers, space heaters, crockpots, toaster ovens, toasters, appliances with open or exposed heating coils, and those which pose an electrical overload hazard.

Fire Safety

- **Arson:** Regardless of size of fire or whether or not damage is caused, starting and/or maintaining a fire or causing an explosion in the housing facility or outside area is prohibited.
- **Candles/Incense:** The burning of candles and/or incense is prohibited. Candles with burnt wicks are prohibited.
- **Evacuation Procedures:** Interference with or non-adherence to emergency evacuation procedures during a fire drill are prohibited. Returning before the “all-clear” signal has been given after a fire drill is prohibited.
- **Fireworks/Explosive Materials:** The storage, possession, or use of any type of fireworks, firecracker, or explosive material in the housing facility or surrounding vicinity is prohibited.
- **Flammable:** The storage, possession, or use of flammable materials/liquids in the housing facility is prohibited. Gas grills and gas cylinders/tanks are prohibited.
- **Vandalism of Safety Equipment:** Removal, tampering with, and/or the disabling of fire alarm pull stations, smoke or heat detectors, fire extinguishers, or other life safety equipment is prohibited.
- **False Fire Alarms:** Activating a fire alarm without due cause and/or falsely reporting a fire to the police or fire department is prohibited.

Smoking

- Smoking is prohibited within all university buildings, facilities, grounds, University-owned vehicles, and property leased to or managed by the university with the exceptions of:
 - Controlled research, or educational, theatrical, or religious ceremonial purposes, with prior approval from the Dean or Director responsible for the facility.
 - Privately-owned vehicles and locations outside of the campus perimeter.
- Littering the campus with remains of disposable tobacco products is prohibited.

Candles

Candles and other sources of open flame are not permitted inside university buildings.

Fire Evacuation Procedures for All Campus Buildings Including Campus Housing

In the event of a fire or fire alarm:

- Exit the area immediately.
- Close all doors as you leave, taking keys and medications with you if possible. DO NOT delay evacuation to retrieve these items.
- Activate the closest fire alarm push button along your evacuation route.
- Notify others around you as you leave.
- **Call 112** and report the emergency after you are out of the building and safe.

If the fire is small enough, you may attempt to extinguish it with a portable fire extinguisher, ONLY IF: The fire alarm push button has been activated; 112 has been dialed; you are properly trained; and the fire is trash can size or similar.

- If leaving a room, feel the door with the back of your hand before opening it. Do not open any door that feels hot.
- If smoke is present, stay low. The best quality air is near the floor.
- Once the building is evacuated, do not re-enter it for any reason. Return to the building ONLY when instructed to do so by emergency responders or administrators.
- DO NOT return for personal belongings.
- Direct and assist visitors and persons with disabilities who appear to need direction or assistance.
- Notify the Department of Campus Safety & Security on-call phone at 00-1-334-750-9795 that a fire has occurred AFTER you exit the building and 112 has been dialed.

If You Are Trapped and Cannot Evacuate

- Close any doors between you and the fire.
- If available, wedge wet towels or cloth materials along the bottom of the door to keep out smoke.
- Call 112 and notify the dispatcher of your location.
- Remain on the phone with the 112 dispatcher as long as possible.
- Break a window only as a last resort, such as needing oxygen to breathe.
- Use caution when breaking any window.

Response to Fire Alarms

- NEVER assume that a fire alarm is a false alarm.
- If the alarm sounds, evacuate immediately.

Fire Safety Education and Training Programs

The fire safety policies and procedures covered in this document are discussed with Auburn University students residing in on-campus student housing during orientation to the Ariccia Campus program.

Reporting Fires

Students and employees should report that a fire occurred to the following persons and organizations:

In the event of a fire emergency, report the fire by dialing 112.

After the emergency, please contact the Campus Safety & Security on-call phone at 00-1-334-750-9795. Campus Safety & Security is responsible for coordinating Auburn University's response to emergencies, including fires, and will notify Risk Management and Safety for follow-up on investigation, tracking, and recording on the fire log. This information allows us to take proactive measures to reduce future occurrences.

Plans for Future Improvement in Fire Safety

Risk Management and Safety will continue to work collaboratively with the College of Human Sciences, Facilities Management, and other administrative offices to ensure plans for future renovations or new construction projects include the required fire protection systems and fire-rated building components. There are currently no specific plans for future fire safety improvements for the Ariccia campus.

Campus Security Authorities

In addition to the general categories of campus security authorities described earlier in this report, there are several preferred campus security authorities to whom crimes should be reported. For Futures Studio, these include:

- Director, Futures Studio
- Director of AA/EEO and Title IX Coordinator (discrimination, harassment, sexual and gender-based misconduct)

Response to Reports

The Mobile Police Department is available 24 hours a day to answer calls for emergency police, fire, or medical assistance. In response to a call, appropriate action will be taken by either dispatching an officer and/or other emergency services or asking the individual reporting the crime to go to the Mobile Police Department to file an incident report. All reported crimes will be investigated by the Mobile Police Department and may become a matter of public record. Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security requests information about crimes occurring on Future Studio's Clery geography from the Mobile Police Department. Certain details from these incident reports may be shared with the Futures Studio Director and Division of Student Affairs for review and referral for potential disciplinary action, as appropriate. If sexual assault, domestic/dating violence, or stalking is reported, details from the incident report will be shared with the Title IX Coordinator for investigation and personnel receiving the report will offer the victim a wide variety of services, detailed in the section of this report on sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence and stalking.

Voluntary Confidential Reporting and Anonymous Reporting

Anyone who witnessed, or has been a victim of, a crime is encouraged to immediately report the incident to the Mobile Police Department by dialing 911, or 251-208-1700 (for non-emergency situations or delayed reports). Police reports in the state of Alabama are public records, meaning that police cannot hold reports of crime in confidence and thus do not allow voluntary confidential or anonymous reporting. The Mobile Police Department maintains an Anonymous Tip site that can be used for reporting security and safety-related concerns, or to provide tips about criminal incidents or behavior on campus or within the City of Mobile. The Clery Act requires Auburn University to include in our annual crime statistics disclosure all reported crimes that fall into one of the Clery reportable crime categories and occur on our Clery geography. (See

the previous section of this report on Clery Act reporting definitions for more information about Clery reportable crime categories and geography.) Confidential reports for inclusion in the annual disclosure of crime statistics, and for assessment for a timely warning notice, generally can be made to a campus security authority; however, if a violation of the *Title IX Sexual Harassment Policy* or *Policy Against Discrimination and Harassment* is reported, or if there is a potential for a serious or ongoing threat to the campus community, some information may be required to be shared with certain campus administrators. In all cases, every effort will be made to maintain the confidentiality of crime victims to the extent possible. Individuals are always encouraged to report incidents to the police so they can be properly investigated.

Timely Warning of Crimes

The Futures Studio director, or designee, will determine if a crime reported represents a serious or ongoing threat to students and employees, develop the content of the message, and initiate distribution. The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security on-call supervisor is available 24/7 at 334-750-9795 to assist with this process as needed. Timely warnings will generally be distributed to the Futures Studio campus community via blast e-mail.

Emergency Preparedness

What to Do in the Event of a Campus Emergency

If you have an EMERGENCY requiring police, fire or ambulance, DIAL 911 without delay.

- When you dial 911 for emergency services, stay on the line and give the following information:
 - Your name, telephone number, and exact location.
 - The location of the emergency.
 - The nature and extent of the emergency (e.g. Are there injuries and how many?)
- Be informed and prepared in advance. Review emergency guidelines and building-specific plans, and do not wait until an emergency strikes to know what to do.
- Be aware of your surroundings and report any suspicious activities.
- Know the locations of fire alarm activation pull stations in your building and how to evacuate your building if the alarm is set off.
- Know the locations of severe weather shelter areas in your building and when to seek shelter.

Emergency Response and Evacuation Procedures

Emergency response and building evacuation procedures are included in building-specific emergency response plans available through the AU Department of Campus Safety & Security.

The senior site administrator present (Futures Studio director or designee), in coordination with the Mobile Police Department or other first responders, is responsible for initiating any partial or campus-wide evacuations. The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security is available 24 hours a day at 334-750-9795 for assistance or consultation as needed.

When deciding whether to conduct an evacuation, consideration will be made for the type of hazard or threat, credibility of the threat, area of campus in danger, and ability to contain the threat to a specified area of campus. The Futures Studio campus community may be notified to evacuate on foot or by vehicle, depending on the nature and timing of the threat, as well as other hazards that may impact the safety of persons evacuating.

Communication of an evacuation order should be facilitated through the senior site administrator present, using the Futures Studio Alert system. Messages will include the nature of the incident and directions for the Futures Studio campus community, including when the evacuation will begin, how to evacuate (on foot or by vehicle), where to go, and how updates will be provided.

The method and direction of the evacuation route during a campus evacuation will depend on the nature and location of the emergency or disaster warranting the evacuation. Once public safety officials decide it is safe to return, announcements will be made to return to normal operations.

Emergency Notifications

The Mobile Police Department has the primary responsibility of responding to, and summoning the necessary resources to mitigate, investigate, and document, emergencies on the Futures Studio Campus. Futures Studio campus resources can be requested through the studio's director, and additional university resources can be requested through the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security. In addition, the Mobile Police Department or other responding public safety agency has the responsibility to determine if the situation does, in fact, pose a threat to the Futures Studio campus community and to notify the senior site administrator present (Futures Studio director or designee) when this determination is made. If a situation poses an immediate threat to the Futures Studio campus community, the institution will immediately notify the campus community or the appropriate segments of the community that may be affected by the situation.

The Futures Studio site administration and Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security utilize different methods of emergency notification depending on the nature of the incident or event requiring notification, as further outlined below.

Notification Procedure

Upon confirmation by the Mobile Police Department or other responding public safety agency that a significant emergency or dangerous situation poses an immediate threat to the health or safety of members of the Futures Studio campus community, the agency making the determination will immediately notify the Futures Studio senior site administrator present and/or Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security. The Futures Studio site administration or Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security may receive information regarding significant emergencies or dangerous situations from other sources as well, such as university administrators, other first responders, the Auburn University Medical Clinic director or public health officials (for public health emergencies) and the National Weather Service. In such cases, the Futures Studio site administration will be responsible for confirming that a significant emergency or dangerous situation poses an immediate threat to the health or safety of the Futures Studio community. Factors that are quickly considered in making this determination include the nature, timing, location, and anticipated duration of the threat as well as the population and activities that may be impacted. This may be done in conjunction with the AU Department of Campus Safety & Security and/or first responders, if needed.

Upon confirmation of an immediate threat to the safety or health of the Futures Studio campus community, the Futures Studio site administrator, in consultation with Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security as needed, will, without delay and taking into account the safety of the community, determine the content of the notification and initiate the notification system, unless issuing a notification will, in the professional judgment of first responders (including, but not limited to, the Mobile Police Department, Mobile Fire Department, and Emergency Medical Services), compromise the efforts to assist a victim or to contain, respond to, or otherwise mitigate the emergency.

The Futures Studio site administration, with support from the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security, is charged with coordinating communication of immediate threats to the Futures Studio community, or to the appropriate segment(s) of the community that may be affected, and will determine the content of the notification using all available information. The content will convey the nature of the threat and immediate actions to be taken by the campus community or affected segment thereof. The notification will be initiated by a trained member of the Futures Studio site administration (or Auburn University Campus Safety & Security, if requested). Campus staff members are instructed that they are responsible for notifying others on the campus without delaying taking protective actions for themselves.

Emergency Notification System

Auburn University has numerous systems in place for communicating information quickly to Futures Studio students, faculty, staff, and visitors. The main components of the AU ALERT System that are used for notification to the Futures Studio campus are briefly described below.

Text and E-mail Messaging

This contracted emergency notification system has the ability to notify students, faculty, and staff of critical information and situations affecting campus through the use of text messages to multiple phone numbers and e-mail to multiple e-mail addresses. This system makes immediate notifications to the Futures Studio campus community without delay. All active university e-mail addresses are automatically included in the system for main campus alerts. Students, faculty, and staff are encouraged to sign up with a phone number by logging into AU Access and clicking on the “Add/Update AU ALERT Contacts” link located on the My Campus tab. Visit www.auburn.edu/aualert for more information. Futures Studio students, faculty and staff are encouraged to also subscribe to alerts that are specific to the Futures Studio campus by clicking on the “Opt-In Lists” tab in their AU ALERT profile and selecting to receive alerts for the “Futures Studio” group.

Outdoor Warning Sirens

Mobile County Emergency Management Agency has several sirens located near the Futures Studio campus in the downtown Mobile area. These sirens are primarily sounded for tornado warnings affecting the area. Sirens are intended to reach those who are outside at the time of the notification. The Mobile County outdoor warning siren system is tested on the first Wednesday of each month at 9:00 a.m. (weather permitting).

NOAA Weather Radios

A NOAA weather radio is located in the studio. NOAA weather radios receive information directly from the National Weather Service. This information includes current weather and also any issued watches or warnings for Mobile County, Alabama, where the Futures Studio campus is located.

Additional Notification Methods

Emergency management personnel are routinely evaluating and adopting new technologies for emergency notification in an effort to most effectively reach members of the campus community during an emergency.

Alerts for the Futures Studio campus are developed and distributed to the Futures Studio community by site administrators, but the Auburn University Campus Safety & Security is also available 24 hours a day at 334-750-9795 to immediately send a notification if needed.

Emergency Updates

Pertinent follow-up information will be disseminated as soon as it is available. For members of the campus community, updates and follow-up messages may be sent via any of the communication methods listed above.

Campus Security and Law Enforcement

The Mobile Police Department provides police services, including the investigation of criminal incidents, for the Futures Studio campus. Mobile Police sworn officers conduct investigations, write reports for all criminal offenses, and enforce all laws.

The Futures Studio campus does not have a campus police or security department, nor does it employ security personnel or contract for such services. Local law enforcement personnel patrol on and near the campus, but not through a written agreement or contract for these services.

Auburn University seeks to maintain an excellent working relationship with local and state law enforcement agencies, including the Mobile Police, Mobile County Sheriff's Office and Alabama Law Enforcement Agency.

Noncampus Organizations

Students at the Futures Studio campus have the opportunity to participate in recognized student organizations, coordinated through the Main Campus Office of Student Involvement. The Division of Student Affairs maintains contact with these recognized student organizations. Criminal activity by students engaged in activities at noncampus locations of student organizations officially recognized by the university

is responded to by local law enforcement. The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security receives information on student organization registered events and requests information about crimes reported at these locations from local law enforcement at least annually.

Access to and Security of Campus Facilities

The Futures Studio campus is located within the Alabama Creative Arts Center in downtown Mobile, which is generally open to the public during normal hours of operation. Schedule for the campus building fluctuates depending on the nature of their operations, as well as events and class schedules.

During normal business hours the doors are unlocked and entrance to the building is monitored by a receptionist that also serves as a ticket counter for the museum that is also within the center. After normal business hours, entry to the studio is made via proximity card. During business hours, Futures Studio is open to students and employees. Tours are welcome during non-class periods if coordinated in advance. During non-business hours, access to the studio is by electronic card swipe.

Maintenance of Campus Facilities

Facilities and landscaping are maintained in a manner that minimizes hazardous conditions. The property manager and Futures Studio staff regularly patrol the facility to take care of malfunctioning lights and other unsafe physical conditions. The property manager is responsible for correcting issues on the outside of the building, and the Futures Studio is responsible for correcting safety issues inside the building.

Other members of the campus community are encouraged to report equipment problems or unsafe conditions to the Futures Studio director or administrative director so they may be corrected in a timely manner.

Fire Statistics for On-Campus Student Housing Facilities (Futures Studio)

The Futures Studio is a new campus which began operation in September 2019. However, the On Campus Student Housing Facilities were not used by students in 2019 or 2020, so there are no fire statistics for calendar years 2018-2020.

Description of On-Campus Housing and Fire Safety Systems

Opened in 2019, the Futures Studio has three historic cottages (Cottage 263, Cottage 265 and Cottage 267) for use as student housing. These cottages were built in 1872 and newly renovated in 2019. The housing complex consists of three duplex cottages with a total occupant capacity of 18. Each 500 square foot duplex includes one triple occupancy room, with a capacity to house three students per unit. Fire safety features include:

- Bedrooms exit directly to the exterior.
- All bedrooms are equipped with smoke detectors.
- Portable fire extinguishers are provided in unit.
- Fire evacuation maps are posted inside each bedroom.

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Fire Drills

Fire drills were not held in 2019 or 2020 because the housing was not used by students. However, fire drills are planned to be held regularly at the facility once occupied. Mobile Fire & Rescue Service will be invited to participate. Records of drills will be maintained on campus.

Student Housing Policies on Portable Electrical Appliances, Smoking and Open Flames

Appliances

- **Extension Cords:** The use of extension cords in the student apartment is prohibited.
- **Appliances:** Appliances prohibited in the apartment include, but are not limited to: air-conditioning units, ceiling fans, halogen lamps, personal microwaves exceeding 700 watts, personal refrigerators exceeding 4.3 cubic feet, hot plates, personal washers and dryers, space heaters, appliances with open or exposed heating coils, and those which pose an electrical overload hazard.

Fire Safety

- **Arson:** Regardless of size of fire or whether or not damage is caused, starting and/or maintaining a fire or causing an explosion in the apartment or outside area is prohibited.
- **Candles/Incense:** The burning of candles and/or incense is prohibited. Candles with burnt wicks are prohibited.
- **Evacuation Procedures:** Interference with or non-adherence to emergency evacuation procedures in the apartment during a fire drill are prohibited. Returning to the building before the "all-clear" signal has been given after a fire drill is prohibited.
- **Fireworks/Explosive Materials:** The storage, possession, or use of any type of fireworks, firecracker, or explosive material in the apartment or surrounding vicinity is prohibited.
- **Flammable:** The storage, possession, or use of flammable materials/liquids in the apartment is prohibited. Gas grills and gas cylinders/tanks are prohibited.
- **Vandalism of Safety Equipment:** Removal, tampering with, and/or the disabling of fire alarm pull stations, smoke or heat detectors, fire extinguishers, sprinkler heads or other life safety equipment is prohibited.
- **False Fire Alarms:** Activating a fire alarm without due cause and/or falsely reporting a fire to the police or fire department is prohibited.

Smoking

- Smoking is prohibited within all university buildings, facilities, grounds, University-owned vehicles, and property leased to or managed by the university with the exceptions of:
 - Controlled research, or educational, theatrical, or religious ceremonial purposes, with prior approval from the Dean or Director responsible for the facility.
 - Privately-owned vehicles and locations outside of the campus perimeter.
- Littering the campus with remains of disposable tobacco products is prohibited.
- Assistance with smoking cessation for students, faculty and staff at all campuses is available through the Auburn University Medical Clinic, the Harrison School of Pharmacy, and the Office of Health Promotion and Wellness Services. More information can be found at <http://auburn.edu/smokefree>.

Candles

Candles and other sources of open flame are not permitted inside university buildings.

Fire Evacuation Procedures for All Campus Buildings Including Campus Housing

In the event of a fire or fire alarm:

- Exit the area immediately.
- Close all doors as you leave, taking keys and medications with you if possible. DO NOT delay evacuation to retrieve these items.
- Notify others around you as you leave.
- **Call 911** and report the emergency after you are out of the building and safe.

If the fire is small enough, you may attempt to extinguish it with a portable fire extinguisher, ONLY IF: 911 has been dialed; you are properly trained; and the fire is trash can size or similar.

- If leaving a room, feel the door with the back of your hand before opening it. Do not open any door that feels hot.
- If smoke is present, stay low. The best quality air is near the floor.
- Always use stairs to exit upper floors.
- DO NOT use the elevator.
- Once the building is evacuated, do not re-enter it for any reason. Return to the building ONLY when instructed to do so by emergency responders or administrators.
- DO NOT return for personal belongings.
- Direct and assist visitors and persons with disabilities who appear to need direction or assistance.
- Notify the Department of Campus Safety & Security on-call phone (334-750-9795) that a fire has occurred AFTER you exit the building and 911 has been dialed.

