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AI and Writing

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What is ChatGPT?

- Large Language Model
- 175 billion parameters
- Human trainers to improve performance
- Generates unique text in response to prompts



ChatGPT Capabilities (for now)

- Chat GPT can:
 - Rephrase language from prompts
 - Generate high-level answers, and be used as a test of “novelty”
 - Draw from open access content freely available on the web
 - Give generic feedback on writing
 - Generate teaching ideas and questions targeted to Bloom’s taxonomy
- Chat GPT cannot:
 - Access databases/external websites in real time
 - Draw from discrete, identifiable sources
 - Integrate and analyze original data
 - Create accurate citations
 - Generate personal/reflective writing
- Potentially biased, but may "sanitize" answers or avoid controversial/polarized issues; also, it may struggle with emerging or outlier ideas/findings/theories
- Gives some wrong or fabricated answers, sometimes called “hallucination”



Four Modes of Response

- Prohibition
- Workaround
- Permission
- Engagement



Prohibition

- Be explicit
- Proceed with caution



Workaround

- Focus on meaning-making, not answer-getting, tasks
- Sequence (“scaffold”) assignments
- Assign skill-building activities
- Assign multimodal activities
- Create elaborate contexts
- Integrate peer feedback



Permission

- Allow students to use AI to augment the writing process
- Acknowledge AI's contribution explicitly



Engagement

- Use AI explicitly:
 - Critique answers, compare to grading criteria, use it as a starting point for research
- Writing about AI:
 - Discuss ethics of data use, ecological impact, effects on mis- or disinformation, or other areas of relevance to particular fields
- Contextualize AI in relation to purposes and processes of knowledge building in the field

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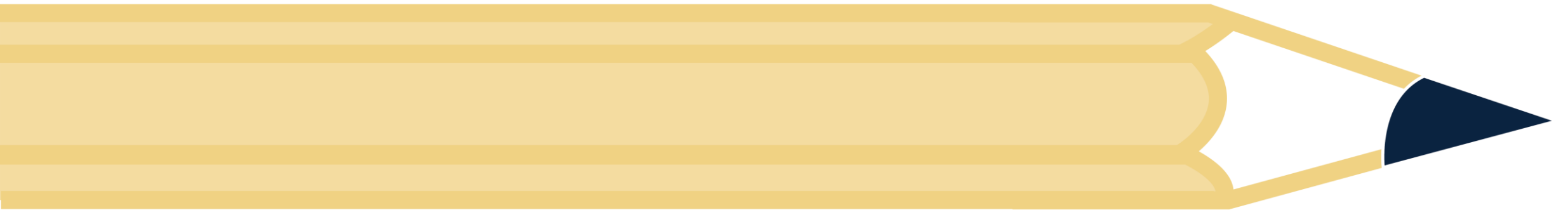
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
