Qualifications

- The candidate must have an earned PhD from an accredited institution in a field relevant to ACES programs (e.g., agriculture, human sciences, education, natural resources, STEM, and related fields), and must have achieved the academic and professional qualifications to be considered at the level of Associate Professor.
- A minimum of five years of leadership experience in Extension or a similar organization, with a proven track record of successful program management and staff supervision.
- Experience in securing and managing external funding, including grants.
- Deep knowledge of 4-H youth development and the Cooperative Extension system.
- Success in developing and maintaining effective partnerships and working relationships with internal/external stakeholders and broad audiences.
- Outstanding communication, organizational, and leadership skills.