If You Are Trapped and Cannot Evacuate

- Close any doors between you and the fire.
- If available, wedge wet towels or cloth materials along the bottom of the door to keep out smoke.
- Call 911 and notify the dispatcher of your location.
- Remain on the phone with the 911 dispatcher as long as possible.
- Break a window only as a last resort, such as needing oxygen to breathe.
- Use caution when breaking any window.

Response to Fire Alarms/Smoke Detectors

- NEVER assume that a fire alarm is a false alarm.
- If the alarm sounds, evacuate immediately.

Fire Safety Education and Training Programs

Futures Studio is a new program and will provide a fire and life safety class with portable fire extinguisher training in 2020. The fire safety policies and procedures covered in this document are discussed will also be reviewed with Auburn University students residing in on-campus student housing.

Risk Management & Safety offers the following education/training to all other faculty, staff and students:

- Portable fire extinguisher training (upon request)
- Other fire safety education as requested.

Reporting Fires

Students and employees should report that a fire occurred to the following persons and organizations:

In the event of a fire emergency, report the fire by dialing 911.

After the emergency, please contact the Campus Safety & Security on-call phone at 334-750-9795. Campus Safety & Security is responsible for coordinating Auburn University's response to emergencies, including fires, and will notify Risk Management and Safety for follow-up on investigation, tracking, and recording on the fire log. This information allows us to take proactive measures to reduce future occurrences.

Plans for Future Improvement in Fire Safety

Risk Management and Safety will continue to work collaboratively with the College of Architecture, Design and Construction, Facilities Management, and other administrative offices to ensure plans for future renovations or new construction projects include required fire protection systems and fire-rated building components. There are currently no specific plans for future fire safety improvements for the Futures Studio.

Introduction

Campus Security Authorities

In addition to the general categories of campus security authorities described earlier in this report, there are several preferred campus security authorities to whom crimes should be reported. For Harris ELC Campus, these include:

- Executive Director, Harris Early Learning Center
- Director of AA/EEO and Title IX Coordinator (discrimination, harassment, sexual and gender-based misconduct)

Response to Reports

The Birmingham Police Department is available 24 hours a day to answer calls for emergency police, fire or medical assistance. In response to a call, appropriate action will be taken by either dispatching an officer and/or other emergency services or asking the individual reporting the crime to go to the Birmingham Police Station to file an incident report. All reported crimes will be investigated by the Birmingham Police Department and may become a matter of public record. The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security requests information about crimes occurring on Harris ELC's Clery geography from the Birmingham Police Department. Certain details from these reports may be shared with the Division of Student Affairs for review and referral to the Office of Student Conduct for potential action, as appropriate. If sexual assault, domestic/dating violence or stalking is reported, details from the incident report will be shared with the Title IX Coordinator for investigation and personnel receiving the report will offer the victim a wide variety of services, detailed in the section of this report on sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking.

Voluntary Confidential Reporting and Anonymous Reporting

Anyone who witnessed, or has been a victim of, a crime is encouraged to immediately report the incident to the Birmingham Police by dialing 911, or for non-emergency situations, 205-328-9311. Police reports in the state of Alabama are public records, meaning that police cannot hold reports of crime in confidence and thus do not allow voluntary confidential reporting. The Metro Alabama Crime Stoppers tip line can be used for reporting security and safety related concerns, or to provide tips about criminal incidents or behavior on campus or within the City of Birmingham. The Clery Act requires Auburn University to include in our annual crime statistics disclosure all reported crimes that fall into one of the Clery reportable crime categories and occur on our Clery geography. (See the section of this report on Clery Act reporting definitions for more information about Clery reportable crime categories and geography.) Confidential reports for inclusion in the annual disclosure of crime statistics, and for assessment for a timely warning notice, generally can be made to campus security authorities; however, if a violation of the *Title IX Sexual Harassment Policy* or *Policy Against Discrimination and Harassment* is reported, or if there is a potential for a serious or ongoing threat to the campus community, some information may be required to be shared with certain campus administrators. In all cases, every effort will be made to maintain the confidentiality of crime victims to the extent possible. Individuals are always encouraged to report incidents to the police so they can be properly investigated.

Timely Warning of Crimes

The Harris ELC campus executive director, or designee, will determine if a crime reported represents a serious or ongoing threat to students and employees, develop the content of the message, and initiate distribution. The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security on-call supervisor is available 24/7 at 334-750-9795 to assist with this process as needed. Timely warnings will generally be distributed to the Harris ELC campus community via blast e-mail and in person via site administrators.

Emergency Preparedness

What to Do in the Event of a Campus Emergency

If you have an EMERGENCY requiring police, fire or ambulance, DIAL 911 without delay.

- When you dial 911 for emergency services, stay on the line and give the following information:
 - Your name, telephone number, and exact location.
 - The location of the emergency.
 - The nature and extent of the emergency (e.g. Are there injuries and how many?)
- Be informed and prepared in advance. Review emergency guidelines and building-specific plans, and do not wait until an emergency strikes to know what to do.
- Be aware of your surroundings and report any suspicious activities.
- Know the locations of fire alarm activation pull stations in your building and how to evacuate your building if the alarm is set off.
- Know the locations of severe weather shelter areas in your building and when to seek shelter.
- Know the location of the automated external defibrillator (AED), for use in medical emergencies when a person is unresponsive and not breathing normally.

Emergency Response and Evacuation Procedures

Emergency response and building evacuation procedures are included in building-specific emergency response plans available from the AU Department of Campus Safety & Security.

The decision to conduct a large-scale evacuation of campus would be an extreme measure due to the type of facility and the ages of many building occupants. The senior site administrator present (a Harris ELC director, assistant director or facility manager), in coordination with the Birmingham Police Department, is responsible for initiating any partial or campus-wide evacuations. The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security is available 24 hours a day at 334-750-9795 for assistance or consultation as needed.

When deciding whether to conduct an evacuation, consideration will be made for the type of hazard or threat, credibility of the threat, area of campus in danger, and ability to contain the threat to a specified area of campus. The campus community may be notified to evacuate on foot or by vehicle, depending on the nature and timing of the threat, as well as other hazards that may impact the safety of persons evacuating.

Communication of an evacuation order should be facilitated through the senior site administrator present, using the indoor public address system. Messages should include the nature of the incident and directions for the Harris ELC campus community, including when the evacuation will begin, how to evacuate (on foot or by vehicle), where to go, and how updates will be provided.

The method and direction of the evacuation route during a campus evacuation will depend on the nature and location of the emergency or disaster warranting the evacuation. Once public safety officials decide it is safe to return, announcements will be made to return to normal operations.

Tests of Emergency Procedures

Tests of the community outdoor warning siren system are conducted monthly on the first Wednesday of the month at 10:00 a.m. by the Jefferson County Emergency Management Agency (weather permitting). If a test is delayed due to weather, it is rescheduled for either the following day or the following week. Tests of the other components of the Harris ELC emergency notification system are conducted and documented at least once per year, via announced tests. Performance results are documented.

Emergency Notifications

The Birmingham Police Department has the primary responsibility of responding to, and summoning the necessary resources to mitigate, investigate, and document, emergencies on campus. Harris ELC campus resources can be requested through a Harris ELC director, and additional university resources can be requested through the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security. In addition, the Birmingham Police Department has the responsibility to determine if the situation does, in fact, pose a

threat to the Harris ELC community and to notify the senior site administrator present (a Harris ELC director, assistant director or facility manager) when this determination is made. If a situation poses an immediate threat to the Harris ELC campus community, the institution will immediately notify the campus community or the appropriate segments of the community that may be affected by the situation.

The Harris ELC site administration utilizes different methods of emergency notification depending on the nature of the incident or event requiring notification, as further outlined below.

Notification Procedure

Upon confirmation by the Birmingham Police Department or other responding public safety agency that a significant emergency or dangerous situation poses an immediate threat to the health or safety of members of the Harris ELC campus community, the agency making the determination will immediately notify the Harris ELC senior site administrator present. The Harris ELC may receive information regarding significant emergencies or dangerous situations from other sources as well, such as university administrators, other first responders, the Auburn University Medical Clinic director or public health officials (for public health emergencies) and the National Weather Service. In such cases, the Harris ELC site administration will be responsible for confirming that a significant emergency or dangerous situation poses an immediate threat to the health or safety of the Harris ELC community. This may be done in consultation with the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security and/or first responders, if needed.

Upon confirmation of an immediate threat to the safety or health of the Harris ELC campus community, the Harris ELC site administration will, without delay and taking into account the safety of the community, determine the content of the notification and initiate the notification system, unless issuing a notification will, in the professional judgment of first responders (including, but not limited to, the Birmingham Police Department, Birmingham Fire & Rescue Service, and Emergency Medical Services), compromise the efforts to assist a victim or to contain, respond to, or otherwise mitigate the emergency.

The Harris ELC site administration, with support from the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security, is charged with coordinating communication of immediate threats to the Harris ELC community, or to the appropriate segment(s) of the community that may be affected, and will determine the content of the notification using all available information. The content will convey the nature of the threat and immediate actions to be taken by the campus community or affected segment thereof. The notification will be initiated by a trained member of the Harris ELC site administration. Campus staff members are instructed that they are responsible for notifying others on the campus without delaying taking protective action for themselves.

Emergency Notification System

Auburn University has numerous systems in place for communicating information quickly to Harris ELC students, faculty, staff, and visitors. The main components of the emergency notification system that are used for notification to the Harris ELC campus are briefly described below.

Text, Voice, E-mail and RSS Messaging

This contracted emergency notification system has the ability to notify students, faculty, and staff of critical information and situations affecting campus through the use of text and voice messages to multiple phone numbers, e-mail to multiple e-mail addresses, and messages via RSS feeds. This system makes immediate notifications to those subscribed without delay. Students, faculty, staff and parents can contact one of the Harris ELC directors for instructions on signing up to receive alerts.

Social Networking

Harris ELC messages are also available through Twitter (follow @HarrisELC) and Facebook (like Harris Early Learning Center). These methods are considered passive methods of communication. They can be used to supplement other notification methods, but should not be relied upon by students, faculty, and staff as the sole means of receiving notification.

Outdoor Warning Sirens

Jefferson County Emergency Management Agency has several sirens located near the Harris ELC campus in the downtown Birmingham area. These sirens are primarily sounded for tornado warnings affecting the

area. Sirens are intended to reach those who are outside at the time of the notification. The Jefferson County outdoor warning siren system is tested on the first Wednesday of each month at 10:00 a.m. (weather permitting). If the test has to be postponed due to weather, it is rescheduled on either the following day or the following week.

NOAA Weather Radios

A NOAA weather radio is located in the office. NOAA weather radios receive information directly from the National Weather Service. This information includes current weather and also any issued watches or warnings for Jefferson County, Alabama, where the Harris ELC campus is located.

Building Fire Alarms

Fire alarms are in place to notify building occupants of possible fire dangers in the building. If you hear the fire alarm, evacuate the building immediately. The fire alarm has a distinct tone that is not used for any other purposes.

Indoor Public Address

The Harris ELC also has an indoor public address system through the campus phone system. Site administrators can make emergency announcements to all classrooms using this system.

Additional Notification Methods

Emergency management personnel are routinely evaluating and adopting new technologies for emergency notification in an effort to most effectively reach members of the campus community during an emergency.

The messages for all systems listed above are developed and distributed to the Harris ELC campus community by site administrators.

Emergency Updates

Pertinent follow-up information will be disseminated as soon as it is available. For members of the campus community, updates and follow-up messages may be sent via any of the communication methods listed above. In addition, for members of the larger community (parents, neighbors, etc.), the Harris ELC will post information during a significant emergency or dangerous situation on its social media sites (Facebook: [Harris Early Learning Center](#); Twitter: @HarrisELC). Members of the campus community and larger community may also monitor updates via local/national media.

Campus Security and Law Enforcement

The Birmingham Police Department provides police services, including the investigation of criminal incidents, for the Harris ELC campus. Birmingham Police sworn officers conduct investigations, write reports for all criminal offenses, and enforce all laws.

The Harris ELC campus does not have a campus police or security department but does employ a part-time security officer during peak drop-off and pick-up times. Local law enforcement personnel patrol on and near the campus, but not through a written agreement or contract for these services.

Auburn University seeks to maintain an excellent working relationship with local and state law enforcement agencies, including the Birmingham Police, Jefferson County Sheriff's Office and Alabama Law Enforcement Agency.

Noncampus Organizations

Students at the Harris ELC campus have the opportunity to participate in recognized student organizations, coordinated through the Main Campus Office of Student Involvement. The Division of Student Affairs maintains contact with these recognized student organizations. Criminal activity by students engaged in activities at noncampus locations of student organizations officially recognized by the university is responded to by local law enforcement. The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security receives information on student organization registered events and requests information about crimes reported at these locations from local law enforcement at least annually.

Safety Escort Service

Students and staff at the Harris ELC campus are encouraged to use the buddy system or City Action Partnership (CAP) services to request an escort to avoid walking to their vehicles or other locations alone at night. CAP services offer street security patrol, security escorts to and from your vehicle, friendly advice and directions, and stranded motorist assistance. To request assistance, dial 205-251-0111 (7:00 a.m. to midnight Monday through Friday and noon to midnight Saturday).

Access to and Security of Campus Facilities

The Harris ELC is generally open to staff, interns, enrolled students, and their families during normal hours of operation (7:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m., Monday through Friday). Employees, interns and parents of enrolled students are granted card access to certain portions of the building. Visitors must be granted access by a Harris ELC employee. For information about the access protocol for the building, see the Harris ELC director.

Birmingham Police officers and CAP personnel patrol the facility on a regular basis. Officers patrol the area via foot, bike and cars. Facility doors remain locked throughout the day, with the exception of certain doors that are unlocked during peak drop-off and pick-up times. A non-sworn security staff member patrols the facility during these times on foot. Emergency exits are equipped with alarms that sound when the doors are opened.

The Harris Early Learning Center has an apartment suite on its second floor, with a master bedroom (used by faculty) and two student rooms with three bunk beds each. Access to the student housing apartment is restricted to residents, their approved guests, and other approved members of the Harris ELC staff.

Residents gain entry to the main building by swiping their access card in the card access readers. There is a separate apartment entrance that bypasses the childcare facility. Students are also issued a key for the suite and a unique key for their shared bedroom. Guests of residents must be accompanied at all times by the resident whom they are visiting. For security reasons, residents should not allow individuals without authorized access into student housing.

Maintenance of Campus Facilities

Facilities and landscaping are maintained in a manner that minimizes hazardous conditions. The facility manager and other staff members regularly patrol the campus to identify and repair malfunctioning lights and other unsafe physical conditions.

Other members of the campus community are encouraged to report equipment problems or unsafe conditions to the facility manager so they may be corrected in a timely manner.

Description of On-Campus Housing and Fire Safety Systems

Opened in 1995, the Harris Early Learning Center has an apartment suite on its second floor, with a master bedroom (used by faculty) and two student rooms with three bunk beds each. The structural members including floors, ceilings and walls are concrete.

Fire safety features include:

- All exit corridors and stairwells have at least a one-hour fire rating.
- Exits are marked with illuminated exit signs and emergency lighting is provided in corridors and stairwells.
- Bedrooms are equipped with smoke detectors that are monitored by a fire alarm system. The fire alarm system is monitored 24/7 in a central location.
- An automatic sprinkler system is provided.
- Portable fire extinguishers are provided in all exit corridors.
- Fire evacuation maps are posted inside each bedroom, at elevator lobbies and stairwell entrances.

Fire Drills

Fire drills are held regularly at the facility. There were four fire drills during 2020. Birmingham Fire & Rescue Service is invited to participate. They occasionally visit the facility to do a walk through for pre-fire planning and to make fire safety recommendations. Records of drills are maintained on campus.

Student Housing Policies on Portable Electrical Appliances, Smoking and Open Flames

Appliances

- **Extension Cords:** The use of extension cords in the student apartment is prohibited.
- **Appliances:** Appliances prohibited in the apartment include, but are not limited to: air-conditioning units, ceiling fans, halogen lamps, personal microwaves exceeding 700 watts, personal refrigerators exceeding 4.3 cubic feet, hot plates, personal washers and dryers, space heaters, appliances with open or exposed heating coils, and those which pose an electrical overload hazard.

Fire Safety

- **Arson:** Regardless of size of fire or whether or not damage is caused, starting and/or maintaining a fire or causing an explosion in the apartment or outside area is prohibited.
- **Candles/Incense:** The burning of candles and/or incense is prohibited. Candles with burnt wicks are prohibited.
- **Evacuation Procedures:** Interference with or non-adherence to emergency evacuation procedures in the apartment during a fire drill are prohibited. Returning to the building before the “all-clear” signal has been given after a fire drill is prohibited.
- **Fireworks/Explosive Materials:** The storage, possession, or use of any type of fireworks, firecracker, or explosive material in the apartment or surrounding vicinity is prohibited.
- **Flammable:** The storage, possession, or use of flammable materials/liquids in the apartment is prohibited. Gas grills and gas cylinders/tanks are prohibited.
- **Vandalism of Safety Equipment:** Removal, tampering with, and/or the disabling of fire alarm pull stations, smoke or heat detectors, fire extinguishers, sprinkler heads or other life safety equipment is prohibited.
- **False Fire Alarms:** Activating a fire alarm without due cause and/or falsely reporting a fire to the police or fire department is prohibited.

Smoking

- Smoking is prohibited within all university buildings, facilities, grounds, University-owned vehicles, and property leased to or managed by the university with the exceptions of:
 - Controlled research, or educational, theatrical, or religious ceremonial purposes, with prior approval from the Dean or Director responsible for the facility.
 - Privately-owned vehicles and locations outside of the campus perimeter.
- Littering the campus with remains of disposable tobacco products is prohibited.
- Assistance with smoking cessation for students, faculty and staff is available through the Auburn University Medical Clinic, the Harrison School of Pharmacy, and the Office of Health Promotion and Wellness Services. More information can be found at <http://auburn.edu/smokefree>.

Candles

Candles and other sources of open flame are not permitted inside university buildings.

Fire Evacuation Procedures for All Campus Buildings Including Campus Housing

In the event of a fire or fire alarm:

- Exit the area immediately.
- Close all doors as you leave, taking keys and medications with you if possible. DO NOT delay evacuation to retrieve these items.
- Activate the closest fire alarm pull station along your evacuation route.
- Notify others around you as you leave.
- **Call 911** and report the emergency after you are out of the building and safe.

If the fire is small enough, you may attempt to extinguish it with a portable fire extinguisher, ONLY IF: The fire alarm pull station has been activated; 911 has been dialed; you are properly trained; and the fire is trash can size or similar.

- If leaving a room, feel the door with the back of your hand before opening it. Do not open any door that feels hot.
- If smoke is present, stay low. The best quality air is near the floor.
- Always use stairs to exit upper floors.
- DO NOT use the elevator.
- Once the building is evacuated, do not re-enter it for any reason. Return to the building ONLY when instructed to do so by emergency responders or administrators.
- DO NOT return for personal belongings.
- Direct and assist visitors and persons with disabilities who appear to need direction or assistance.
- Notify the Department of Campus Safety & Security on-call phone (334-750-9795) that a fire has occurred AFTER you exit the building and 911 has been dialed.

If You Are Trapped and Cannot Evacuate

- Close any doors between you and the fire.
- If available, wedge wet towels or cloth materials along the bottom of the door to keep out smoke.
- Call 911 and notify the dispatcher of your location.
- Remain on the phone with the 911 dispatcher as long as possible.
- Break a window only as a last resort, such as needing oxygen to breathe.
- Use caution when breaking any window.

Response to Fire Alarms

- NEVER assume that a fire alarm is a false alarm.
- If the alarm sounds and/or emergency strobes begin to blink, evacuate immediately.

