JOB SUMMARY

Reporting to the Assistant Director of Curatorial Affairs, the Preparator is responsible for the meticulous construction and installation of all temporary and permanent exhibitions at The Jule Collins Smith Museum of Fine Art, the University's on-campus teaching museum. This role encompasses both on-site and off-site locations. The Preparator ensures the safe, efficient, and specialized internal movement, housing, and installation of the University's art collection and loaned objects. Key responsibilities include fabricating and producing exhibition components in the museum's carpentry and fabrication workshop, and designing unique hanging systems tailored to museum standards. The Preparator upholds professional museum standards for the care and maintenance of collections, as well as regarding all exhibition and curatorial areas.

RESPONSIBILITIES

- Collaborates with the Director of Operations to prepare gallery spaces for exhibition installations, leading the hanging, installing, and deinstalling of exhibitions. This includes the installation, deinstallation, and maintenance of outdoor sculptures from the permanent collection, as well as arranging and designing gallery lighting to meet required light levels.
- Works closely with the Museum Registrar to install and deinstall permanent collection art on university property.
- Prepares objects for display by designing, overseeing, and/or fabricating archival-quality art display fixtures, customized mounting systems, conservation mats/frames, and specialized hanging systems unique to museums.
- Collaborates on rendering exhibition layouts for approval by exhibition curators and museum leadership, using drawings, scale models, computer programs, and other design tools to effectively communicate design ideas, exhibition layouts, material selections, case designs, media elements, and lighting.
- Supervises and/or participates in the safe, efficient, and specialized movement of all works of art in the museum's care, both on and off-site. In collaboration with the Museum Registrar, designs and builds art storage solutions, crates, and packages for safe shipping; packs and unpacks outgoing and incoming art shipments; and transports works of art locally and regionally.
- Collaborates with the Director of Operations to oversee and maintain safe working conditions during gallery turnover and in the carpentry and fabrication workshop. Manages and procures departmental supply inventories, and oversees and trains assistants in the proper use of tools and materials.

The responsibilities listed above show the typical duties for jobs in this classification. Actual tasks may differ depending on the department's needs. Other similar duties may be assigned with discretion of the supervisor. Not every duty will apply to every position, and the amount of time spent on each task can change based on department needs.

SUPERVISORY RESPONSIBILITIES

Supervisory Responsibility May supervise employees but supervision is not the main focus of the job.

Fundamental knowledge and understanding of preventative conservation as it relates to housing/storing art objects or related items.