Fire Safety Education and Training Programs

Harris ELC provides a life safety class with portable fire extinguisher training for all staff twice per year on staff development days. The fire safety policies and procedures covered in this document are discussed with Auburn University students residing in on-campus student housing during orientation to their internship.

Risk Management & Safety offers the following education/training to all other faculty, staff and students:

- Portable fire extinguisher training (upon request)
- Other fire safety education as requested

Reporting Fires

Students and employees should report that a fire occurred to the following persons and organizations:

In the event of a fire emergency, report the fire by dialing 911.

After the emergency, please contact the Campus Safety & Security on-call phone at 334-750-9795. Campus Safety & Security is responsible for coordinating Auburn University's response to emergencies, including fires, and will notify Risk Management and Safety for follow-up on investigation, tracking, and recording on the fire log. This information allows us to take proactive measures to reduce future occurrences.

Plans for Future Improvement in Fire Safety

Risk Management and Safety will continue to work collaboratively with the College of Human Sciences, Facilities Management, and other administrative offices to ensure plans for future renovations or new construction projects include required fire protection systems and fire-rated building components. There are currently no specific plans for future fire safety improvements for the Harris Early Learning Center.

Introduction

The Harrison School of Pharmacy Mobile campus ("HSOP Mobile") allows the Harrison School of Pharmacy to admit an additional 24 students per year in the Mobile, Alabama area. Located on the campus of the University of South Alabama, the HSOP Mobile campus provides facilities and services that are virtually identical to those on the Auburn campus in terms of team rooms, furnishings, lecture halls, and technology. The curriculum received by student-pharmacists on both the main Auburn campus and the Mobile campus are identical. Students enrolled in the program in Mobile are Auburn University students and compete for admission with all other applicants, participate in the same student organizations, are eligible for the same scholarships, grants and loans, and pay Auburn tuition. HSOP Mobile graduates will receive a diploma from Auburn which will denote that their work was completed on the Mobile campus.

Because the HSOP Mobile campus is located on the campus of the University of South Alabama (USA), much of the content of this report was taken from the USA Annual Security & Fire Safety Report. Students, faculty and staff may also be interested in reviewing the USA Annual Security and Fire Safety Report in its entirety, which provides crime and fire statistics for the entire USA campus (of which the HSOP Mobile campus is a subset), as well as USA safety information, campus policies, and local resources. Each year, an e-mail notification is sent to HSOP Mobile students, faculty, and staff that provides a direct link to access the report online. Hard copies may be obtained at the USA Police Department, located at Beta Gamma Commons Bldg., 290 Stadium Blvd., or by calling (251) 460-6312.

Printed copies of the USA Crime and Fire Logs are available for viewing in the front lobby of the USA Police Department at 290 Stadium Blvd., on the USA Campus, and are available 24 hours a day. The most recent 60 days of reports are included.

Campus Security Authorities

In addition to the general categories of campus security authorities described earlier in this report, there are several preferred campus security authorities to whom crimes should be reported. For HSOP Mobile Campus, these include:

- Assistant Dean, HSOP Mobile Campus
- Director of AA/EEO and Title IX Coordinator (discrimination, harassment, sexual and gender-based misconduct)

Response to Reports

The University of South Alabama Police Department is available 24 hours a day to answer calls for emergency police, fire or medical assistance. In response to a call, appropriate action will be taken by either dispatching an officer and/or other emergency services or asking the individual reporting the crime to go to the University of South Alabama Police Department to file an incident report. All reported crimes will be investigated by the University of South Alabama Police Department and may become a matter of public record. Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security requests information about crimes occurring on HSOP Mobile's Clery geography from the University of South Alabama Police Department. Certain details from these incident reports may be shared with the Harrison School of Pharmacy or Division of Student Affairs for review and referral for potential disciplinary action, as appropriate. If sexual assault, domestic/dating violence or stalking is reported, details from the incident report will be shared with the Title IX Coordinator for investigation and personnel receiving the report, including University of South Alabama Police Department, will offer the victim a wide variety of services, detailed in the section of this report on sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence and stalking.

Voluntary Confidential Reporting and Anonymous Reporting

Anyone who witnessed, or has been a victim of, a crime is encouraged to immediately report the incident to the University of South Alabama Police Department by dialing 251-460-6312. Police reports in the state of Alabama are public records, meaning that police cannot hold reports of crime in confidence and thus do not allow voluntary confidential or anonymous reporting. The University of South Alabama Police Department maintains an Anonymous Tip Line that can be used for reporting security and safety related concerns, or to provide tips about criminal incidents or behavior on campus or within the City of Mobile. Call the Anonymous Tip Line at 251-460-6667 or text to 251-219-0219.

The Clery Act requires Auburn University to include in our annual crime statistics disclosure all reported

crimes that fall into one of the Clery reportable crime categories and occur on our Clery geography. (See the previous section of this report on Clery Act reporting definitions for more information about Clery reportable crime categories and geography.) Confidential reports for inclusion in the annual disclosure of crime statistics, and for assessment for a timely warning notice, generally can be made to those campus security authorities who are not members of the University of South Alabama Police Department; however, if a violation of the *Title IX Sexual Harassment Policy* or *Policy Against Discrimination and Harassment* is reported, or if there is a potential for a serious or ongoing threat to the campus community, some information may be required to be shared with certain campus administrators. In all cases, every effort will be made to maintain the confidentiality of crime victims to the extent possible. Individuals are always encouraged to report incidents to the police so they can be properly investigated.

Timely Warning of Crimes

Auburn University HSOP Mobile campus relies on the USA Police Department to determine when a timely warning notice should be sent to the campus community. HSOP Mobile students, faculty and staff are treated as members of the USA campus community and receive timely warnings directly from the USA Police Department as outlined below. If the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security becomes aware of a crime that may require a timely warning notice, and a timely warning notice has not yet been sent by the USA Police Department, the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security will consult with the USA Police Department about the possible need for a timely warning notice.

University of South Alabama Timely Warnings (from USA Annual Security & Fire Safety Report)

In the event that a situation arises, either on or off campus, that, in the judgment of the Chief of the University of South Alabama Police Department or a designee, constitutes an ongoing or continuing serious threat to the university community, a campus wide “timely warning” will be issued. The timely warning will include information the Chief of Police or his designee determines is crucial to promote safety, which may include, but is not limited to, information about the reported offense (such as time, location, description, etc.) and pertinent information about suspects. The information obtained about potential victims during the issuance of a timely warning is considered confidential information and will not be shared unless authorized. Timely warnings may be disseminated as follows:

- Email to students’ and employees’ campus email address (The University of South Alabama Police Department is responsible for issuing the timely warning emails. If someone from the police department is unavailable, there are several administrators in the Office of Public Relations who can initiate the email system.)
- Posted on the USAPD website at <http://www.southalabama.edu/police/>
- Postings at other locations, including public and university media channels as deemed appropriate

Updates to the University of South Alabama community about any particular case resulting in a timely warning will normally be distributed via email. Timely warnings are usually distributed for the following Uniform Crime Reporting Program (UCR)/National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS) classifications: arson, criminal homicide, and robbery. Cases of aggravated assault and sex offenses are considered on a case-by-case basis, depending on the facts of the case and the information known by the University of South Alabama Police Department. For example, if an assault occurs between two students who have a disagreement, there may be no ongoing threat to other campus community members and a timely warning would not be distributed. Timely warnings may also be posted for other crime classifications, as deemed necessary.

Emergency Preparedness

The University of South Alabama has adopted the Emergency Response and Recovery Plan designed by the University Safety and Environmental Compliance Committee to provide a guide for potential emergency responses, recovery actions, and mitigation programs. What to Do in the Event of a Campus Emergency

If you have an EMERGENCY requiring police, fire or ambulance, DIAL 251-460-6312 without delay.

- When you dial 251-460-6312 for emergency services, stay on the line and give the following information:
 - Your name, telephone number, and exact location.
 - The location of the emergency.
 - The nature and extent of the emergency (e.g. Are there injuries and how many?)
- Be informed and prepared in advance. Review emergency guidelines and building-specific plans, and do not wait until an emergency strikes to know what to do.
- Be aware of your surroundings and report any suspicious activities.
- Know the locations of fire alarm activation pull stations in your building and how to evacuate your building if the alarm is set off.
- Know the locations of severe weather shelter areas in your building and when to seek shelter.

Emergency Response and Evacuation Procedures

Evacuation Procedures

Emergency response and building evacuation procedures are included in building-specific emergency response plans.

The senior site administrator present (HSOP Mobile director or designee), in coordination with the USA Police Department, is responsible for initiating any partial or campus-wide evacuations. The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security is available 24 hours a day at 334-750-9795 for assistance or consultation as needed.

When deciding whether to conduct an evacuation, consideration will be made for the type of hazard or threat, credibility of the threat, area of campus in danger, and ability to contain the threat to a specified area of campus. The HSOP Mobile campus community may be notified to evacuate on foot or by vehicle, depending on the nature and timing of the threat, as well as other hazards that may impact the safety of persons evacuating.

Communication of an evacuation order should be facilitated through the USA Police Department, which has responsibility for emergency notification on the campus of the University of South Alabama. Messages should include the nature of the incident and directions for the HSOP Mobile campus community, including when the evacuation will begin, how to evacuate (on foot or by vehicle), where to go, and how updates will be provided.

The method and direction of the evacuation route during a campus evacuation will depend on the nature and location of the emergency or disaster warranting the evacuation. Once public safety officials decide it is safe to return, announcements will be made to return to normal operations.

Tests of Emergency Procedures

In addition to the tests scheduled by the Department of Campus Safety & Security, discussed earlier in this report, USA annually conducts exercises and appropriate follow through activities designed to assess, evaluate, and improve campus emergency response procedures. Annually, the USA Office of Public Relations and Human Resources provide communications to the university community regarding university procedures for authorized closings and receiving emergency alerts.

The University of South Alabama has a robust notification system in place. According to the USA Annual Security & Fire Safety Report, the campus siren/broadcast system is tested on a monthly basis, in

conjunction with the monthly tests of the Mobile County Emergency Management Agency's systems. The mass notification system is tested on an annual basis.

Emergency Notifications

The USA Police Department has the primary responsibility of responding to, and summoning the necessary resources to mitigate, investigate, and document, emergencies on the HSOP Mobile campus. The HSOP Mobile campus community relies on the USA Police Department to determine when emergency notification should be sent to the campus community. HSOP Mobile students, faculty and staff are treated as members of the USA campus community and receive notification directly from the USA Police Department as outlined below.

In addition, the USA Police Department has the responsibility to determine if the situation does, in fact, pose a threat to the HSOP Mobile campus community and to immediately send an emergency notification when this determination is made.

Notification Procedure (from USA Annual Security & Fire Safety Report)

Upon confirmation of a significant emergency or dangerous situation on the USA main campus, posing an immediate threat to the health or safety of the campus community, USA will initiate the emergency notification process without delay. Although the USA Police Department is primarily responsible for confirming that there is a significant emergency or dangerous situation and issuing a warning, the Offices of Marketing & Communications and Safety/Environmental Compliance also have access to the emergency notification systems. These three departments have the authority to determine the appropriate segment or segments of the campus community that will receive the alerts, to determine the content of the alert, and to initiate the notification system.

Usually, the USA Chief of Police or his designee will determine the content of the notification, taking into account the safety of the campus community, unless issuing a notification will, in the judgment of the first responders, compromise the efforts to assist a victim or to contain, respond to, or otherwise mitigate the emergency. Based on the circumstances of the threat, the USA Police Department will determine the appropriate segment(s) of the community to receive the notification. For instance, a fire in the Recreational Center might begin with just an evacuation of the Recreational Center but might later be expanded to include the Epsilon 1 & 2 along with Delta 6, if the fire was not quickly brought under control. USA may use one or more of the following notifications systems which it has at its disposal.

Notification Components (from USA Annual Security & Fire Safety Report)

Campus Exterior Sirens/Public Address System

In addition to a siren signal, the system can broadcast pre-recorded messages or live messages via university police officers' radios.

Everbridge System – This system provides simultaneous outbound messaging services such as phone, SMS, text, and email communications. Members of the USA community, including HSOP Mobile students and employees, are automatically enrolled in this system through their PAWS account.

Global E-mail – USA has designated emails as the primary means of campus-wide communication.

Emergency & Weather Hotline (251) 460-6999 – This recorded telephone line provides official information bulletins regarding campus emergencies, severe weather, and campus closures. Information can also be accessed at: <http://www.southalabama.edu/alert/>.

Other notification means are used as they are determined to be appropriate, given the circumstances and the segment of campus that needs to be notified.

The University of South Alabama Chief of Police or designee, in consultation with the Office of Marketing & Communications, will determine if emergency information needs to be disseminated to the larger community via local media outlets or otherwise.

In making determinations about whether an emergency exists and/or sending emergency notifications, the USA Chief of Police or designee may consult with members of the Department of Safety and Environmental Compliance, the President's Council, the Emergency Response and Recovery Team, Office of Marketing & Communications, campus security authorities, local emergency response agencies, and any other individuals relevant to the situation.

University of South Alabama Emergency Response and Recovery Plan Manuals are posted in each campus building generally by the elevators or the front entrance. Basic information about the emergency response and evacuation procedures for University of South Alabama are publicized each year as part of the Annual Security & Fire Safety Reports.

Campus Security and Law Enforcement (from USA Annual Security & Fire Safety Report)

The University of South Alabama Police Department exists to meet the unique law enforcement needs of the university community. Therefore, they engage in community-oriented policing that actively encourages input from the community and utilizes innovative crime interdiction, prevention, and public education methods to foster a safe environment on campus. All USA police officers have completed an Alabama Post certified academy and undergo semi-annual firearms training. Additionally, officers are required to complete a minimum of 12 hours of continued education training each year. USA police officers are sworn state law enforcement officers and are empowered by legislation (Code of Alabama 16-55-10) to enforce all state and local laws, and may make arrests for any offense occurring, or having probable cause to believe occurred, within their presence or anywhere within the State of Alabama. Their primary responsibility is the enforcement of the law on institution property, owned, leased, or otherwise controlled by the institution; however, their authority extends to any place in the State of Alabama. All law enforcement matters are handled within the USA Police Department, including initial complaint taking, criminal investigations, and arrests.

The USA Police Department is directed by the Chief of Police, Patrol and Administrative Captains, and Investigative and Special Operations Lieutenants. The Department is comprised of 28 sworn police officers, and a full-time support staff of seven civilian employees. It operates 24/365 and provides full police services to the university community, including the HSOP Mobile campus.

The USA Health System also employs security guards at its hospitals and some related clinics. These security guards are managed by the local campus administrator and not the USA Police Department. They have citizen arrest powers as provided by state law; however, they are not armed. USA Police supplements the security staff with sworn police officers.

USA police officers work closely with local, state, and federal law enforcement agencies, including the Mobile Police Department, Mobile County Sheriff's Office, Alabama Law Enforcement Agency, Alabama Bureau of Investigations, and the Federal Bureau of Investigations, sharing relevant information and providing mutual assistance as needed. Officers of the USA Police Department and Mobile Police Department communicate regularly on the scene of incidents that occur around the campus, and on occasion, local police officers work under contract with the USA Police Department to provide supplemental services for special events.

Members of the USA Police Department serve on various joint taskforces and attend and participate in various multi-agency meetings and briefings. While the USA Police Department regularly shares information, there is no written memorandum of understanding between the USA Police Department and

Mobile Police Department as the USA Police Department has the responsibility and authority to conduct all investigations for all crimes that occur on university owned or leased property.

USA Police have direct radio communication with local emergency response agencies via radio. USA Police utilize various law enforcement databases and system for accessing criminal history data, nationwide police records, driver/vehicle identification information, as well as other local, state, and federal law enforcement information. University police participate in the F.B.I.'s National Incident Based Reporting Program and routinely submit all crime reports to them through the Alabama Law Enforcement Agency's NIBRS reporting system.

The USA Police Department patrols the USA main campus, including the HSOP Mobile campus, and bordering streets, including: University Blvd., Old Shell Rd., and Hillcrest Rd.

Noncampus Organizations

Students at the HSOP Mobile campus have the opportunity to participate in recognized student organizations, coordinated through the Main Campus Office of Student Involvement. The Division of Student Affairs maintains contact with these recognized student organizations. Criminal activity by students engaged in activities at noncampus locations of student organizations officially recognized by the university is responded to by local law enforcement. The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security receives information on student organization registered events and requests information about crimes reported at these locations from local law enforcement at least annually.

Access to and Security of Campus Facilities

The HSOP Mobile campus is located on the University of South Alabama campus, which is generally open to the public during normal hours of operation. Schedules for campus buildings fluctuate depending on the nature of their operations, as well as events and class schedules. The University of South Alabama Police Department is open 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

During business hours, the University of South Alabama is open to students, parents, employees, contractors, guests, and invitees. During non-business hours, access to all college facilities is by key, electronic, and/or alarm access code, if issued in accordance with university policies, or by admittance via the Facilities Management Department at (251) 460-7655.

USA academic buildings are open during the day and evening hours when classes are in session. Some facilities may have additional hours, which may vary at different times of the year. Examples are the Recreation Center, University libraries, and the Mitchell Center. In these cases, the facilities will be secured according to schedules developed by the department responsible for the facility. Emergencies or other considerations may necessitate changes or alterations to any posted schedules.

The HSOP Mobile campus, located on the second floor of the former USA Health Services Building, is accessed using proximity card readers issued to students and employees. During business hours (7:45-11:45 a.m. and 12:45-4:45 p.m., Monday through Friday), the front door is open. This is the only way for visitors to enter, and visitors are only allowed unescorted into the front office area. Students have their own entrance, which provides direct access to classrooms, which are open during the day, and team rooms, which have restricted access.

USA has a camera system in place to monitor activity in and around some public areas on campus.

Maintenance of Campus Facilities

A Campus Safety Walk is held each fall and spring semester and includes members of the USA campus community (faculty, staff and students) as well as representatives of Facilities Management, USA Police Department, and the Office of Safety and Environmental Compliance. This group walks the campus and also reviews campus lighting, landscaping, signage, and other aspects of campus grounds and facilities in order to identify any safety concerns to be addressed.

Introduction

The Harrison School of Pharmacy Montgomery Campus (HSOP Montgomery) is located approximately 55 miles from Auburn University's main campus at 101 South Union Street, Montgomery, AL. The site is operated by Auburn University under a memorandum of understanding with the State Employee Insurance Board. This location is home to the State Wellness Center, which provides urgent care and pharmacy services for State Employee Insurance Board beneficiaries. The Center is one of the many rotational sites for fourth year students in the Harrison School of Pharmacy. Students attend eight, five-week long rotations, and there are generally three or four students completing their rotation at any given time. During normal business hours, the campus is regularly patrolled by the Capitol Police as part of their normal duties.

Campus Security Authorities

In addition to the general categories of campus security authorities described earlier in this report, there are several preferred campus security authorities to whom crimes should be reported. For the HSOP Montgomery Campus, these include:

- Executive Director, HSOP Montgomery (State Wellness Center)
- Director of AA/EEO and Title IX Coordinator (discrimination, harassment, sexual and gender-based misconduct)

Response to Reports

The Montgomery Police Department and/or Capitol Police are available 24 hours a day to answer calls for emergency police, fire or medical assistance. In response to a call, appropriate action will be taken by either dispatching an officer and/or other emergency services or asking the individual reporting the crime to go to the respective department to file a report. All reported crimes will be investigated by the Montgomery Police Department and/or Capitol Police and may become a matter of public record. The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security requests information about crimes occurring on HSOP

Montgomery's Clery geography from the Montgomery Police Department, Capitol Police, and other law enforcement agencies with jurisdiction over the facility. Certain details from these incident reports may be shared with the Division of Student Affairs for review and referral to the Office of Student Conduct for potential action, as appropriate. If sexual assault, domestic/dating violence or stalking is reported, details from the incident report will be shared with the Title IX Coordinator for investigation and personnel receiving the report, including HSOP Montgomery staff, will offer the victim a wide variety of services, detailed in the section of this report on sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence and stalking.

Voluntary Confidential Reporting and Anonymous Reporting

Anyone who witnessed or has been a victim of a crime is encouraged to immediately report the incident to the Montgomery Police Department by dialing 911, or for non-emergency situations, 334-241-2651. Individuals may also choose to contact the Capitol Police in non-emergency situations at 334-242-0700. Police reports in the state of Alabama are public records, meaning that police cannot hold reports of crime in confidence and thus do not allow voluntary confidential reporting. The Central Alabama Crime Stoppers tip line can be used for reporting security and safety related concerns, or to provide tips about criminal incidents or behavior on campus or within the City of Montgomery. The Clery Act requires Auburn University to include in our annual crime statistics disclosure all reported crimes that fall into one of the Clery reportable crime categories and occur on our Clery geography. (See the previous section of this report on Clery Act reporting definitions for more information about Clery reportable crime categories and geography.) Confidential reports for inclusion in the annual disclosure of crime statistics, and for assessment for a timely warning notice, generally can be made to campus security authorities; however, if a violation of the *Title IX Sexual Harassment Policy* or *Policy Against Discrimination and Harassment* is reported, or if there is a potential for a serious or ongoing threat to the campus community, some information may be required to be shared with certain campus administrators. In all cases, every effort will be made to maintain the confidentiality of crime victims to the extent possible. Individuals are always encouraged to report incidents to the police so they can be properly investigated.

Timely Warning of Crimes

The HSOP Montgomery Campus executive director, or designee, will determine if a crime reported represents a serious or ongoing threat to students and employees, develop the content of the message, and initiate distribution. The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security on-call supervisor is available 24/7 at 334-750-9795 to assist with this process as needed. Timely warnings will generally be distributed to the HSOP Montgomery campus community via blast e-mail and in person via site administrators.

Emergency Preparedness

What to Do in the Event of a Campus Emergency

If you have an EMERGENCY requiring police, fire or ambulance, DIAL 911 without delay.

- When you dial 911 for emergency services, stay on the line and give the following information:
 - Your name, telephone number, and exact location.
 - The location of the emergency.
 - The nature and extent of the emergency (e.g. Are there injuries and how many?)
- Be informed and prepared in advance. Review emergency guidelines and building-specific plans, and do not wait until an emergency strikes to know what to do.
- Be aware of your surroundings and report any suspicious activities.
- Know the locations of fire alarm activation pull stations in your building and how to evacuate your building if the alarm is set off.
- Know the locations of severe weather shelter areas in your building and when to seek shelter.

Emergency Response and Evacuation Procedures

Emergency response and building evacuation procedures are included in building-specific emergency response plans available through the AU Department of Campus Safety & Security.

The senior site administrator present (HSOP Montgomery director, assistant director or designee), in coordination with the Montgomery Police Department and/or Capitol Police, is responsible for initiating any partial or campus-wide evacuations. The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security is available 24 hours a day at 334-750-9795 for assistance or consultation as needed.

When deciding whether to conduct an evacuation, consideration will be made for the type of hazard or threat, credibility of the threat, area of campus in danger, and ability to contain the threat to a specified area of campus. The HSOP Montgomery campus community may be notified to evacuate on foot or by vehicle, depending on the nature and timing of the threat, as well as other hazards that may impact the safety of persons evacuating.

Communication of an evacuation order should be facilitated through the senior site administrator present, using the AU ALERT system. Messages should include the nature of the incident and directions for the HSOP Montgomery campus community, including when the evacuation will begin, how to evacuate (on foot or by vehicle), where to go, and how updates will be provided.

The method and direction of the evacuation route during a campus evacuation will depend on the nature and location of the emergency or disaster warranting the evacuation. Once public safety officials decide it is safe to return, announcements will be made to return to normal operations.

Emergency Notifications

The Montgomery Police Department has the primary responsibility of responding to, and summoning the necessary resources to mitigate, investigate, and document, emergencies on campus. HSOP Montgomery campus resources can be requested through the site manager, and additional university resources can be requested through the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security. In addition, the Montgomery Police Department has the responsibility to determine if the situation does, in fact, pose a threat to the HSOP Montgomery community and to notify the senior site administrator present (HSOP Montgomery site manager or designee) when this determination is made. If a situation poses an immediate threat to the HSOP Montgomery campus community, the institution will immediately notify the campus community or the appropriate segments of the community that may be affected by the situation.

The HSOP Montgomery site administration and Auburn University Campus Safety & Security utilize different methods of emergency notification depending on the nature of the incident or event requiring notification, as further outlined below.

Notification Procedure

Upon confirmation by the Montgomery Police Department, Capitol Police or other responding public safety agency that a significant emergency or dangerous situation poses an immediate threat to the health or safety of members of the HSOP Montgomery campus community, the agency making the determination will immediately notify the HSOP Montgomery senior site administrator present and/or the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security. The HSOP Montgomery site administration or Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security may receive information regarding significant emergencies or dangerous situations from other sources as well, such as university administrators, other first responders, the Auburn University Medical Clinic director or public health officials (for public health emergencies) and the National Weather Service. In such cases, the HSOP Montgomery site administration will be responsible for confirming that a significant emergency or dangerous situation poses an immediate threat to the health or safety of the HSOP Montgomery community. This may be done in consultation with the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security and/or first responders, if needed.

Upon confirmation of an immediate threat to the safety or health of the HSOP Montgomery campus community, the HSOP Montgomery site administration, in consultation with the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security as needed, will, without delay and taking into account the safety of the community, determine the content of the notification and initiate the notification system, unless issuing a notification will, in the professional judgment of first responders (including, but not limited to, the

Montgomery Police Department, Capitol Police and Montgomery Fire/Rescue), compromise the efforts to assist a victim or to contain, respond to, or otherwise mitigate the emergency.

The HSOP Montgomery site administration, with support from the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security, is charged with coordinating communication of immediate threats to the HSOP Montgomery community, or to the appropriate segment(s) of the community that may be affected, and will determine the content of the notification using all available information. The content will convey the nature of the threat and immediate actions to be taken by the campus community or affected segment thereof. The notification will be initiated by a trained member of the HSOP Montgomery site administration (or Auburn University Campus Safety & Security, if requested). Campus staff members are instructed that they are responsible for notifying others on the campus without delaying taking protective action for themselves.

Emergency Notification System

Auburn University has numerous systems in place for communicating information quickly to HSOP Montgomery students, faculty, staff, and visitors. The main components of the AU ALERT System that are used for notification to the HSOP Montgomery campus are briefly described below.

Text and E-mail Messaging

This contracted emergency notification system has the ability to notify students, faculty, and staff of critical information and situations affecting campus through the use of text messages to multiple phone numbers and e-mail to multiple e-mail addresses. This system makes immediate notifications to the HSOP Montgomery campus community without delay. All active university e-mail addresses are automatically included in the system for main campus alerts. Students, faculty, and staff are encouraged to sign up with a phone number by logging into AU Access and clicking on the “Add/Update AU ALERT Contacts” link located on the My Campus tab. Visit www.auburn.edu/aualert for more information. HSOP Montgomery students, faculty and staff are encouraged to also subscribe to alerts that are specific to the HSOP Montgomery campus by clicking on the “Opt-In Lists” tab in their AU ALERT profile and selecting to receive alerts for the “HSOP Montgomery” group.

Outdoor Warning Sirens

Montgomery Emergency Management Agency has numerous sirens located near the HSOP Montgomery campus in the downtown area. These sirens are primarily sounded for tornado warnings affecting the area. Sirens are intended to reach those who are outside at the time of the notification. The Montgomery outdoor warning siren system is tested on the first Wednesday of each month at 3:30 p.m. (weather permitting).

NOAA Weather Radios

A NOAA weather radio is located in the site manager’s office. NOAA weather radios receive information directly from the National Weather Service. This information includes current weather and also any issued watches or warnings for Montgomery County, Alabama, where the HSOP Montgomery campus is located.

Building Fire Alarms

A fire alarm is in place to notify building occupants of possible fire dangers in the building. If you hear the fire alarm, evacuate the building immediately. The fire alarm has a distinct tone that is not used for any other purposes.

Additional Notification Methods

Emergency management personnel are routinely evaluating and adopting new technologies for emergency notification in an effort to most effectively reach members of the campus community during an emergency.

Alerts for the HSOP Montgomery campus are developed and distributed to the HSOP Montgomery community by site administrators, but the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security is also available 24 hours a day at 334-750-9795 to immediately send a notification if needed.

Emergency Updates

Pertinent follow-up information will be disseminated as soon as it is available. For members of the campus community, updates and follow-up messages may be sent via any of the communication methods listed above. In addition, for members of the larger community (parents, neighbors, etc.), the HSOP Montgomery

campus will post information during a significant emergency or dangerous situation on its Web page at <http://www.auburn.edu/academic/pharmacy/phs/clinic/swc.html>.

Campus Security and Law Enforcement

The HSOP Montgomery campus is located in downtown Montgomery in the State Wellness Center. The Montgomery Police Department is the primary law enforcement agency responsible for responding to emergencies and investigating criminal incidents for the HSOP Montgomery campus. Montgomery Police Department sworn officers conduct investigations, write reports for all criminal offenses, and enforce all laws. The Montgomery Police Department patrols the area from 10:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m., but responds to emergency calls for service 24 hours a day.

Capitol Police have responsibility for providing physical security to all state buildings, including the State Wellness Center, and patrol the area from 6:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. Capitol Police may be dispatched to respond to emergency calls for service but are generally not the primary responding agency.

The HSOP Montgomery campus does not have a campus police or security department and does not employ security personnel or contract for such services. Local law enforcement personnel patrol on and near the campus, but not through a written agreement or contract for these services.

Auburn University strives to maintain an excellent working relationship with local and state law enforcement agencies, including the Montgomery Police Department, Capitol Police, Montgomery County Sheriff's Office and Alabama Law Enforcement Agency.

Noncampus Organizations

Students at the HSOP Montgomery campus have the opportunity to participate in recognized student organizations, coordinated through the Main Campus Office of Student Involvement. The Division of Student Affairs maintains contact with these recognized student organizations. Criminal activity by students engaged in activities at noncampus locations of student organizations officially recognized by the university is responded to by local law enforcement. The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security receives information on student organization registered events and requests information about crimes reported at these locations from local law enforcement at least annually.

Alabama State Capitol Police are responsible for providing physical security to all state buildings, but their primary focus area is the Capitol complex area, due to the large number of state employees and significant number of state buildings in that area

Parking Safety

Students and staff at the HSOP Montgomery campus have access to the parking garage adjacent to the State Wellness Center building. Students have parking access on the second level, and staff members have access on the first level. Students and staff are encouraged to use the buddy system or request an escort to avoid walking to their vehicles alone at night.

Access to and Security of Campus Facilities

The HSOP Montgomery campus is generally open to staff, students, and patients with insurance provided by the State Employees Insurance Board during normal hours of operation (8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday, with the exception of state holidays). The Pharmacy is open 7:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Monday through Wednesday and Friday, and 9:00 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. on Thursday.

The HSOP Montgomery campus utilizes electronic card access for access to both the building and parking deck. The front door and lobby area are open during normal business hours. Access to other areas of the building is restricted to staff (including students on rotation) and patients. For information about the access protocol for the building, see the HSOP Montgomery site manager.

An alarm system is also in place in the building, which is activated when the building is closed. A security camera system is in place to monitor activity in and around many public areas on campus for the protection of students, staff, and patients. The State Employees Insurance Board maintains camera footage that is monitored and reviewed, if needed.

Capitol Police officers patrol the facility on a regular basis between the hours of 6:00 a.m. and 10:00 p.m. Montgomery Police Department officers patrol the area from 10:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m. Officers patrol the campus via foot, bike, and cars.

Maintenance of Campus Facilities

Facilities and landscaping are maintained in a manner that minimizes hazardous conditions. Personnel from the State Employees Insurance Board regularly patrol the campus and report malfunctioning lights and other unsafe physical conditions to Department of Finance for correction.

Other members of the HSOP Montgomery campus community are encouraged to report equipment problems or unsafe conditions to the site manager so they may be corrected in a timely manner.

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Campus Security Authorities

In addition to the general categories of campus security authorities described earlier in this report, there are several preferred campus security authorities to whom crimes should be reported. For the Miller Center campus, these include:

- Executive Director, Miller Poultry Research Center
- Director of AA/EEO and Title IX Coordinator (discrimination, harassment, sexual and gender-based misconduct)

Response to Reports

The City of Auburn Public Safety Department is available 24 hours a day to answer calls for emergency police, fire or medical assistance. In response to a call, appropriate action will be taken by either dispatching an officer and/or other emergency services or asking the individual reporting the crime to go to the City of Auburn Police Division to file a report.

When a crime is reported to the Auburn Police Division, an Incident/Offense Report will be created. The City of Auburn Police Division is responsible for investigating criminal activity at Auburn University. Portions of the report are a matter of public record, but information containing personally identifying information (PII) may only be released to the public at the direction of the Police Chief. The victim will be asked to provide a statement. Witnesses and/or possible suspects may be interviewed. Evidence will be collected, where available. Auburn Police Division will earnestly attempt to keep victims informed of the progress of the investigation.

Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security receives accident, incident, and arrest reports, as well as non-traffic citations, from the City of Auburn Police Division for incidents occurring on the university's Clery geography on a regular basis. The Department of Campus Safety & Security also receives reports of student arrests and serious incidents (to include acts of violence) involving students regardless of location. Certain details from reports received, or full reports, may be shared with the Division of Student Affairs for review and referral to the Office of Student Conduct for potential action, if the behavior documented is in violation of university policy. If sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, or stalking is reported, details from the incident report will be shared with the Title IX Coordinator for investigation, and personnel receiving the report, including City of Auburn Police Division, will offer the victim a wide variety of services, detailed in the previous section of this report on sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence and stalking.

Voluntary Confidential Reporting and Anonymous Reporting

Anyone who witnesses, or has been a victim of, a crime is encouraged to immediately report the incident to the City of Auburn Police Division by dialing 911, or 334-501-3100 (for non-emergency situations or delayed reports). Police reports in the state of Alabama are public records, meaning that police cannot hold reports of crime in confidence and thus do not allow voluntary confidential or anonymous reporting. The City of Auburn Police Division maintains a Crime Stoppers tip line that can be used for reporting security and safety related concerns, or to provide tips about criminal incidents or behavior on campus or within the City of Auburn. Call or text Crime Stoppers at 334-246-1391.

The Clery Act requires Auburn University to include in our annual crime statistics disclosure all reported crimes that fall into one of the Clery reportable crime categories and occur on our Clery geography. (See the previous section of this report on Clery Act reporting definitions for more information about Clery reportable crime categories and geography.) Confidential reports for inclusion in the annual disclosure of crime statistics, and for assessment for a timely warning notice, generally can be made to those campus security authorities who are not members of the City of Auburn Police Division; however, if a violation of the

Title IX Sexual Harassment Policy or Policy Against Discrimination and Harassment is reported, or if there is a potential for a serious or ongoing threat to the campus community, some information may be required to be shared with certain campus administrators. In all cases, every effort will be made to maintain the confidentiality of crime victims to the extent possible. Individuals are always encouraged to report incidents to the police so they can be properly investigated.

Timely Warning of Crimes

The Miller Center campus executive director, or designee, will determine if a crime reported represents a serious or ongoing threat to students and employees, develop the content of the message, and initiate distribution. The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security on-call supervisor is available 24/7 at 334-750-9795 to assist with this process as needed. Timely warnings will generally be distributed to the Miller Center campus community via blast e-mail and in person via site administrators.

Emergency Preparedness

What to Do in the Event of a Campus Emergency

If you have an EMERGENCY requiring police, fire or ambulance, DIAL 911 without delay.

- When you dial 911 for emergency services, stay on the line and give the following information:
 - Your name, telephone number, and exact location.
 - The location of the emergency.
 - The nature and extent of the emergency (e.g. Are there injuries and how many?)
- Be informed and prepared in advance. Review emergency guidelines and building-specific plans, and do not wait until an emergency strikes to know what to do.
- Be aware of your surroundings and report any suspicious activities.
- Know the locations of fire alarm activation pull stations in your building and how to evacuate your building if the alarm is set off.
- Know the locations of severe weather shelters on the campus and when to seek shelter.

Emergency Response and Evacuation Procedures

Emergency response and building evacuation procedures are included in building-specific emergency response plans available through the AU Department of Campus Safety & Security.

The senior site administrator present (a Miller Center director, associate director, nutrition coordinator, or designee), in coordination with the City of Auburn Public Safety Department or other first responders, is responsible for initiating any partial or campus-wide evacuations. The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security is available 24 hours a day at 334-750-9795 for assistance or consultation as needed.

When deciding whether to conduct an evacuation, consideration will be made for the type of hazard or threat, credibility of the threat, area of campus in danger, and ability to contain the threat to a specified area of campus. The Miller Center campus community may be notified to evacuate on foot or by vehicle, depending on the nature and timing of the threat, as well as other hazards that may impact the safety of persons evacuating.

Communication of an evacuation order should be facilitated through the senior site administrator present, using the AU ALERT system. Messages should include the nature of the incident and directions for the Miller Center campus community, including when the evacuation will begin, how to evacuate (on foot or by vehicle), where to go, and how updates will be provided.

The method and direction of the evacuation route during a campus evacuation will depend on the nature and location of the emergency or disaster warranting the evacuation. Once public safety officials decide it is safe to return, announcements will be made to return to normal operations.

Emergency Notifications

The City of Auburn Public Safety Department has the primary responsibility of responding to, and summoning the necessary resources to mitigate, investigate, and document, emergencies on campus. University resources can be requested through the Miller Center's site administrator or the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security. In addition, the City of Auburn Public Safety Department has the responsibility to determine if the situation does, in fact, pose a threat to the Miller Center campus community and to notify the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security when this determination is made. If a situation poses an immediate threat to the Miller Center campus community, the institution (via a trained member of the AU ALERT Notification Team, defined later) will immediately notify the campus community or the appropriate segments of the community that may be affected by the situation.

The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security establishes and maintains emergency notification systems for the university and utilizes different methods of emergency notification depending on the nature of the incident or event, as further outlined below.

Notification Procedure

Upon confirmation by the City of Auburn Public Safety Department (Police or Fire Division) that a significant emergency or dangerous situation poses an immediate threat to the health or safety of members of the Miller Center campus community, the City of Auburn Public Safety Department will either immediately notify the campus community directly using the AU ALERT system or will notify the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security to do so.

The Miller Center's site administration or Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security may receive information regarding significant emergencies or dangerous situations from other sources as well, such as university administrators, other first responders, the Auburn University Medical Clinic director or public health officials (for public health emergencies) and the National Weather Service. In such cases, the Miller Center site administration will be responsible for confirming that a significant emergency or dangerous situation poses an immediate threat to the health or safety of the Miller Center campus community. Factors that are quickly considered in making this determination include the nature, timing, location, and anticipated duration of the threat as well as the population and activities that may be impacted. This may be done in conjunction with the AU Department of Campus Safety & Security and/or first responders, if needed.

Upon confirmation of an immediate threat to the safety or health of the campus community, the senior Miller Center site administrator, in consultation with Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security as needed, will, without delay and taking into account the safety of the community, determine the content of the notification and initiate the notification system, unless issuing a notification will, in the professional judgment of first responders (including, but not limited to, the City of Auburn Police Division, the City of Auburn Fire Division, and Emergency Medical Services), compromise the efforts to assist a victim or to contain, respond to, or otherwise mitigate the emergency.

The Miller Center site administration, with support from the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security, is charged with coordinating communication of immediate threats to the Miller Center campus community, or to the appropriate segment(s) of the community that may be affected. Pre-written templates are in place that can quickly be utilized for initial notification of protective actions needed. A member of the AU ALERT Notification Team, which consists of designated and trained members of the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security, the City of Auburn Public Safety Department, and key site administrators, will determine the content of the initial notification using all available information. The content will convey the nature of the threat and immediate actions to be taken by the campus community or affected segment thereof. The notification will be initiated by a member of the AU ALERT Notification Team. The Department of Campus Safety & Security will determine the content of all subsequent messaging providing updated information and protective actions to the campus community, as additional information becomes available.

Emergency Notification System

Auburn University has numerous systems in place for communicating information quickly to Miller Center campus students, faculty, staff, and visitors. The main components of the AU ALERT System that are used for notification to the Miller Center campus are briefly described below.

Text and E-mail Messaging

This contracted emergency notification system has the ability to notify students, faculty, and staff of critical information and situations affecting campus through the use of text messages to multiple phone numbers and e-mail to multiple e-mail addresses. This system makes immediate notifications to the Miller Center campus community without delay. All active university e-mail addresses are automatically included in the system for main campus alerts. Students, faculty, and staff are required to sign up with a phone number by logging into AU Access and clicking on the “Add/Update AU ALERT Contacts” link located on the My Campus tab. Visit www.auburn.edu/aualert for more information. Miller Center students, faculty and staff are encouraged to also subscribe to alerts that are specific to the Miller Center campus by clicking on the “Groups” tab in their AU ALERT profile and selecting to receive text and/or email alerts for the “Miller Center” group.

NOAA Weather Radios

A NOAA weather radio is in place in the main reception area. It receives information directly from the National Weather Service. This information includes current weather and also any issued watches or warnings for Lee County, Alabama, where the Miller Center campus is located. The radio is issued to a point of contact within the building that can relay the information that is received to others in the building.

Building Fire Alarms

Fire alarms are in place to notify building occupants of possible fire dangers. If you hear the fire alarm, evacuate the building immediately. The fire alarm has a distinct tone that is not used for any other purpose. Mass notification capabilities are also available through the fire alarm system. Live voice messages can be broadcast by trained site administrators to provide verbal instructions to building occupants for any type of emergency.

Additional Notification Methods

The messages for all systems listed above are developed and distributed to the university community by a member of the AU ALERT Notification Team. The Office of Communications and Marketing may also develop similar messages and distribute them to the news media, as deemed necessary. The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security may communicate directly with the news media at the direction of the executive director of Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security.

Emergency Updates

Pertinent follow-up information will be disseminated as soon as it is available. For members of the campus community, updates and follow-up messages may be sent via any of the communication methods listed above.

Campus Security and Law Enforcement

The City of Auburn Public Safety Department (Police Division) provides police services, including the investigation of criminal incidents, for the campus through a contract with Auburn University. Sworn officers conduct investigations, write reports for all criminal offenses, and enforce all laws and university policies. These officers are armed and have full arrest powers. The University Precinct is collocated with the Department of Campus Safety & Security at 543 W Magnolia Ave and is open 24 hours a day year-round. Through contract with Auburn University, Auburn Police Division provides law enforcement services for Miller Center Clery geography (on campus and public property) when working on behalf of Auburn University.

Auburn University maintains an excellent working relationship with local and state law enforcement agencies, including the City of Auburn Police Division, Lee County Sheriff's Office, and Alabama Law Enforcement Agency. Radio communication is in place with these agencies. While no formal written agreement exists with any law enforcement agency other than the Auburn Police Division, the university enjoys full cooperation and assistance from all other agencies with jurisdiction over university facilities on main campus and its multiple separate campuses.

Noncampus Organizations

Students at the Miller Center campus have the opportunity to participate in recognized student organizations, coordinated through the Main Campus Office of Student Involvement. The Division of Student Affairs maintains contact with these recognized student organizations. Criminal activity by students engaged in activities at noncampus locations of student organizations officially recognized by the university is responded to by local law enforcement. The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security receives information on student organization registered events and requests information about crimes reported at these locations from local law enforcement at least annually.

Night Transportation

Campus Night Security Shuttle Service

Destination: On Campus

The Night Security Shuttle Service offers a safe ride between on-campus locations from 6 p.m. to 7 a.m. seven days a week when classes are in session hours may vary for the evenings of home football games and official Auburn University holidays. Security Escort Service

The City of Auburn Police Division offers, without charge, an on-campus security escort service when the Campus Security Shuttle is not in operation. If you need an escort, phone Auburn Police Division at 334-501-3100. An officer will respond to your location and escort you to your campus destination. The Security Escort Service is available during university holidays and semester breaks.

Access to and Security of Campus Facilities

The Miller Center buildings are secured using a combination of electronic and keyed locks. The main office building is open to the public during normal hours of operation (7:45 a.m. to 4:45 p.m., Monday through Friday). For information about the access protocol for a specific building, see the executive director.

Gates across driveways leading into the facility are kept closed and locked after hours.

City of Auburn Police Division officers patrol the campus on a regular basis via cars.

Maintenance of Campus Facilities

Facilities and landscaping are maintained in a manner that minimizes hazardous conditions. Campus personnel report malfunctioning lights and other safety-related devices to Facilities Management. Other members of the campus community are encouraged to report equipment problems or unsafe conditions to the executive director.

Response to Reports

Local responders are available 24 hours a day to answer calls via 911 for emergency police, fire or medical assistance. In response to a call, appropriate action will be taken by dispatching an officer and/or other emergency services. All reported crimes will be investigated by the Hale County Sheriff's Office and may become a matter of public record. The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security requests information about crimes occurring on Rural Studio's Clery geography from the Hale County Sheriff's Office. Certain details from reports received, or full reports, may be shared with the Division of Student Affairs for review and referral to the Office of Student Conduct for potential action, if the behavior documented is in violation of university policy. If sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, or stalking is reported, details from the incident report will be shared with the Title IX Coordinator for investigation. University personnel will offer the victim a wide variety of services, detailed in the previous section of this report on sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking.

Voluntary Confidential Reporting and Anonymous Reporting

Anyone who witnessed, or has been a victim of, a crime is encouraged to immediately report the incident to the Hale County Sheriff's Office by dialing 911, or 334-624-3081 (for non-emergency situations or delayed reports). Police reports in the state of Alabama are public records, meaning that police cannot hold reports of crime in confidence and thus do not allow voluntary confidential or anonymous reporting.

The Clery Act requires Auburn University to include in our annual crime statistics disclosure all reported crimes that fall into one of the Clery reportable crime categories and occur on our Clery geography. (See the previous section of this report on Clery Act reporting definitions for more information about Clery

reportable crime categories and geography.) Confidential reports for inclusion in the annual disclosure of crime statistics, and for assessment for a timely warning notice, generally can be made to campus security authorities; however, if a violation of the *Title IX Sexual Harassment Policy* or *Policy Against Discrimination and Harassment* is reported, or if there is a potential for a serious or ongoing threat to the campus community, some information may be required to be shared with certain campus administrators. In all cases, every effort will be made to maintain the confidentiality of crime victims to the extent possible. Individuals are always encouraged to report incidents to the police so they can be properly investigated.

Timely Warning of Crimes

The Rural Studio Campus director, or designee, will determine if a crime reported represents a serious or ongoing threat to students and employees, develop the content of the message, and initiate distribution. The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security on-call supervisor is available 24/7 at 334-750-9795 to assist with this process as needed. Timely warnings will generally be distributed to the Rural Studio campus community via blast e-mail and in person via site administrators.

Emergency Preparedness

What to Do in the Event of a Campus Emergency

If you have an EMERGENCY requiring police, fire or ambulance, DIAL 911 without delay.

- When you dial 911 for emergency services, stay on the line and give the following information:
 - Your name, telephone number, and exact location.
 - The location of the emergency.
 - The nature and extent of the emergency (e.g. Are there injuries and how many?)
- Be informed and prepared in advance. Review emergency guidelines and building-specific plans, and do not wait until an emergency strikes to know what to do.
- Be aware of your surroundings and report any suspicious activities.
- Know how to evacuate your building if a smoke detector is activated.
- Know the location of the severe weather shelter area for the campus and when to seek shelter.
- Know the locations of the automated external defibrillators (AEDs) and be prepared to use them if someone is unresponsive and not breathing normally. The AEDs at the Rural Studio Campus are fully automated and can be used by any lay person.

Emergency Response and Evacuation Procedures

Emergency response and building evacuation procedures are included in building-specific emergency response plans.

The senior site administrator present (Rural Studio Director, assistant director, office manager, or designee), in coordination with the Hale County Sheriff's Office or other first responders, is responsible for initiating any partial or campus-wide evacuations. The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security is available 24 hours a day at 334-750-9795 for assistance or consultation as needed.

When deciding whether to conduct an evacuation, consideration will be made for the type of hazard or threat, credibility of the threat, area of campus in danger, and ability to contain the threat to a specified area of campus. The Rural Studio campus community may be notified to evacuate on foot or by vehicle, depending on the nature and timing of the threat, as well as other hazards that may impact the safety of persons evacuating.

Communication of an evacuation order should be facilitated through the senior site administrator present, using the AU ALERT system. Messages should include the nature of the incident and directions for the Rural Studio campus community, including when the evacuation will begin, how to evacuate (on foot or by vehicle), where to go, and how updates will be provided.

The method and direction of the evacuation route during a campus evacuation will depend on the nature and location of the emergency or disaster warranting the evacuation. Once public safety officials decide it is safe to return, announcements will be made to return to normal operations.

Emergency Notifications

The Hale County Sheriff's Office has the primary responsibility of responding to, and summoning the necessary resources to mitigate, investigate, and document, emergencies on campus. Rural Studio campus resources can be requested through the studio's director, and additional university resources can be requested through the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security. In addition, the Hale County Sheriff's Office or other responding public safety agency has the responsibility to determine if the situation does, in fact, pose a threat to the Rural Studio campus community and to notify the senior site administrator present (Rural Studio director, assistant director, office manager, or designee) when this determination is made. If a situation poses an immediate threat to the Rural Studio campus community, the institution will immediately notify the campus community or the appropriate segments of the community that may be affected by the situation.

The Rural Studio site administration and Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security utilize different methods of emergency notification depending on the nature of the incident or event requiring notification, as further outlined below.

Notification Procedure

Upon confirmation by the Hale County Sheriff's Office or other responding public safety agency that a significant emergency or dangerous situation poses an immediate threat to the health or safety of members of the Rural Studio campus community, the agency making the determination will immediately notify the Rural Studio senior site administrator present and/or the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security. The Rural Studio site administration or Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security may receive information regarding significant emergencies or dangerous situations from other sources as well, such as campus administrators, other first responders, the Auburn University Medical Clinic director or public health officials (for public health emergencies) and the National Weather Service. In such cases, the Rural Studio site administration will be responsible for confirming that a significant emergency or dangerous situation poses an immediate threat to the health or safety of the Rural Studio campus community. This may be done in consultation with the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security and/or first responders, if needed.

Upon confirmation of an immediate threat to the safety or health of the Rural Studio campus community, the Rural Studio site administration, in consultation with the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security as needed, will, without delay and taking into account the safety of the community, determine the content of the notification and initiate the notification system, unless issuing a notification will, in the professional judgment of first responders (including, but not limited to, the Hale County Sheriff's Office, the Newbern Volunteer Fire Department, and Emergency Medical Services), compromise the efforts to assist a victim or to contain, respond to, or otherwise mitigate the emergency.

The Rural Studio site administration, with support from the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security, is charged with coordinating communication of immediate threats to the Rural Studio campus community, or to the appropriate segment(s) of the community that may be affected, and will determine the content of the notification using all available information. The content will convey the nature of the threat and immediate actions to be taken by the campus community or affected segment thereof. The notification will be initiated by a member of the Rural Studio site administration (or Auburn University Campus Safety & Security, if requested). Campus staff members are instructed that they are responsible for notifying others on the campus without delaying taking protective actions for themselves.

Emergency Notification System

Auburn University has numerous systems in place for communicating information quickly to Rural Studio students, faculty, staff, and visitors. The main components of the AU ALERT System that are used for notification to the Rural Studio campus are briefly described below.

Text and E-mail Messaging

This contracted emergency notification system has the ability to notify students, faculty, and staff of critical information and situations affecting campus through the use of text messages to multiple phone numbers and e-mail to multiple e-mail addresses. This system makes immediate notifications to the Rural Studio

campus community without delay. All active university e-mail addresses are automatically included in the system for main campus alerts. Students, faculty, and staff are encouraged to sign up with a phone number by logging into AU Access and clicking on the “Add/Update AU ALERT Contacts” link located on the My Campus tab. Visit www.auburn.edu/aualert for more information. Rural Studio students, faculty and staff are encouraged to also subscribe to alerts that are specific to the Rural Studio campus by clicking on the “Opt-In Lists” tab in their AU ALERT profile and selecting to receive alerts for the “Rural Studio” group.

NOAA Weather Radios

Located in the Rural Studio building, Morrisette House, and Spencer House, NOAA weather radios receive information directly from the National Weather Service. This information includes current weather and also any issued watches or warnings for Hale County, Alabama, where the Rural Studio campus is located.

Building Fire Alarms/Mass Notification Systems

Smoke detectors are in place to notify building occupants of possible fire dangers. If the smoke detector sounds, evacuate the building immediately and dial 911.

Additional Notification Methods

Emergency management personnel are routinely evaluating and adopting new technologies for emergency notification in an effort to most effectively reach members of the campus community during an emergency.

Alerts for the Rural Studio campus community are developed and distributed to the Rural Studio community by site administrators, but the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security is also available 24 hours a day at 334-750-9795 to immediately send a notification if needed.

Emergency Updates

Pertinent follow-up information will be disseminated as soon as it is available. For members of the campus community, updates and follow-up messages may be sent via any of the communication methods listed above. In addition, for members of the larger community (parents, neighbors, etc.), the Rural Studio campus will post information during a significant emergency or dangerous situation on its Web page at <http://www.ruralstudio.org/> (either directly or indirectly via a clearly identifiable link).

Campus Security and Law Enforcement

The Hale County Sheriff’s Office provides police services, including the investigation of criminal incidents, for the Rural Studio campus. Hale County Sheriff’s Office sworn officers conduct investigations, write reports for all criminal offenses, and enforce all laws.

The Rural Studio campus does not have a campus police or security department and does not employ security personnel or contract for such services. Local law enforcement personnel patrol on and near the campus, but not through a written agreement or contract for these services.

Auburn University strives to maintain an excellent working relationship with local and state law enforcement agencies, including the Hale County Sheriff’s Office and Alabama Law Enforcement Agency.

Noncampus Organizations

Students at the Rural Studio campus have the opportunity to participate in recognized student organizations, coordinated through the Main Campus Office of Student Involvement. The Division of Student Affairs maintains contact with these recognized student organizations. Criminal activity by students engaged in activities at noncampus locations of student organizations officially recognized by the university is responded to by local law enforcement. The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security receives information on student organization registered events and requests information about crimes reported at these locations from local law enforcement at least annually.

Access to and Security of Campus Facilities

The Rural Studio campus is generally open to the public during normal hours of operation (7:45 a.m. to 4:45 p.m., Monday through Friday).

Hale County Sheriff's Office deputies patrol the campus periodically. Officers patrol the campus via cars. For information about the access protocol for a specific building, see the Rural Studio director, associate director, or office manager.

Manual locks control access to these facilities and students residing on campus are issued a key to Morrisette or Spencer House, or to their assigned pod (The Pods), and are required to return the key at the end of their stay. Access to on-campus student housing is restricted by policy to residents, their approved guests, and site administrators. Guests of residents must be accompanied at all times by the resident whom they are visiting and are not allowed after hours. For security reasons, residents should not allow individuals without authorized access into their room.

Hale County Sheriff's Office deputies patrol the student housing facilities periodically and will increase patrols upon request.

Maintenance of Campus Facilities

Facilities and landscaping are maintained in a manner that minimizes hazardous conditions. Lighting is provided in outside areas frequented by students. Campus personnel are encouraged to report malfunctioning lights and other unsafe physical conditions to the Rural Studio director, assistant director, or office manager for correction.

Description of On-Campus Housing and Fire Safety Systems

Morrisette House, 8448 Alabama Highway 61, Newbern, AL 36765

Morrisette House is home to the Rural Studio main office and several student bedrooms. The building is a converted residential home constructed around 1893. Morrisette House does not have a fire alarm or sprinkler system. Fire safety features include:

- All bedrooms are equipped with smoke detectors. Batteries are changed each year.
- Portable fire extinguishers are provided in the hallways.
- Fire evacuation maps are posted inside each bedroom.

The Pods, 8448 Alabama Highway 61, Newbern, AL 36765

The Pods are a series of connected bedroom “pods,” constructed by students using various innovative construction methods. The Pods do not have a fire alarm or sprinkler system. They are located behind Morrisette House on the same property. Fire safety features include:

- Bedrooms exit directly to the exterior.
- All bedrooms are equipped with smoke detectors. Batteries are changed each year.
- Portable fire extinguishers are provided in each pod.
- Fire evacuation maps are posted inside each bedroom.

Spencer House, 7887 Alabama Highway 61, Newbern, AL 36765

The building is a former residential home constructed around the turn of the nineteenth century that is occasionally used for overflow student housing, starting in 2018. Spencer House does not have a fire alarm or sprinkler system. Fire safety features include:

- All bedrooms are equipped with smoke detectors. Batteries are changed each year.
- Portable fire extinguishers are provided in the hallways.
- Fire evacuation maps are posted inside each bedroom.

Fire Drills

Actual fire drills were not held in 2020 due to students leaving in response to the Covid-19 pandemic, but training for actions to take during a fire were covered during student orientation. An Operations Manager position has been created that will conduct and evaluate future fire drills in conjunction with the Newbern Volunteer Fire Department, as available.

All residents are required to participate in fire drills if present. Evacuation is required in all instances. No residents may remain in the building during the fire drill. Residents must remain outside until cleared to return. Procedures for evacuation are explained in orientation shortly after students arrive on site.

Student Housing Policies on Portable Electrical Appliances, Smoking and Open Flames

Appliances

- **Extension Cords:** The use of extension cords in the student housing is prohibited.
- **Appliances:** Appliances prohibited in all student housing include, but are not limited to: air-conditioning units, ceiling fans, halogen lamps, personal microwaves exceeding 700 watts, personal refrigerators exceeding 4.3 cubic feet, dishwashers, hot plates, personal washers and dryers, space heaters, crockpots, toaster ovens, toasters, appliances with open or exposed heating coils, and those which pose an electrical overload hazard.

Fire Safety

- **Arson:** Regardless of size of fire or whether or not damage is caused, starting and/or maintaining a fire or causing an explosion in any student housing or outside area is prohibited.
- **Candles/Incense:** The burning of candles and/or incense is prohibited. Candles with burnt wicks are prohibited.
- **Evacuation Procedures:** Interference with or non-adherence to emergency evacuation procedures in student housing during a fire drill are prohibited. Returning to the building before the "all-clear" signal has been given after a fire drill is prohibited.
- **Fireworks/Explosive Materials:** The storage, possession, or use of any type of fireworks, firecracker, or explosive material in student housing or surrounding vicinity is prohibited.
- **Flammable:** The storage, possession, or use of flammable materials/liquids in student housing is prohibited. Gas grills and gas cylinders/tanks are prohibited.
- **Vandalism of Safety Equipment:** Removal, tampering with, and/or the disabling of smoke or heat detectors, fire extinguishers, or other life safety equipment is prohibited.
- **False Fire Alarms:** Falsely reporting a fire to the police or fire department is prohibited.

Smoking

- Smoking is prohibited within all university buildings, facilities, grounds, university-owned vehicles, and property leased to or managed by the university with the exceptions of:
 - Controlled research, or educational, theatrical, or religious ceremonial purposes, with prior approval

- from the dean or director responsible for the facility.
- Privately-owned vehicles and locations outside of the campus perimeter.
- Littering the campus with remains of disposable tobacco products is prohibited.
- Assistance with smoking cessation for students, faculty and staff is available for all campuses through the Auburn University Medical Clinic, the Harrison School of Pharmacy, and the Office of Health Promotion and Wellness Services. More information can be found at <http://auburn.edu/smokefree>.

Candles

Candles and other sources of open flame are not permitted inside university buildings.

Fire Evacuation Procedures for All Campus Buildings Including Campus Housing

In the event of a fire or fire alarm:

- Exit the area immediately.
- Close all doors as you leave, taking keys and medications with you if possible. DO NOT delay evacuation to retrieve these items.
- Notify others around you as you leave.
- **Call 911** and report the emergency after you are out of the building and safe.

If the fire is small enough, you may attempt to extinguish it with a portable fire extinguisher, ONLY IF: 911 has been dialed; you are properly trained; and the fire is trash can size or similar.

- If leaving a room, feel the door with the back of your hand before opening it. Do not open any door that feels hot.
- If smoke is present, stay low. The best quality air is near the floor.
- Always use the stairs to exit upper floors.
- Once the building is evacuated, do not re-enter it for any reason. Return to the building ONLY when instructed to do so by emergency responders or administrators.
- DO NOT return for personal belongings.
- Direct and assist visitors and persons with disabilities who appear to need direction or assistance.
- Notify Campus Safety & Security at 334-750-9795 (24/7) that a fire has occurred AFTER you exit the building and 911 has been dialed.

If You Are Trapped and Cannot Evacuate

- Close any doors between you and the fire.
- If available, wedge wet towels or cloth materials along the bottom of the door to keep out smoke.
- Call 911 and notify the dispatcher of your location.
- Remain on the phone with the 911 dispatcher as long as possible.
- Break a window only as a last resort, such as needing oxygen to breathe.
- Use caution when breaking any window.

Response to Fire Alarms

- NEVER assume that a smoke detector activation is a false alarm.
- If the detector sounds evacuate immediately.

Fire Safety Education and Training Programs for Students, Faculty and Staff

Rural Studio provides a life safety class and portable fire extinguisher training periodically for staff. The fire safety policies and procedures covered in this document are discussed with Auburn University students residing in on-campus student housing during orientation to the Rural Studio design/build program.

Risk Management & Safety provides the following education/training to all other faculty, staff and students:

- Portable fire extinguisher training (upon request)
- Other fire safety education as requested

Reporting Fires

Students and employees should report that a fire occurred to the following persons and organizations:

In the event of a fire emergency, report the fire by dialing 911.

After the emergency, please contact the Campus Safety & Security on-call phone at 334-750-9795. Campus Safety & Security is responsible for coordinating Auburn University's response to emergencies, including fires, and will notify Risk Management and Safety for follow-up on investigation, tracking, and recording on the fire log. This information allows us to take proactive measures to reduce future occurrences.

The fire log can be viewed upon request at the Rural Studio main office or online at www.auburn.edu/administration/campus-safety/fire_log.html.

Plans for Future Improvement in Fire Safety

Risk Management and Safety will continue to work collaboratively with the College of Architecture, Design and Construction, Facilities Management, and other administrative offices to ensure plans for future renovations or new construction projects include the required fire protection systems and fire-rated building components.

There are currently no specific plans for future improvements to fire safety systems at the Rural Studio campus.

Campus Security Authorities

In addition to the general categories of campus security authorities described earlier in this report, there are several preferred campus security authorities to whom crimes should be reported. For the Shell Fisheries campus, these include:

- Executive Director, E.W. Shell Fisheries Center
- Director of AA/EEO and Title IX Coordinator (discrimination, harassment, sexual and gender-based misconduct)

Response to Reports

The City of Auburn Public Safety Department is available 24 hours a day to answer calls for emergency police, fire or medical assistance. In response to a call, appropriate action will be taken by either dispatching an officer and/or other emergency services or asking the individual reporting the crime to go to the City of Auburn Police Division to file a report.

When a crime is reported to the Auburn Police Division, an Incident/Offense Report will be created. The City of Auburn Police Division is responsible for investigating criminal activity at Auburn University. Portions of the report are a matter of public record, but information containing personally identifying information (PII) may only be released to the public at the direction of the Police Chief. The victim will be asked to provide a statement. Witnesses and/or possible suspects may be interviewed. Evidence will be collected, where available. Auburn Police Division will earnestly attempt to keep victims informed of the progress of the investigation.

Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security receives accident, incident, and arrest reports, as well as non-traffic citations, from the City of Auburn Police Division for incidents occurring on the university's Clery geography on a regular basis. The Department of Campus Safety & Security also receives reports of student arrests and serious incidents (to include acts of violence) involving students regardless of location. Certain details from reports received, or full reports, may be shared with the Division of Student Affairs for review and referral to the Office of Student Conduct for potential action, if the behavior documented is in violation of university policy. If sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, or stalking is reported, details from the incident report will be shared with the Title IX Coordinator for investigation, and personnel receiving the report, including City of Auburn Police Division, will offer the victim a wide variety of services, detailed in the previous section of this report on sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence and stalking.

Voluntary Confidential Reporting and Anonymous Reporting

Anyone who witnesses, or has been a victim of, a crime is encouraged to immediately report the incident to the City of Auburn Police Division by dialing 911, or 334-501-3100 (for non-emergency situations or delayed reports). Police reports in the state of Alabama are public records, meaning that police cannot hold reports of crime in confidence and thus do not allow voluntary confidential or anonymous reporting. The City of Auburn Police Division maintains a Crime Stoppers tip line that can be used for reporting security and safety related concerns, or to provide tips about criminal incidents or behavior on campus or within the City of Auburn. Call or text Crime Stoppers at 334-246-1391.

The Clery Act requires Auburn University to include in our annual crime statistics disclosure all reported crimes that fall into one of the Clery reportable crime categories and occur on our Clery geography. (See the previous section of this report on Clery Act reporting definitions for more information about Clery reportable crime categories and geography.) Confidential reports for inclusion in the annual disclosure of crime statistics, and for assessment for a timely warning notice, generally can be made to those campus security authorities who are not members of the City of Auburn Police Division; however, if a violation of the *Title IX Sexual Harassment Policy* or *Policy Against Discrimination and Harassment* is reported, or if there is a potential for a serious or ongoing threat to the campus community, some information may be required to be shared with certain campus administrators. In all cases, every effort will be made to maintain the confidentiality of crime victims to the extent possible. Individuals are always encouraged to report incidents to the police so they can be properly investigated.

Timely Warning of Crimes

The Shell Fisheries campus executive director, or designee, will determine if a crime reported represents a serious or ongoing threat to students and employees, develop the content of the message, and initiate distribution. The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security on-call supervisor is available 24/7 at 334-750-9795 to assist with this process as needed. Timely warnings will generally be distributed to the Shell Fisheries campus community via blast e-mail and in person via site administrators.

Emergency Preparedness

What to Do in the Event of a Campus Emergency

If you have an EMERGENCY requiring police, fire or ambulance, DIAL 911 without delay.

- When you dial 911 for emergency services, stay on the line and give the following information:
 - Your name, telephone number, and exact location.
 - The location of the emergency.
 - The nature and extent of the emergency (e.g. Are there injuries and how many?)
- Be informed and prepared in advance. Review emergency guidelines and building-specific plans, and do not wait until an emergency strikes to know what to do.
- Be aware of your surroundings and report any suspicious activities.
- Know the locations of fire alarm activation pull stations in your building and how to evacuate your building if the alarm is set off.
- Know the locations of severe weather shelter areas in your building and when to seek shelter.
- Know the location of the automated external defibrillator (AED) and be prepared to use it if someone is unresponsive and not breathing normally. The AED at Shell Fisheries, located near the front door of the office, is fully automated and can be used by any lay person.

Emergency Response and Evacuation Procedures

Emergency response and building evacuation procedures are included in building-specific emergency response plans.

The senior site administrator present (a Shell Fisheries director, assistant director, office manager, or designee), in coordination with the City of Auburn Public Safety Department or other first responders, is responsible for initiating any partial or campus-wide evacuations. The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security is available 24 hours a day at 334-750-9795 for assistance or consultation as needed.

When deciding whether to conduct an evacuation, consideration will be made for the type of hazard or threat, credibility of the threat, area of campus in danger, and ability to contain the threat to a specified area of campus. The Shell Fisheries campus community may be notified to evacuate on foot or by vehicle, depending on the nature and timing of the threat, as well as other hazards that may impact the safety of persons evacuating.

Communication of an evacuation order should be facilitated through the senior site administrator present, using the AU ALERT system. Messages should include the nature of the incident and directions for the Shell Fisheries campus community, including when the evacuation will begin, how to evacuate (on foot or by vehicle), where to go, and how updates will be provided.

The method and direction of the evacuation route during a campus evacuation will depend on the nature and location of the emergency or disaster warranting the evacuation. Once public safety officials decide it is safe to return, announcements will be made to return to normal operations.

Emergency Notifications

The City of Auburn Public Safety Department has the primary responsibility of responding to, and summoning the necessary resources to mitigate, investigate, and document, emergencies on campus.

University resources can be requested through the Shell Fisheries site administrator or the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security. In addition, the City of Auburn Public Safety Department has the responsibility to determine if the situation does, in fact, pose a threat to the Shell Fisheries campus community and to notify the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security when this determination is made. If a situation poses an immediate threat to the Shell Fisheries campus community, the institution (via a trained member of the AU ALERT Notification Team, defined later) will immediately notify the campus community or the appropriate segments of the community that may be affected by the situation.

The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security establishes and maintains emergency notification systems for the university and utilizes different methods of emergency notification depending on the nature of the incident or event, as further outlined below.

Notification Procedure

Upon confirmation by the City of Auburn Public Safety Department (Police or Fire Division) that a significant emergency or dangerous situation poses an immediate threat to the health or safety of members of the Shell Fisheries campus community, the City of Auburn Public Safety Department will either immediately notify the campus community directly using the AU ALERT system or will notify the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security to do so.

The Shell Fisheries site administration or Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security may receive information regarding significant emergencies or dangerous situations from other sources as well, such as university administrators, other first responders, the Auburn University Medical Clinic director or public health officials (for public health emergencies) and the National Weather Service. In such cases, the Shell Fisheries site administration will be responsible for confirming that a significant emergency or dangerous situation poses an immediate threat to the health or safety of the Shell Fisheries campus community. Factors that are quickly considered in making this determination include the nature, timing, location, and anticipated duration of the threat as well as the population and activities that may be impacted. This may be done in conjunction with the AU Department of Campus Safety & Security and/or first responders, if needed.

Upon confirmation of an immediate threat to the safety or health of the campus community, the senior Shell Fisheries site administrator, in consultation with Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security as needed, will, without delay and taking into account the safety of the community, determine the content of the notification and initiate the notification system, unless issuing a notification will, in the professional judgment of first responders (including, but not limited to, the City of Auburn Police Division, the City of Auburn Fire Division, and Emergency Medical Services), compromise the efforts to assist a victim or to contain, respond to, or otherwise mitigate the emergency.

The Shell Fisheries site administration, with support from the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security, is charged with coordinating communication of immediate threats to the Shell Fisheries campus community, or to the appropriate segment(s) of the community that may be affected. Pre-written templates are in place that can quickly be utilized for initial notification of protective actions needed. A member of the AU ALERT Notification Team, which consists of designated and trained members of the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security, the City of Auburn Public Safety Department, and key site administrators, will determine the content of the initial notification using all available information. The content will convey the nature of the threat and immediate actions to be taken by the campus community or affected segment thereof. The notification will be initiated by a member of the AU ALERT Notification Team. The Department of Campus Safety & Security will determine the content of all subsequent messaging providing updated information and protective actions to the campus community, as additional information becomes available.

Emergency Notification System

Auburn University has numerous systems in place for communicating information quickly to Shell Fisheries campus students, faculty, staff, and visitors. The main components of the AU ALERT System that are used for notification to the Shell Fisheries campus are briefly described below.

Text and E-mail Messaging

This contracted emergency notification system has the ability to notify students, faculty, and staff of critical information and situations affecting campus through the use of text messages to multiple phone numbers and e-mail to multiple e-mail addresses. This system makes immediate notifications to the Shell Fisheries campus community without delay. All active university e-mail addresses are automatically included in the system for main campus alerts. Students, faculty, and staff are required to sign up with a phone number by logging into AU Access and clicking on the "Add/Update AU ALERT Contacts" link located on the My Campus tab. Visit www.auburn.edu/aualert for more information. Shell Fisheries students, faculty and staff are encouraged to also subscribe to alerts that are specific to the Shell Fisheries campus by clicking on the "Groups" tab in their AU ALERT profile and selecting to receive text and/or email alerts for the "Shell Fisheries" group.

Tone Alert Radios

A tone alert radio is in place in the main reception area. The radio broadcasts a warning tone and then specific information, such as severe weather warnings or other pertinent information regarding emergencies on campus. The radio is issued to a point of contact within the building that can relay the information received to others in the building.

NOAA Weather Radios

A NOAA weather radio is in place in the main reception area. It receives information directly from the National Weather Service. This information includes current weather and also any issued watches or warnings for Lee County, Alabama, where the Shell Fisheries campus is located. The radio is issued to a point of contact within the building that can relay the information that is received to others in the building.

Building Fire Alarms

Fire alarms are in place in some buildings to notify building occupants of possible fire dangers. Older buildings have smoke detectors only. If you hear the fire alarm or smoke detector, evacuate the building immediately. The fire alarm has a distinct tone that is not used for any other purpose.

The main office building and laboratory have mass notification capabilities through the fire alarm system. Live voice messages can be broadcast by trained site administrators to provide verbal instructions to building occupants for any type of emergency.

Additional Notification Methods

The messages for all systems listed above are developed and distributed to the university community by a member of the AU ALERT Notification Team. The Office of Communications and Marketing may also develop similar messages and distribute them to the news media, as deemed necessary. The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security may communicate directly with the news media at the direction of the executive director of Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security.

Emergency Updates

Pertinent follow-up information will be disseminated as soon as it is available. For members of the campus community, updates and follow-up messages may be sent via any of the communication methods listed above. In addition, for members of the larger community (parents, neighbors, etc.), the Shell Fisheries campus will post information during a significant emergency or dangerous situation on its Web page at <https://sfaas.auburn.edu/e-w-shell-fisheries-center/>.

Campus Security and Law Enforcement

The City of Auburn Public Safety Department (Police Division) provides police services, including the investigation of criminal incidents, for the campus through a contract with Auburn University. Sworn officers conduct investigations, write reports for all criminal offenses, and enforce all laws and university policies. These officers are armed and have full arrest powers. The University Precinct is collocated with the Department of Campus Safety & Security at 543 W Magnolia Ave and is open 24 hours a day year-round. Through contract with Auburn University, Auburn Police Division provides law enforcement services for Shell Fisheries Clery geography (on campus, public property and noncampus) within Lee County, Alabama when working on behalf of Auburn University.

Auburn University maintains an excellent working relationship with local and state law enforcement agencies, including the City of Auburn Police Division, Lee County Sheriff's Office, and Alabama Law Enforcement Agency. Radio communication is in place with these agencies. While no formal written agreement exists with any law enforcement agency other than the Auburn Police Division, the university enjoys full cooperation and assistance from all other agencies with jurisdiction over university facilities on main campus and its multiple separate campuses.

Noncampus Organizations

Students at the Shell Fisheries campus have the opportunity to participate in recognized student organizations, coordinated through the Main Campus Office of Student Involvement. The Division of Student Affairs maintains contact with these recognized student organizations. Criminal activity by students engaged in activities at noncampus locations of student organizations officially recognized by the university is responded to by local law enforcement. The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security receives information on student organization registered events and requests information about crimes reported at these locations from local law enforcement at least annually.

Night Transportation

There are a number of different safe modes of night transportation for students, as outlined below. Students are strongly encouraged to utilize these resources and avoid the need to walk alone at night.

Campus Night Security Shuttle Service

Destination: On Campus

The Night Security Shuttle Service offers a safe ride between on-campus locations from 6 p.m. to 7 a.m. seven days a week when classes are in session hours may vary for the evenings of home football games and official Auburn University holidays. Passenger guidelines are available at aub.ie/SecurityShuttle and are advertised to students regularly at outreach events. To obtain on-campus door-to-door service, call 334-844-7400. Rides may also be requested through the free Auburn Safety app.

Security Escort Service

The City of Auburn Police Division offers, without charge, an on-campus security escort service when the Campus Security Shuttle is not in operation. If you need an escort, phone Auburn Police Division at 334-501-3100. An officer will respond to your location and escort you to your campus destination. The Security Escort Service is available during university holidays and semester breaks.

Access to and Security of Campus Facilities

The Shell Fisheries main office building and laboratory are secured using electronic locks. The main office building is open to the public during normal hours of operation (7:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., Monday through Friday). The Fish Market on site is open to the public on Saturdays from 8:00 a.m. to noon. The laboratory building is kept locked 24 hours a day and is only accessible via key card access to authorized individuals. Access to other buildings on campus is generally via keys, issued to personnel based on their need for access. For information about the access protocol for a specific building, see the director or office manager.

Gates across driveways leading into the facility are kept closed and locked after hours.

Tiger Transit does not operate a regular route to the facility but is available for drop-off and pick-up at the facility upon request.

City of Auburn Police Division officers patrol the campus on a regular basis via cars.

Maintenance of Campus Facilities

Facilities and landscaping are maintained in a manner that minimizes hazardous conditions. Campus personnel report malfunctioning lights and other safety-related devices to Facilities Management. Other members of the campus community are encouraged to report equipment problems or unsafe conditions to the office manager.

Introduction

The Auburn University Shellfish Laboratory (AUSL), identified as a separate campus in 2018, is located approximately 258 miles from Auburn University's main campus at 150 Agazzi Street, Dauphin Island, AL. Dauphin Island is a small town situated along the Gulf of Mexico on an island of the same name. AUSL provides instruction, research and outreach in the area of shellfish ecology and production to the citizens of Alabama, the region and the nation. It is one component of the Auburn University School of Fisheries, Aquaculture and Aquatic Sciences. AUSL is located on the campus of the Dauphin Island Sea Lab on the eastern end of Dauphin Island where Mobile Bay, Mississippi Sound, and the Gulf of Mexico converge. The faculty, staff, and students at AUSL conduct a variety of applied and basic research associated with marine invertebrates, including the eastern oyster, *Crassostrea virginica*. The facility includes a small-scale production hatchery and nursery.

Campus Security Authorities

In addition to the general categories of campus security authorities described earlier in this report, there are several preferred campus security authorities to whom crimes should be reported. For AUSL, these include:

- Manager, AUSL
- Director of AA/EEO and Title IX Coordinator (discrimination, harassment, sexual and gender-based misconduct)

Response to Reports

Local responders are available 24 hours a day to answer calls for emergency police, fire or medical assistance. In response to a call, appropriate action will be taken by either dispatching an officer and/or other emergency services. All reported crimes will be investigated by the Dauphin Island Police Department and may become a matter of public record. The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security requests information about crimes occurring on AUSL's Clery geography from the Dauphin Island Police Department and other law enforcement agencies with jurisdiction over the facility. Certain details from these incident reports may be shared with the Division of Student Affairs for review and referral to the Office of Student Conduct for potential action, as appropriate. If sexual assault, domestic/dating violence, or stalking is reported, details from the incident report will be shared with the Title IX Coordinator for investigation and personnel receiving the report, including AUSL staff, will offer the victim a wide variety of services, detailed in the section of this report on sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence and stalking.

Voluntary Confidential Reporting and Anonymous Reporting

Anyone who witnessed, or has been a victim of, a crime is encouraged to immediately report the incident to the Dauphin Island Police Department by dialing 911, or 251-861-5523 (for non-emergency situations or delayed reports). Police reports in the state of Alabama are public records, meaning that police cannot hold reports of crime in confidence and thus do not allow voluntary confidential or anonymous reporting. The Mobile County Crime Tips line can be used for reporting security and safety related concerns, or to provide tips about criminal incidents or behavior on campus or anywhere within Mobile County. The Clery Act requires Auburn University to include in our annual crime statistics disclosure all reported crimes that fall into one of the Clery reportable crime categories and occur on our Clery geography. (See the previous section of this report on Clery Act reporting definitions for more information about Clery reportable crime categories and geography.) Confidential reports for inclusion in the annual disclosure of crime statistics, and for assessment for a timely warning notice, generally can be made to campus security authorities; however, if a violation of the *Title IX Sexual Harassment Policy* or *Policy Against Discrimination and Harassment* is reported, or if there is a potential for a serious or ongoing threat to the campus community, some information may be required to be shared with certain campus administrators. In all cases, every effort will be made to maintain the confidentiality of crime victims to the extent possible. Individuals are always encouraged to report incidents to the police so they can be properly investigated.

Timely Warning of Crimes

The AUSL campus manager, or designee, will determine if a crime reported represents a serious or ongoing threat to students and employees, develop the content of the message, and initiate distribution. The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security on-call supervisor is available 24/7 at 334-750-9795 to assist with this process as needed. Timely warnings will generally be distributed to the AUSL campus community via blast e-mail and in person via site administrators.

Emergency Preparedness

What to Do in the Event of a Campus Emergency

If you have an EMERGENCY requiring police, fire or ambulance, DIAL 911 without delay.

- When you dial 911 for emergency services, stay on the line and give the following information:
 - Your name, telephone number, and exact location.
 - The location of the emergency.
 - The nature and extent of the emergency (e.g. Are there injuries and how many?)
- Be informed and prepared in advance. Review emergency guidelines and building-specific plans, and do not wait until an emergency strikes to know what to do.
- Be aware of your surroundings and report any suspicious activities.
- Know the locations of fire alarm activation pull stations in your building and how to evacuate your building if the alarm is set off.
- Know the locations of severe weather shelter areas in your building and when to seek shelter.

Emergency Response and Evacuation Procedures

Emergency response and building evacuation procedures are included in building-specific emergency response plans.

The senior site administrator present (AUSL site manager or designee), in coordination with the Dauphin Island Police Department, is responsible for initiating any partial or campus-wide evacuations. The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security is available 24 hours a day at 334-750-9795 for assistance or consultation as needed.

When deciding whether to conduct an evacuation, consideration will be made for the type of hazard or threat, credibility of the threat, area of campus in danger, and ability to contain the threat to a specified area of campus. The AUSL campus community may be notified to evacuate on foot or by vehicle, depending on the nature and timing of the threat, as well as other hazards that may impact the safety of persons

evacuating.

Communication of an evacuation order should be facilitated through the senior site administrator present via verbal communications and/or the AU ALERT system. Messages should include the nature of the incident and directions for the AUSL campus community, including when the evacuation will begin, how to evacuate (on foot or by vehicle), where to go, and how updates will be provided.

The method and direction of the evacuation route during a campus evacuation will depend on the nature and location of the emergency or disaster warranting the evacuation. Once public safety officials decide it is safe to return, announcements will be made to return to normal operations.

Emergency Notifications

The Dauphin Island Police Department has the primary responsibility of responding to, and summoning the necessary resources to mitigate, investigate, and document, emergencies on campus. AUSL campus resources can be requested through the site manager, and additional university resources can be requested through the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security. In addition, the Dauphin Island Police Department or other responding public safety agency has the responsibility to determine if the situation does, in fact, pose a threat to the AUSL community and to notify the senior site administrator present (AUSL site manager or designee) when this determination is made. If a situation poses an immediate threat to the AUSL campus community, the institution will immediately notify the campus community or the appropriate segments of the community that may be affected by the situation.

The AUSL site administration and Auburn University Campus Safety & Security utilize different methods of emergency notification depending on the nature of the incident or event requiring notification, as further outlined below.

Notification Procedure

Upon confirmation by the Dauphin Island Police Department, or other responding public safety agency that a significant emergency or dangerous situation poses an immediate threat to the health or safety of members of the AUSL campus community, the agency making the determination will immediately notify the AUSL senior site administrator present and/or the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security. The AUSL site administration or Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security may receive information regarding significant emergencies or dangerous situations from other sources as well, such as university administrators, other first responders, the Auburn University Medical Clinic director or public health officials (for public health emergencies) and the National Weather Service. In such cases, the AUSL site administration will be responsible for confirming that a significant emergency or dangerous situation poses an immediate threat to the health or safety of the AUSL community. This may be done in consultation with the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security and/or first responders, if needed.

Upon confirmation of an immediate threat to the safety or health of the AUSL campus community, the AUSL site administration, in consultation with the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security as needed, will, without delay and taking into account the safety of the community, determine the content of the notification and initiate the notification system, unless issuing a notification will, in the professional judgment of first responders (including, but not limited to, the Dauphin Island Police Department and Dauphin Island Fire and Rescue), compromise the efforts to assist a victim or to contain, respond to, or otherwise mitigate the emergency.

The AUSL site administration, with support from the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security, is charged with coordinating communication of immediate threats to the AUSL community, or to the appropriate segment(s) of the community that may be affected, and will determine the content of the notification using all available information. The content will convey the nature of the threat and immediate actions to be taken by the campus community or affected segment thereof. The notification will be initiated by a trained member of the AUSL site administration (or Auburn University Campus Safety & Security, if

requested). Campus staff members are instructed that they are responsible for notifying others on the campus without delaying taking protective action for themselves.

Emergency Notification System

Auburn University has numerous systems in place for communicating information quickly to AUSL students, faculty, staff, and visitors. The main components of the AU ALERT System that are used for notification to the AUSL Campus are briefly described below.

Text and E-mail Messaging

This contracted emergency notification system has the ability to notify students, faculty, and staff of critical information and situations affecting campus through the use of text messages to multiple phone numbers and e-mail to multiple e-mail addresses. This system makes immediate notifications to the AUSL campus community without delay. All active university e-mail addresses are automatically included in the system for main campus alerts. Students, faculty, and staff are encouraged to sign up with a phone number by logging into AU Access and clicking on the "Add/Update AU ALERT Contacts" link located on the My Campus tab. Visit www.auburn.edu/aualert for more information. AUSL students, faculty, and staff are encouraged to also subscribe to alerts that are specific to the AUSL campus by clicking on the "Opt-In Lists" tab in their AU ALERT profile and selecting to receive alerts for the "AUSL" group.

Outdoor Warning Sirens

Mobile County Emergency Management Agency has several sirens located near the AUSL campus on Dauphin Island. These sirens are primarily sounded for tornado warnings affecting the area. Sirens are intended to reach those who are outside at the time of the notification. The Mobile outdoor warning siren system is tested on the first Wednesday of each month at 9:00 a.m. (weather permitting).

NOAA Weather Radios

A NOAA weather radio is located in the lab. NOAA weather radios receive information directly from the National Weather Service. This information includes current weather and also any issued watches or warnings for Mobile County, Alabama, where the Shellfish Lab campus is located.

Building Fire Alarms

A fire alarm is in place to notify building occupants of possible fire dangers in the building. If you hear the fire alarm, evacuate the building immediately. The fire alarm has a distinct tone that is not used for any other purposes.

Additional Notification Methods

Emergency management personnel are routinely evaluating and adopting new technologies for emergency notification in an effort to most effectively reach members of the campus community during an emergency.

Alerts for the AUSL campus are developed and distributed to the AUSL community by site administrators, but the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security is also available 24 hours a day at 334-750-9795 to immediately send a notification if needed.

Emergency Updates

Pertinent follow-up information will be disseminated as soon as it is available. For members of the campus community, updates and follow-up messages may be sent via any of the communication methods listed above.

Campus Security and Law Enforcement

The AUSL campus is located on Dauphin Island, which is approximately eight miles long by a mile wide. The Dauphin Island Police Department is the primary law enforcement agency responsible for responding to emergencies and investigating criminal incidents for the AUSL campus. Dauphin Island Police Department sworn officers conduct investigations, write reports for all criminal offenses, and enforce all laws. The Dauphin Island Police Department patrols the area and responds to emergency calls for service 24 hours a day.

The AUSL campus does not have a campus police or security department and does not employ security personnel or contract for such services. Local law enforcement personnel patrol on and near the campus, but not through a written agreement or contract for these services.

Auburn University seeks to maintain an excellent working relationship with local and state law enforcement agencies, including the Dauphin Island Police Department, Mobile County Sheriff's Office, and Alabama Law Enforcement Agency.

Noncampus Organizations

Students at the AUSL campus have the opportunity to participate in recognized student organizations, coordinated through the Main Campus Office of Student Involvement. The Division of Student Affairs maintains contact with these recognized student organizations. Criminal activity by students engaged in activities at noncampus locations of student organizations officially recognized by the university is responded to by local law enforcement. The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security receives information on student organization registered events and requests information about crimes reported at these locations from local law enforcement at least annually.

Parking Safety

Students and staff at the AUSL campus have access to parking adjacent to the building. Students and staff are encouraged to use the buddy system or request an escort to avoid walking to their vehicles alone at night.

Access to and Security of Campus Facilities

The AUSL campus is generally open to staff, students, and visitors during normal business hours (8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday, with the exception of state holidays).

The front door and lobby area are open during normal business hours. Access to other areas of the building is restricted to faculty and staff (including students on rotation). For information about the access protocol for the building, see the AUSL site manager.

Dauphin Island Police officers patrol the facility on a regular basis 24 hours a day via foot and cars.

Maintenance of Campus Facilities

Facilities and landscaping are maintained in a manner that minimizes hazardous conditions. AUSL personnel report malfunctioning lights and other unsafe physical conditions to the AUSL staff for correction. AUSL has a maintenance contract with the Dauphin Island Sea Lab for lawn care, housekeeping, and general maintenance. Members of the AUSL campus community are encouraged to report equipment problems or unsafe conditions to the site manager so they may be corrected in a timely manner.

Campus Security Authorities

In addition to the general categories of campus security authorities described earlier in this report, there are several preferred campus security authorities to whom crimes should be reported. For Solon Dixon, these include:

- Director, Solon Dixon
- Assistant Director, Solon Dixon
- Director of AA/EEO and Title IX Coordinator (discrimination, harassment, sexual and gender-based misconduct)

Response to Reports

Dispatchers are available 24 hours a day to answer calls via 911 for emergency police, fire or medical assistance. An officer or other emergency service personnel will be dispatched to assist as appropriate. All reported crimes will be investigated by the responding agency, generally the Covington County Sheriff's Office, and may become a matter of public record. The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security requests information about crimes occurring on Solon Dixon's Clery geography from the Covington and Escambia County Sheriff's Offices. Certain details from these reports may be shared with the Division of Student Affairs for review and referral to the Office of Student Conduct for potential action, as appropriate. If sexual assault, domestic/dating violence, or stalking is reported, Solon Dixon staff will offer the victim a wide variety of services, detailed in the section of this report on sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking.

Voluntary Confidential Reporting and Anonymous Reporting

Anyone who witnessed, or has been a victim of, a crime is encouraged to immediately report the incident to the Covington County Sheriff's Office by dialing 911, or 334-428-2640 (for non-emergency situations or delayed reports). Police reports in the state of Alabama are public records, meaning that police cannot hold reports of crime in confidence and thus do not allow voluntary confidential or anonymous reporting.

The Clery Act requires Auburn University to include in our annual crime statistics disclosure all reported crimes that fall into one of the Clery reportable crime categories and occur on our Clery geography. (See the previous section of this report on Clery Act reporting definitions for more information about Clery reportable crime categories and geography.) Confidential reports for inclusion in the annual disclosure of crime statistics, and for assessment for a timely warning notice, generally can be made to campus security authorities; however, if a violation of the *Title IX Sexual Harassment Policy* or *Policy Against Discrimination and Harassment* is reported, or if there is a potential for a serious or ongoing threat to the campus community, some information may be required to be shared with certain campus administrators. In all cases, every effort will be made to maintain the confidentiality of crime victims to the extent possible. Individuals are always encouraged to report incidents to the police so they can be properly investigated.

Timely Warning of Crimes

The Solon Dixon Campus director, or designee, will determine if a crime reported represents a serious or ongoing threat to students and employees, develop the content of the message, and initiate distribution. The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security on-call supervisor is available 24/7 at 334-750-9795 to assist with this process as needed. Timely warnings will generally be distributed to the Solon Dixon campus community via blast e-mail and in person via site administrators.

Emergency Preparedness

What to Do in the Event of a Campus Emergency

If you have an EMERGENCY requiring police, fire or ambulance, DIAL 911 without delay.

- When you dial 911 for emergency services, stay on the line and give the following information:
 - Your name, telephone number, and exact location.
 - The location of the emergency.
 - The nature and extent of the emergency (e.g. Are there injuries and how many?)
- Be informed and prepared in advance. Review emergency guidelines and building-specific plans, and do not wait until an emergency strikes to know what to do.
- Be aware of your surroundings and report any suspicious activities.
- Know the locations of fire alarm activation pull stations and how to evacuate your building if the alarm or a smoke detector is activated.
- Know the location of the severe weather shelter area on campus and when to seek shelter.

Emergency Response and Evacuation Procedures

Emergency response and building evacuation procedures are included in building-specific emergency response plans.

The senior site administrator present (Solon Dixon director, assistant director, office manager, or designee), in coordination with the Covington County Sheriff's Office or other first responders, is responsible for initiating any partial or campus-wide evacuations. The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security is available 24 hours a day at 334-750-9795 for assistance or consultation as needed.

When deciding whether to conduct an evacuation, consideration will be made for the type of hazard or threat, credibility of the threat, area of campus in danger, and ability to contain the threat to a specified area of campus. The Solon Dixon campus community may be notified to evacuate on foot or by vehicle, depending on the nature and timing of the threat, as well as other hazards that may impact the safety of persons evacuating.

Communication of an evacuation order should be facilitated through the senior site administrator present, using the AU ALERT system. Messages should include the nature of the incident and directions for the Solon Dixon campus community, including when the evacuation will begin, how to evacuate (on foot or by vehicle), where to go, and how updates will be provided.

The method and direction of the evacuation route during a campus evacuation will depend on the nature and location of the emergency or disaster warranting the evacuation. Once public safety officials decide it is safe to return, announcements will be made to return to normal operations.

Emergency Notifications

The Covington County Sheriff's Office has the primary responsibility of responding to, and summoning the necessary resources to mitigate, investigate, and document, emergencies on campus. Solon Dixon campus resources can be requested through the center's director, and additional university resources can be requested through the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security. In addition, the Covington County Sheriff's Office or other responding public safety agency has the responsibility to determine if the situation does, in fact, pose a threat to the Solon Dixon campus community and to notify the senior site administrator present (Solon Dixon director, assistant director, office manager, or designee) when this determination is made. If a situation poses an immediate threat to the Solon Dixon campus community, the institution will immediately notify the campus community or the appropriate segments of the community that may be affected by the situation.

The Solon Dixon site administration and Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security utilize different methods of emergency notification depending on the nature of the incident or event requiring notification, as further outlined below.

Notification Procedure

Upon confirmation by the Covington County Sheriff's Office or other responding public safety agency that a significant emergency or dangerous situation poses an immediate threat to the health or safety of members of the Solon Dixon campus community, the agency making the determination will immediately notify the Solon Dixon senior site administrator present. The Solon Dixon site administration or Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security may receive information regarding significant emergencies or dangerous situations from other sources as well, such as campus administrators, other first responders, the Auburn University Medical Clinic director or public health officials (for public health emergencies) and the National Weather Service. In such cases, the Solon Dixon site administration will be responsible for confirming that a significant emergency or dangerous situation poses an immediate threat to the health or safety of the Solon Dixon campus community. This may be done in consultation with the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security and/or first responders, if needed.

Upon confirmation of an immediate threat to the safety or health of the Solon Dixon campus community, the Solon Dixon site administration, in consultation with the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security as needed, will, without delay and taking into account the safety of the community, determine the content of the notification and initiate the notification system, unless issuing a notification will, in the professional judgment of first responders (including, but not limited to, the Covington County Sheriff's Office, the Dixie Volunteer Fire Department, and Emergency Medical Services), compromise the efforts to

assist a victim or to contain, respond to, or otherwise mitigate the emergency.

The Solon Dixon site administration, with support from the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security, is charged with coordinating communication of immediate threats to the Solon Dixon campus community, or to the appropriate segment(s) of the community that may be affected, and will determine the content of the notification using all available information. The content will convey the nature of the threat and immediate actions to be taken by the campus community or affected segment thereof. The notification will be initiated by a member of the Solon Dixon site administration (or Auburn University Campus Safety & Security, if requested). Campus staff members are instructed that they are responsible for notifying others on the campus without delaying taking protective actions for themselves.

Emergency Notification System

Auburn University has numerous systems in place for communicating information quickly to Solon Dixon students, faculty, staff, and visitors. The main components of the AU ALERT System that are used for notification to the Solon Dixon campus are briefly described below.

Text and E-mail Messaging

This contracted emergency notification system has the ability to notify students, faculty, and staff of critical information and situations affecting campus through the use of text messages to multiple phone numbers and e-mail to multiple e-mail addresses. This system makes immediate notifications to the Solon Dixon campus community without delay. All active university e-mail addresses are automatically included in the system for main campus alerts. Students, faculty, and staff are encouraged to sign up with a phone number by logging into AU Access and clicking on the “Add/Update AU ALERT Contacts” link located on the My Campus tab. Visit www.auburn.edu/aualert for more information. Solon Dixon students, faculty, and staff are encouraged to also subscribe to alerts that are specific to the Solon Dixon campus by clicking on the “Opt-In Lists” tab in their AU ALERT profile and selecting to receive alerts for the “Solon Dixon” group.

NOAA Weather Radios

Located in the director’s house, a NOAA weather radio receives information directly from the National Weather Service. This information includes current weather and also any issued watches or warnings for Covington County, Alabama, where the Solon Dixon campus is located.

Building Fire Alarms/Mass Notification Systems

Fire alarms are in place in some buildings to notify building occupants of possible fire dangers. Older buildings have smoke detectors only. If you hear the fire alarm or smoke detector, evacuate the building immediately. The fire alarm has a distinct tone that is not used for any other purposes.

Additional Notification Methods

Emergency management personnel are routinely evaluating and adopting new technologies for emergency notification in an effort to most effectively reach members of the campus community during an emergency.

Alerts for the Solon Dixon campus community are developed and distributed to the Solon Dixon community by site administrators, but the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security is also available 24 hours a day at 334-750-9795 to immediately send a notification if needed.

Emergency Updates

Pertinent follow-up information will be disseminated as soon as it is available. For members of the campus community, updates and follow-up messages may be sent via any of the communication methods listed above. In addition, for members of the larger community (parents, neighbors, etc.), the Solon Dixon campus will post information during a significant emergency or dangerous situation on its Web page at <http://sdfec.auburn.edu/>.

Campus Security and Law Enforcement

The Covington County Sheriff’s Office provides police services, including the investigation of criminal incidents, for the Solon Dixon campus. Covington County Sheriff’s Office sworn officers conduct investigations, write reports for all criminal offenses, and enforce all laws.

The Solon Dixon campus does not have a campus police or security department and does not employ security personnel or contract for such services. Local law enforcement personnel patrol on and near the campus, but not through a written agreement or contract for these services.

Auburn University strives to maintain an excellent working relationship with local and state law enforcement agencies, including the Covington County Sheriff's Office and Alabama Law Enforcement Agency.

Noncampus Organizations

Students at the Solon Dixon campus have the opportunity to participate in recognized student organizations, coordinated through the Main Campus Office of Student Involvement. The Division of Student Affairs maintains contact with these recognized student organizations. Criminal activity by students engaged in activities at noncampus locations of student organizations officially recognized by the university is responded to by local law enforcement. The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security receives information on student organization registered events and requests information about crimes reported at these locations from local law enforcement at least annually.

Access to and Security of Campus Facilities

The Solon Dixon campus is generally open to the public during normal hours of operation (7:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m., Monday through Friday).

Covington County Sheriff's Office deputies patrol the campus periodically. Officers patrol the campus via foot and cars. For information about the access protocol for a specific building, see the Solon Dixon director.

Access to residence halls is restricted by policy to residents, their approved guests, and site administrators. Students residing in Dorms 1-5 are issued individual keys to their rooms. Residents in Dorms A1-A4 and B1-B4 can lock their rooms when occupied. Guests of residents must be accompanied at all times by the resident whom they are visiting and are not allowed after hours. For security reasons, residents should not allow individuals without authorized access into their dorm room.

Covington County Sheriff's Office deputies patrol the dorms periodically. Additionally, the Solon Dixon director and assistant director live on site in close proximity to the dorms.

Maintenance of Campus Facilities

Facilities and landscaping are maintained in a manner that minimizes hazardous conditions. Campus personnel are encouraged to report malfunctioning lights and other unsafe physical conditions to the Solon Dixon director, assistant director, or main office for correction.

Description of On-Campus Housing and Fire Safety Systems

Dorms 1-5, 12130 Dixon Center Road

Built in 2007/2008, Dorms 1-5 consist of five dormitory buildings with a total occupant capacity of 40. Each 1,488 square foot building includes four double occupancy rooms, with a capacity to house eight students. There is a backup generator for this set of dormitories, along with a pump system with a 2,500-gallon water tank. Fire safety features include:

- Bedrooms exit directly to the exterior.
- All bedrooms are equipped with smoke detectors that are monitored by an addressable fire alarm system. The fire alarm system is not monitored in a central location.
- An automatic sprinkler and standpipe system are provided. Sprinkler heads are in each bedroom, porch and utility room.
- Portable fire extinguishers are provided in the exterior corridor in the middle of the building.
- Fire evacuation maps are posted inside each bedroom.

Dorms A & B, 12130 Dixon Center Road

Built in 1979, Dorms A & B are two dormitory buildings with a total occupant capacity of 50 (25 per building). Each 2,856 square foot building can house 25 students. A pull cart with hose is available on campus that could be connected to a pump at the Dixon Home and used for fire suppression for these dormitories. Fire safety features include:

- Exits are marked with illuminated exit signs.

- All bedrooms are equipped with smoke detectors. Batteries are changed annually.
- Portable fire extinguishers are provided in each room.
- Fire evacuation maps are posted inside each bedroom.

Fire Drills

Fire drills are held when students begin their summer practicums; however, due to the Covid-19 pandemic all programs were virtual and no fire drills were conducted. When conducted, these drills are evaluated by the Solon Dixon director, in conjunction with Dixie Volunteer Fire Department.

Fire drills are required by Alabama law and all residents are required to participate if present. Evacuation is required in all instances. No residents may remain in the building during the fire drill. Residents must remain outside until cleared to return. Procedures for evacuation are explained in orientation shortly after students arrive on site.

Student Housing Policies on Portable Electrical Appliances, Smoking and Open Flames

Appliances

- **Extension Cords:** The use of extension cords in the dormitories is prohibited.
- **Appliances:** Appliances prohibited in all dormitories include, but are not limited to: air-conditioning units, ceiling fans, halogen lamps, personal microwaves exceeding 700 watts, personal refrigerators exceeding 4.3 cubic feet, dishwashers, hot plates, personal washers and dryers, space heaters, crockpots, toaster ovens, toasters, appliances with open or exposed heating coils, and those which pose an electrical overload hazard.

Fire Safety

- **Arson:** Regardless of size of fire or whether or not damage is caused, starting and/or maintaining a fire or causing an explosion in any dormitory or outside area is prohibited.
- **Candles/Incense:** The burning of candles and/or incense is prohibited. Candles with burnt wicks are prohibited.
- **Evacuation Procedures:** Interference with or non-adherence to emergency evacuation procedures in the dormitories during a fire drill are prohibited. Returning to the building before the "all-clear" signal has been given after a fire drill is prohibited.
- **Fireworks/Explosive Materials:** The storage, possession, or use of any type of fireworks, firecracker, or explosive material in the dormitories or surrounding vicinity is prohibited.
- **Flammable:** The storage, possession, or use of flammable materials/liquids in the dormitories is prohibited. Gas grills and gas cylinders/tanks are prohibited.
- **Vandalism of Safety Equipment:** Removal, tampering with, and/or the disabling of fire alarm pull

stations, smoke or heat detectors, fire extinguishers, sprinkler heads or other life safety equipment is prohibited.

- **False Fire Alarms:** Activating a fire alarm without due cause and/or falsely reporting a fire to the police or fire department is prohibited.

Smoking

- Smoking is prohibited within all university buildings, facilities, grounds, university-owned vehicles, and property leased to or managed by the university with the exceptions of:
 - Controlled research, or educational, theatrical, or religious ceremonial purposes, with prior approval from the dean or director responsible for the facility.
 - Privately-owned vehicles and locations outside of the Auburn University campus perimeter.
- Littering the campus with remains of disposable tobacco products is prohibited.
- Assistance with smoking cessation for students, faculty and staff is available through the Auburn University Medical Clinic, the Harrison School of Pharmacy, and the Office of Health Promotion and Wellness Services. More information can be found at <http://auburn.edu/smokefree>.

Candles

Candles and other sources of open flame are not permitted inside university buildings.

Fire Evacuation Procedures for All Campus Buildings Including Campus Housing

In the event of a fire or fire alarm:

- Exit the area immediately.
- Close all doors as you leave, taking keys and medications with you if possible. DO NOT delay evacuation to retrieve these items.
- Activate the closest fire alarm pull station along your evacuation route.
- Notify others around you as you leave.
- **Call 911** and report the emergency after you are out of the building and safe.

If the fire is small enough, you may attempt to extinguish it with a portable fire extinguisher, ONLY IF: 911 has been dialed; you are properly trained; and the fire is trash can size or similar.

- If leaving a room, feel the door with the back of your hand before opening it. Do not open any door that feels hot.
- If smoke is present, stay low. The best quality air is near the floor.
- Always use the stairs to exit upper floors.
- Once the building is evacuated, do not re-enter it for any reason. Return to the building ONLY when instructed to do so by emergency responders or administrators.
- DO NOT return for personal belongings.
- Direct and assist visitors and persons with disabilities who appear to need direction or assistance.
- Notify Campus Safety & Security at 334-750-9795 (24/7) that a fire has occurred AFTER you exit the building and 911 has been dialed.

If You Are Trapped and Cannot Evacuate

- Close any doors between you and the fire.
- If available, wedge wet towels or cloth materials along the bottom of the door to keep out smoke.
- Call 911 and notify the dispatcher of your location.
- Remain on the phone with the 911 dispatcher as long as possible.
- Break a window only as a last resort, such as needing oxygen to breathe.
- Use caution when breaking any window.

Response to Fire Alarms

- NEVER assume that a smoke detector activation is a false alarm.
- If the alarm sounds and/or emergency strobes begin to blink, evacuate immediately.

Fire Safety Education and Training Programs for Students, Faculty and Staff

Solon Dixon provides a life safety class and portable fire extinguisher training annually for all staff. The fire safety policies and procedures covered in this document are discussed with Auburn University students

residing in on-campus student housing during orientation to their practicum.

Risk Management & Safety provides the following education/training to all other faculty, staff and students:

- Portable fire extinguisher training (upon request)
- Other fire safety education as requested

Reporting Fires

Students and employees should report that a fire occurred to the following persons and organizations:

In the event of a fire emergency, report the fire by dialing 911.

After the emergency, please contact the Campus Safety & Security on-call phone at 334-750-9795. Campus Safety & Security is responsible for coordinating Auburn University's response to emergencies, including fires, and will notify Risk Management and Safety for follow-up on investigation, tracking, and recording on the fire log. This information allows us to take proactive measures to reduce future occurrences.

Plans for Future Improvement in Fire Safety

Risk Management and Safety will continue to work collaboratively with the School of Forestry & Wildlife Sciences, Facilities Management, and other administrative offices to ensure plans for future renovations or new construction projects include the required fire protection systems and fire-rated building components.

There are currently no specific plans for future improvements to fire safety systems at the Solon Dixon campus.

The 3-story studio located at 221 20th Street North has been leased by Auburn University since the summer of 2014, and the Birmingham Police Department patrols the area as part of their normal duties.

Campus Security Authorities

In addition to the general categories of campus security authorities described earlier in this report, there are several preferred campus security authorities to whom crimes should be reported. For Urban Studio, these include:

- Director, Urban Studio
- Administrative Director, Urban Studio
- Director of AA/EEO and Title IX Coordinator (discrimination, harassment, sexual and gender-based misconduct)

Response to Reports

Dispatchers are available at the Birmingham Police Department 24 hours a day to answer calls for emergency police, fire or medical assistance. In response to a call, this agency will take the required action, either dispatching an officer and/or other emergency services or asking the victim to report to the Birmingham Police Station to file an incident report. All reported crimes will be investigated by the Birmingham Police Department and may become a matter of public record. The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security requests information about crimes occurring on Urban Studio's Clery geography from the Birmingham Police Department. Certain details from these reports may be shared with the Division of Student Affairs for review and referral to the Office of Student Conduct for potential action, as appropriate. If sexual assault, domestic/dating violence, or stalking is reported, details from the incident report will be shared with the Title IX Coordinator for investigation and personnel receiving the report will offer the victim a wide variety of services, detailed in the section of this report on sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking.

Voluntary Confidential Reporting and Anonymous Reporting

Anyone who witnessed or has been a victim of a crime is encouraged to immediately report the incident to the Birmingham Police by dialing 911 or 205-328-9311 (for non-emergency situations or delayed reports). Police reports in the state of Alabama are public records, meaning that police cannot hold reports of crime in confidence and thus do not allow voluntary confidential or anonymous reporting. The Metro Alabama Crime Stoppers tip line can be used for reporting security and safety related concerns, or to provide tips about criminal incidents or behavior on campus or within the City of Birmingham. The Clery Act requires Auburn University to include in our annual crime statistics disclosure all reported crimes that fall into one of the Clery reportable crime categories and occur on our Clery geography. (See the section of this report on Clery Act reporting definitions for more information about Clery reportable crime categories and geography.) Confidential reports for inclusion in the annual disclosure of crime statistics, and for assessment for a timely warning notice, generally can be made to campus security authorities; however, if a violation of the *Title IX Sexual Harassment Policy* or *Policy Against Discrimination and Harassment* is reported, or if there is a potential for a serious or ongoing threat to the campus community, some information may be required to be shared with certain campus administrators. In all cases, every effort will be made to maintain the confidentiality of crime victims to the extent possible. Individuals are always encouraged to report incidents to the police so they can be properly investigated.

Timely Warning of Crimes

The Urban Studio Campus director, or designee, will determine if a crime reported represents a serious or ongoing threat to students and employees, develop the content of the message, and initiate distribution. The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security on-call supervisor is available 24/7 at 334-750-9795 to assist with this process as needed. Timely warnings will generally be distributed to the Urban Studio campus community via blast e-mail and in person via site administrators.

Emergency Preparedness

What to Do in the Event of a Campus Emergency

If you have an EMERGENCY requiring police, fire, or ambulance, DIAL 911 without delay.

- When you call for emergency services, stay on the line and give the following information:
 - Your name, telephone number, and exact location.
 - The location of the emergency.
 - The nature and extent of the emergency (e.g. Are there injuries and how many?)
- Be informed and prepared in advance. Review emergency guidelines and building-specific plans, and do not wait until an emergency strikes to know what to do.
- Be aware of your surroundings and report any suspicious activities.
- Know the locations of fire alarm activation pull stations in your building and how to evacuate your building if the alarm is set off.
- Know the locations of severe weather shelter areas in your building and when to seek shelter.

Emergency Response and Evacuation Procedures

Emergency response and building evacuation procedures are included in building-specific emergency response plans.

The senior site administrator present (Urban Studio director, administrative director, office manager, or designee), in coordination with the Birmingham Police Department or other first responders, is responsible for initiating any partial or campus-wide evacuations. The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security is available 24 hours a day at 334-750-9795 for assistance or consultation as needed.

When deciding whether to conduct an evacuation, consideration will be made for the type of hazard or threat, credibility of the threat, area of campus in danger, and ability to contain the threat to a specified area of campus. The Urban Studio campus community may be notified to evacuate on foot or by vehicle, depending on the nature and timing of the threat, as well as other hazards that may impact the safety of persons evacuating.

Communication of an evacuation order should be facilitated through the senior site administrator present, using the AU ALERT system. Messages should include the nature of the incident and directions for the Urban Studio campus community, including when the evacuation will begin, how to evacuate (on foot or by vehicle), where to go, and how updates will be provided.

The method and direction of the evacuation route during a campus evacuation will depend on the nature and location of the emergency or disaster warranting the evacuation. Once public safety officials decide it is safe to return, announcements will be made to return to normal operations.

Emergency Notifications

The Birmingham Police Department has the primary responsibility of responding to, and summoning the necessary resources to mitigate, investigate, and document, emergencies on campus. Urban Studio campus resources can be requested through the Urban Studio director, and additional university resources can be requested through the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security. In addition, the Birmingham Police Department has the responsibility to determine if the situation does, in fact, pose a threat to the Urban Studio community and to notify the senior site administrator present (Urban Studio director, administrative director or designee) when this determination is made. If a situation poses an immediate threat to the Urban Studio campus community, the institution will immediately notify the campus community or the appropriate segments of the community that may be affected by the situation.

The Urban Studio site administration and Auburn University Campus Safety & Security utilize different methods of emergency notification depending on the nature of the incident or event requiring notification, as further outlined below.

Notification Procedure

Upon confirmation by the Birmingham Police Department or other responding public safety agency that a significant emergency or dangerous situation poses an immediate threat to the health or safety of members of the Urban Studio campus community, the agency making the determination will immediately notify the Urban Studio senior site administrator present. The Urban Studio site administration or Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security may receive information regarding significant emergencies or dangerous situations from other sources as well, such as university administrators, other first responders and the National Weather Service. In such cases, the Urban Studio site administration will be responsible for confirming that a significant emergency or dangerous situation poses an immediate threat to the health or safety of the Urban Studio community. Factors that are quickly considered in making this determination include the nature, timing, location, and anticipated duration of the threat as well as the population and activities that may be impacted. This may be done in conjunction with the AU Department of Campus Safety & Security and/or first responders, if needed.

Upon confirmation of an immediate threat to the safety or health of the Urban Studio campus community, the Urban Studio director or designee, in consultation with Auburn University Department of Campus Safety

& Security as needed, will, without delay and taking into account the safety of the community, determine the content of the notification and initiate the notification system, unless issuing a notification will, in the professional judgment of first responders (including, but not limited to, the Birmingham Police Department, Birmingham Fire and Rescue, and Emergency Medical Services), compromise the efforts to assist a victim or to contain, respond to, or otherwise mitigate the emergency.

The Urban Studio director or designee, with support from the Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security, is charged with coordinating communication of immediate threats to the Urban Studio community, or to the appropriate segment(s) of the community that may be affected, and will determine the content of the notification using all available information. The content will convey the nature of the threat and immediate actions to be taken by the campus community or affected segment thereof. The notification will be initiated by a trained member of the Urban Studio site administration (or Auburn University Campus Safety & Security, if requested). Campus staff members are instructed that they are responsible for notifying others on the campus without delaying taking protective actions for themselves.

Emergency Notification System

Auburn University has numerous systems in place for communicating information quickly to Urban Studio students, faculty, staff, and visitors. The main components of the AU ALERT System that are used for notification to the Urban Studio campus are briefly described below.

Text and E-mail Messaging

This contracted emergency notification system has the ability to notify students, faculty, and staff of critical information and situations affecting campus through the use of text messages to multiple phone numbers and e-mail to multiple e-mail addresses. This system makes immediate notifications to the Urban Studio campus community without delay. All active university e-mail addresses are automatically included in the system for main campus alerts. Students, faculty, and staff are encouraged to sign up with a phone number by logging into AU Access and clicking on the “Add/Update AU ALERT Contacts” link located on the My Campus tab. Visit www.auburn.edu/aualert for more information. Urban Studio students, faculty and staff are encouraged to also subscribe to alerts that are specific to the Urban Studio campus by clicking on the “Opt-In Lists” tab in their AU ALERT profile and selecting to receive alerts for the “Urban Studio” group.

Outdoor Warning Sirens

Jefferson County Emergency Management Agency has several sirens located near the Urban Studio campus in the downtown Birmingham area. These sirens are primarily sounded for tornado warnings affecting the area. Sirens are intended to reach those who are outside at the time of the notification. The Jefferson County outdoor warning siren system is tested on the first Wednesday of each month at 10:00 a.m. (weather permitting). If the test has to be postponed due to weather, it is rescheduled on either the following day or the following week.

NOAA Weather Radios

A NOAA weather radio is located in the studio. NOAA weather radios receive information directly from the National Weather Service. This information includes current weather and also any issued watches or warnings for Jefferson County, Alabama, where the Urban Studio campus is located.

Additional Notification Methods

Emergency management personnel are routinely evaluating and adopting new technologies for emergency notification in an effort to most effectively reach members of the campus community during an emergency.

Alerts for the Urban Studio campus are developed and distributed to the Urban Studio community by site administrators, but the Auburn University Campus Safety & Security is also available 24 hours a day at 334-750-9795 to immediately send a notification if needed.

Emergency Updates

Pertinent follow-up information will be disseminated as soon as it is available. For members of the campus community, updates and follow-up messages may be sent via any of the communication methods listed above. In addition, for members of the larger community (parents, neighbors, etc.), the Urban Studio

campus will post information during a significant emergency or dangerous situation on its Web page at <https://cadc.auburn.edu/architecture/architecture-degrees-programs/program-of-architecture/urban-studio/> (either directly on the page or via a clearly identifiable link).

Campus Security and Law Enforcement

The Birmingham Police Department provides police services, including the investigation of criminal incidents, for the Urban Studio campus. Birmingham Police sworn officers conduct investigations, write reports for all criminal offenses, and enforce all laws.

The Urban Studio campus does not have a campus police or security department and does not employ security personnel or contract for such services. Local law enforcement personnel patrol on and near the campus, but not through a written agreement or contract for these services.

Auburn University strives to maintain an excellent working relationship with local and state law enforcement agencies, including the Birmingham Police, Jefferson County Sheriff's Office and Alabama Law Enforcement Agency.

Noncampus Organizations

Students at the Urban Studio campus have the opportunity to participate in recognized student organizations, coordinated through the Main Campus Office of Student Involvement. The Division of Student Affairs maintains contact with these recognized student organizations. Criminal activity by students engaged in activities at noncampus locations of student organizations officially recognized by the university is responded to by local law enforcement. The Auburn University Department of Campus Safety & Security receives information on student organization registered events and requests information about crimes reported at these locations from local law enforcement at least annually.

Safety Escort Service

Students and staff at the Urban Studio campus are encouraged to use the buddy system or City Action Partnership (CAP) services to request an escort to avoid walking to their vehicles or other locations alone at night. CAP services offer street security patrol, security escorts to and from your vehicle, friendly advice and directions, and stranded motorist assistance. Access to and Security of Campus Facilities

The Urban Studio campus is generally open for normal business from 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday. The campus utilizes electronic card access and doors remain locked 24 hours a day. Students and employees are granted card access. Visitors must be granted access by an Urban Studio student or employee. A security alarm system is in place that may be activated outside of normal business hours.

Birmingham Police officers and CAP personnel patrol the facility on a regular basis. Officers patrol the area via foot, bike and cars.

Maintenance of Campus Facilities

Facilities and landscaping are maintained in a manner that minimizes hazardous conditions. The property manager and Urban Studio staff regularly patrol the facility to take care of malfunctioning lights and other unsafe physical conditions. The property manager is responsible for correcting issues on the outside of the building, and the Urban Studio is responsible for correcting safety issues inside the building.

Other members of the campus community are encouraged to report equipment problems or unsafe conditions to the Urban Studio director or administrative director so they may be corrected in a timely manner.
